His nomination for any delegate who had voted against Taft in the 1948 convention, the Republican Party's chief backer, told reporters he knew before voting that he would lose. "I think I could not win the fight," he said.

As the boating went on, it was said he told a group of delegates that he was voting on "nonissue" and "a vastly different story."

Seoul, Saturday, July 12.—(AP)—Hundreds of Allied warplanes Friday smashed North Korea's capital and two other prime military targets in one of the mightiest air blows of the Korean war. Pyongyang, the North Korean capital, was left in roasting flames and rubble before bad weather blotted out the target area of fire and bombs.

It was a thunderous follow-up to the Yalu river power plant raid on June 23 designed to exert greater military pressure on the balky Communist armistice negotiators.

154 B-29 Superfortresses, which were kept the raid from reaching the target area, were 1,044 sorties, (individual flights) completed, with 1,478 on June 23.

Estimates of the number of planes involved ranged from 500 to 650. Pilots of five Allied nations took part in the big blow.

United Nations pilots reported they destroyed or damaged the Communists' army communication headquarters and other vital centers and numerous other factories and supply and troop centers in Pyongyang, the capital.

The Red capital was left in flames and rubble, said AP Correspondent Rigo Carter after a flight over the target area.

American, British, Australian, Soviet, and South Korean planes from land and carrier bases also smashed Hwasong, a North Korean town, and 25 and 20 important centers of the rail line between Pyongyang and Hwasong.
