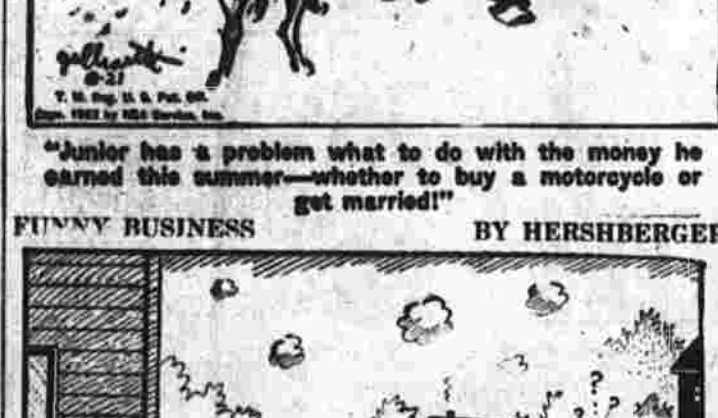

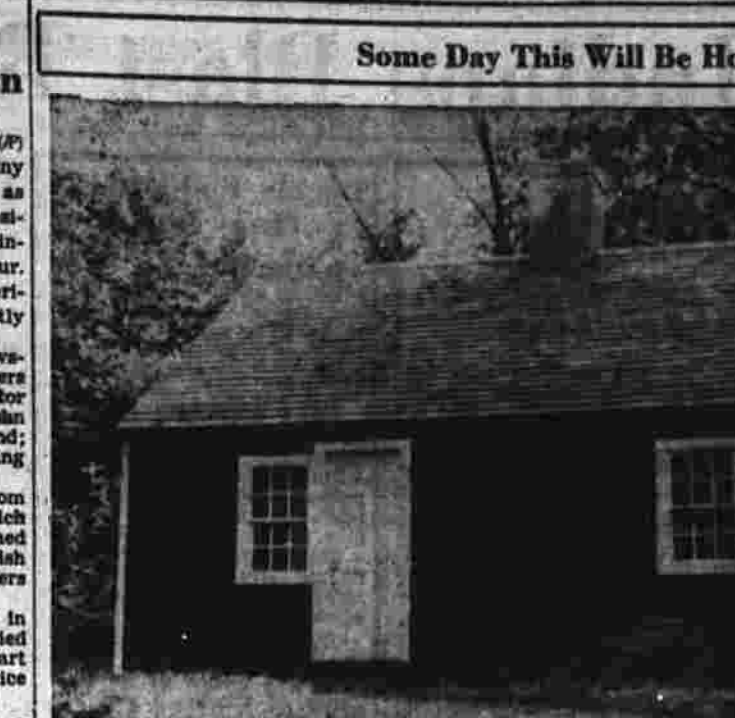

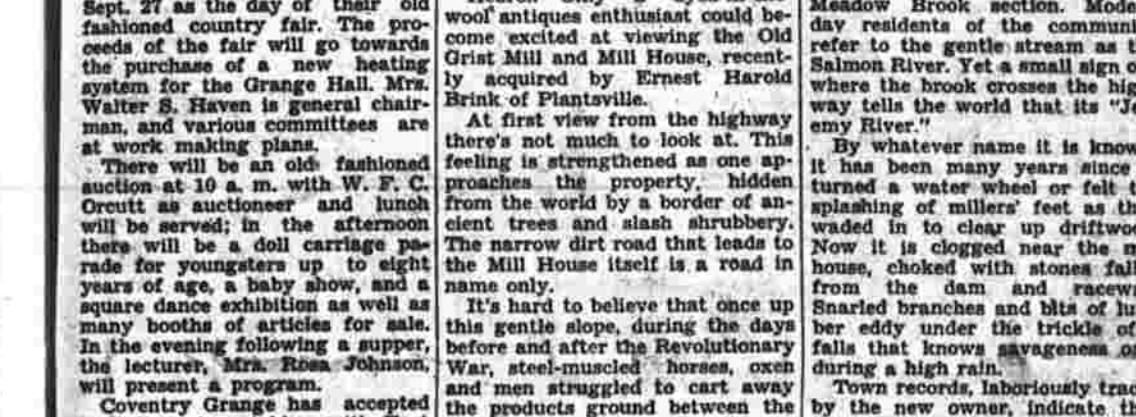

Two Republicans and 1 Democrat Enter Races; Deadline Is Monday

The names of three more candidates for nomination—two Republicans and one Democrat—were bobbed to the surface of the political waters in Manchester today as many new days remained for filing for the primaries.

The reported candidates and the offices they are seeking are Robert Gornah, Republican state representative; Theodore Fairbank, Republican town director; and Helen Fitzpatrick, Democrat town director.

Gornah, who was defeated in the primaries two years ago when he sought the state representative nomination, today confirmed a re-election bid by filing for nomination in his behalf and indicated he will run. However, he stated that he did not intend to move. He said he "believes" the proposal is being sponsored by Victor Swanson and Leonard Taylor.

Fairbank also confirmed the report that a proposal was being circulated for him, and said that he will be a candidate for nomination.

Although Mrs. Fitzpatrick, who is president of the Hartford County Federation of Democratic Women, would not confirm or deny persistent rumors that she will be a candidate for nomination, she will run in the primary.

of failure. The marriage will never work, it will never be strong, it will never last.

He expressed some indignation at the fact that his western friends seemed to assume that it was impossible to work under a Communist regime, that the only choice would be either to knock down or go into exile.

"I say a joyful 'no' to the Lord, who has put us in our situation," he said.

One of the reasons Professor Hromadka was that he believed that the social revolution being worked by the Communists was in some degree necessary and overdue. He went back, in one sense, because he believed Christianity ought to be sharpened to its own tasks in the world, and, if possible, give some performance of its own in the frontiers of social progress.

In his speech in Sweden, he touched on this aspect of his own belief and service, as follows: "Frenzied changes in the very structure and very formation of our social life have made our theology and church much more watchful and responsive than it used to be. All is at stake. We realize what it means theologically speaking, to have a social life and death. Every word and category, every traditional church watchword and confession, is being interpreted, re-evaluated as to its integrity and relevance."

Professor Hromadka, living and working behind the Communist frontier, it seems to us, like Bishop Dibelius, wielding a concept potentially much more dangerous to Communism than the atomic bomb in the world. His concept would be the valid counter to the Communist attack on religion. He would never have risen and would not be finding the present areas for his operations in the social field had there not been a failure on the part of Christianity. Had the world ever really sought and practiced the Christian solution to its problems, the Marxist-Communist solution, which is no real solution, would not have risen to exist and operate. Communism, in its basic error, will inevitably exhaust itself, but if there is no Christian solution, Communism can hasten the day, that would be for Christianity to stop hiding behind atomic bombs and get out in the world with a vitalized return to its own original mission.

We suppose that Professor Hromadka, because he does not refuse in perpetual attack on the Communists, because he works in a field which is likely to be considered something of a traitor to Christianity and to civilization, is, like Bishop Dibelius, incapable of recognizing a mortal enemy?

But our wonder about Professor Hromadka is this. We wonder if he, and Bishop Dibelius, are not really, after all, the only true warriors of our day, who are the only weapon in the world which does not stain the hands of its user.

Death Plays A Hand

The death of Dr. Kurt Schumacher, leader of the Social Democratic party in West Germany, increases the chances of success for the Adenauer-Deiminger policy of linking one part of Germany to the West while leaving the other half to Russia.

The mere statement of what the policy is raises doubts as to its wisdom.

If there is one flat and uncompromising opinion which can safely be made about the German problem it is that the problem cannot be solved by partition, and that partition cannot be permanent.

It was Dr. Schumacher's intense and passionate virtue that he saw this historic truth, which Adenauer and Deiminger ignore because they see an opportunity to build some kind of power on partition. Adenauer is after the war-making potential of West Germany, which would surely move into a neutral position, if all Germany was unified. Adenauer is after the perpetuation of his own political power, which would be threatened if Germany were unified.

For both policy makers, the theory is that half a Germany is better than none.

Dr. Schumacher contended that half a Germany was actually a possibility—and that the only thing for Germany to do was to treat its own unity from both West and East.

In this stand, he spoke for the heart of the German people, and he spoke for what must happen, inevitably, in future history.

Now that he is dead, there may be no effective spokesman, in his country, and he himself gave a report, the other day, that the Third World Conference on Peace and Order, held in Lund, Sweden, was a failure.

Thinking as the delegate of the Evangelical Church of Czech Brethren, Professor Hromadka made no secret of the fact that he had found difficulties in Czechoslovakia. Indeed, he gloried in them. He was happy he said to find himself in a place where preaching

Top Secret Data Found by Police
