People Killed by Autos At Rate of 104 a Day

Chicago, Aug. 28.—Autonobiles are killing people at the rate of about 104 per day on the nation's streets and highways.

Last year, the traffic death toll was 37,000, the National Safety Council reports. During the first six months this year, 16,820 fatalities were recorded, a 2 percent increase over the half-year total of 1951.

Just how good, or bad, is the nation's traffic safety record? What's wrong? What should be done? Can matters be improved? Actually, traffic accidents account for one-fourth of the deaths in the United States.

Yoshida spent most of his political life as the diplomat. He was ambassador to Britain from 1924 to 1928. He became foreign minister and then prime minister in 1946 and resigned May 23, 1947. He returned as prime minister in 1948 and resigned May 23, 1949. He was re-elected prime minister and held the job since.

Called by Hirohito as "the father of the nation," he was called by Japanese militarists for his part in the war.

He has formed three post-war cabinets. He was purged and Yoshida was named as his successor. Now, in your health, he wants his old job back.

Malinikov had just won the presidency of the Liberal party in 1946 and 1948, but resigned upon a book he had written praising Hitler and Mussolini.
