## What's Happened to the West Point Cribbers?

New York (NEA)—Where are the West Point cribbers? The moras of scandal and excitement into which 90 basketball players were dragged is more than a year old. Time has cushioned the first shocks of indignation.

They still have the right to play football. They still play football. There, if a recent football game is to be believed, it promises to be better than the hollow brand of 1951.

"Regular instructor Bob Farris, who last year was the best sportsman in Vanderbilt in a year's time, has transferred to the U. S. Military Academy as a first lieutenant. He is one of those who were in the best football team in the East last year."

This fall many become eligible to play football again on campus as divers as William Jones and Villanova, and as far as Bryan and Houston.

NEA's football reporter told their stories of the last 12 months, their desperate scramble to continue college education, their attempts to forget the nightmare of a ruined season that engulfed them and altered their lives.

They remain sharply acute of the public glare, and sometimes stare straight upon them.

"You happen to see Col. William Jones, who was the tackle from St. Charles, Ill., who played in the 1951 team, I remember what he said about going to another school and show-

"I'm not ashamed of being one of the famous, or should I say infamous, '90,' said Gene Phillips of Sacramento, Calif., who will play left half for Villanova. "I do feel some resentment toward the outside who led to remain in the Academy and to the many petty accusations directed by the officials during the erasing investigation."

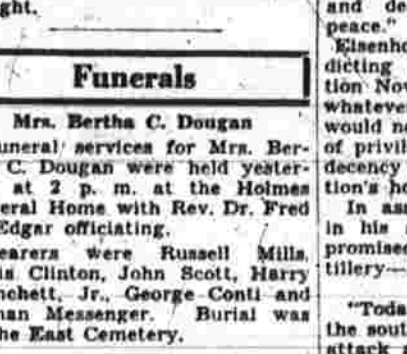

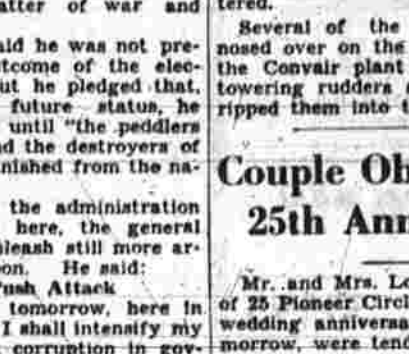

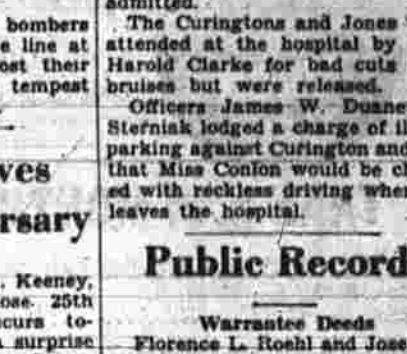
