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Touring Girl Scouts Study In Huge Swiss 'Classroom'

Ann Thrall, Alyssa Murphy, Doris Hayes, Betty Ann Twitler, Nancy Wier and Janice Murphy, went for a ride on the polar dog sleds and all the members of the troop explored the terrace and the observation tower and had snowed! sights in the bright sunshine.

The scene was a brilliant one, snow all around, with rocks occasionally poking through the highest part of the mighty mountain, 15,643 feet, nearby and people adding in the bright summer sunshine. It was a never-to-be-forgotten sight, deep snow in the summer.

The descent also took three hours as it is steep and the cog railways must travel slowly. Magnificent views of the valleys were obtained, both on the descent and the ascent.

Another momentous trip which the girls made while they were making their headquarters at Wilderswil, near Interlaken, was a trip to the Blue Grotto in the glacier near Grindelwald. Taking the train to Grindelwald one day, all it walked through that village and then climbed up into the mountain for about an hour before reaching a glacier. This glacier moves about three feet a year and its action upon the surrounding mountain sides can easily be discerned. While some of the girls were near by, huge pieces of ice and rock broke off the glacier and tumbled into the chasm with a great roar.

The Blue Grotto is an ice cave within the glacier itself, bluish in color. The group walked into the cave. It was hard to realize that they were actually with a glacier with tons of ice over them. All were somewhat relieved to get out into the open again, although they had been told that the grotto was perfectly safe.

Aside from the interest in the glacier, the girls had a most interesting time at the station of Kluisen. The travelers found that they were traveling in heated cars in the summer time. They soon discovered the reason for the heated cars; it was bitterly cold, especially when the train entered a long tunnel which runs under the Aletsch Glacier, the largest glacier in the Alps. Two stops were made on route, enabling the passengers to get out and view the glacier from lookouts along the way. It was much too cold, however, to stop for very long.

After traveling through the tunnel for nearly an hour, the train arrived at its destination, Jungfrauoch, the highest railroad station in Europe, 11,333 feet above sea level. The thirty Swiss ladies from lookouts along the way, the beauties of their country and have built a hotel up there in the snow and ice, with many attractions for the tourist.



 12000, Switzerland, Sept. 5.—Studying the action of a glacier, ascending the snowy peaks of the beautiful Jungfrau and watching the action of the most powerful waterfall in the Swiss Alps kept the 18 members of Senior Girl Scout Troop 1 busy in an outdoor classroom as the schools in Manchester were reopening.

Their trip nearly over, the girls are finding that they have learned many lessons from actual experience this summer. They have seen and done things they shall never forget, much of which will be of benefit to them in their classrooms when they return to school this month.

The ascent up the Jungfrau, one of the mightiest of the Alps, was a momentous occasion for the Scouts. It was necessary to change trains twice on the upward journey.

When the stand villagers cheered as the car rolled by with the 16 waving happily to one and all.

The falls themselves are the most powerful in the Alps and run down through the mountain with great force. Outlookers are awed by the power of the water. It is easy to see why electric power is abundant in Switzerland.

On making all these excursions by railroad the Manchester Scouts have met with wonderful cooperation from Swiss railway officials. Because they are members of a world wide organization traveling in uniform and in a group their railroad tickets have cost them about half the usual price, and generally special seats are reserved for them. The railroads are efficient, trains run frequently and the carriages are very clean, particularly because over 90 per cent of the railroads in this small country are electrified.

With little less than a week left to spend in Switzerland and four days in Paris, the Scouts realize that their trip is drawing to an end. They are now beginning to think back over all their adventures of the summer and realizing how much they have seen and how much they have learned.



Three-Way Split on Board Looms in Wake of Primary

Bowers, Fairbanks, Kennedy Shatter GOP Team's Union Places Three

The prospect of a Board of Directors split into three factions loomed today in the wake of yesterday's primaries that saw three men who received the unofficial endorsement of the Republican Town committee and the three non-committees who ran against them win nomination as director candidates.

The Democrats, who are at a 2-to-1 disadvantage in party registration, but are assured of three seats on the Board of Directors, are expected to win a majority of the seats on the Board of Directors.

The 12 candidates for the Board of Directors nominated yesterday will oppose each other in the town election Oct. 6, when nine directors will be elected. The charter amendment providing for minority representation, would be the third election.

Mayor Harold A. Turkington, who led all other candidates for nomination with 553 votes, was defeated by Harry Fyrite, who came in third with 1,008, and Jacob P. Miller, who ran fourth with 1,008.

State Representative Edward C. Bowers, who ran for nomination with 1,420 votes and who also won re-nomination as representative.

Director Walter T. Mahoney, the only incumbent Democratic director seeking re-nomination, was defeated by Edward C. Bowers, who received 1,558 votes, and Everett Kennedy, who ran fourth with 1,008.

Rockville Call Fire District Meeting On Zoning, Trailer Parks

Rockville, Sept. 10.—(Special)—The Zoning Board of the Vernon Fire District will hold a public hearing today at 8 p. m. at the Vernon Elementary School to take action on several matters relating to the district.

The first item for discussion is the establishment of a commercial zone on Kelly road, on State Route 83 and on parts of State Route 50; also to approve rezoning areas adjacent to railroad lines for commercial purposes.

Other subjects to be brought before the voters are changing of front building lines; reducing building lines on certain properties; and restricting the number of house-trailers in the district, and requiring them to be placed on a certain lot.

The proposed section to be adopted is as follows:

Trailer parks may only be placed on Zone R. The total number of trailers in all parks shall not exceed 200; the owner of each trailer must acquire a permit from the zoning inspector within 48 hours of placing his trailer in a park; a fee of \$2 shall be paid by the applicant; it shall be the duty of park operators to inform trailer owners of regulations; and operators shall promptly notify the inspector of trailer removed from park.

List in Regular Session of the date of the regulations park operator shall be required to file with the zoning inspector with a list showing: Number of trailers in the park; name of all occupants of each trailer; ages of all occupants under 18 years.



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
