## Reds Prepare To Carry Out Peace Session

Some countries, such as Australia and Japan, have forbidden passenger ports to prospective delegates. Plans for this session were cancelled in July, under Soviet guidance, at the conference of the Communist World Council of Peace in Berlin. The opening meeting is a certain ruse to the mighty peace offensive which reaches its climax Dec. 5 in Vienna with a world congress.

There is little doubt that the offensive is tied in with the decision of Moscow to summon an all-union congress of the Soviet Communist party Oct. 5, the first since congress in 13 years. The peace congress all clearly are part of the Soviet grand strategy in the cold war.

The major attack is in Asia. One goal is the expulsion of American influence through damage to American prestige. The ultimate goal is Communist domination of all Asia. But the Communist appetite will not even be satisfied with that. In the future are plans for domination of the Middle East, Africa and South and Central America. This is a long-range program which is underway now among whose aims is the engineering of economic crises in the west, and particularly in the United States. It looks toward cheap Soviet victory.

The theme of the peace congress is cut and dried. It has been decided well in advance, and the dupe present will be led about by the nose by the Communist manipulators of the session. The Communists are going to squeeze out every ounce of propaganda from this effort.

In Moscow, the Soviet Union will use its party congress to announce that the USSR wants only peace and the right to build socialism. There will be a crashing crescendo of Soviet propaganda all through this fall and winter. The West has been warned in time to plan its counter-attack.

addressed initially to British Prime Minister Churchill.

State department officials said there would be quick consultation between British and American leaders who have struggled with the Iranian problem for months, not so much because of the oil dispute itself as because of the strong belief here that unless the dispute is settled the threat of a Communist takeover in Iran is indeed serious.

The principal reason for hope among American experts now is that Mossadegh has not closed the door to a settlement. One informant said "our policy certainly is to keep the door open and we will do all we can to that end and now that he has not closed it."

However, the odds against a settlement still appeared almost overwhelming, particularly because one of Mossadegh's powerful political supporters had already attacked Mossadegh's proposals as too soft and in effect meant a maximum dollar demand on British's slender dollar reserves.

### Coventry Finance Board Approves Budgets of \$414,046

Coventry, Sept. 25.—(Special)—School and selectmen's budgets for 1953-54, totaling \$414,046 have been approved by the Board of Finance, according to a report by Charles E. Nyack, chairman, Wednesday afternoon.

The revised appropriation for school for 1953-54 is \$271,241, or \$40,837 more than the revised appropriation for 1952-53. The actual expense for 1951-52, totaled \$255,371.

Teachers salaries of \$90,400 as compared to \$68,094, in 1951-52 show the largest individual item increase of \$22,306. A transportation item of \$90,900, as compared to \$64,261 of last year, shows an increase of \$26,639.

This increase is broken down to include \$16,000 for tuition, \$5,600 for covered bus transportation and \$5,039 for independent-owned bus transportation.

Another large item in the school budget is payment on notes with interest totaling \$41,042. The principal is \$27,745, interest is \$13,297. The selectmen's budget for 1953-54 is \$142,804, as compared to \$98,184 for 1952-53 against a revised appropriation for 1951-52 of \$153,256.

The general fund revenue for school purposes for the 1953-54 year is estimated at \$46,450, as compared to \$46,200 for 1952-53. The town proper estimated revenue is \$282,596, as compared to \$277,500 actually received in 1952-53. Total estimated revenue is \$329,046, to be raised by taxation in 1953-54 is \$200,041. The amount to be raised last year by taxation when the mill rate was set was \$213,378.

### U. S. Jet Bombers Can Reach Soviet

War II piston-engined fighters to jet planes has reached the point where "practically 100 per cent" of the fighter units are equipped with jet aircraft.

The switch to jet fighters and bombers, Gilpatrick contended, has great advantages in speed and altitude, but has "cost" a heavy price in loss of range. However, he said, the use of tanker planes to refuel fighters and bombers in the air has compensated for some of this.

"We have developed a complex of advance bases—some to the north and west of us, such as Alaska and Okinawa; others in the northeast, such as those in Newfoundland, Greenland and Iceland; and still others overseas in the United Kingdom, North Africa and elsewhere in the Mediterranean area," Gilpatrick said.

"From these advance bases we could, if compelled to by Soviet aggression, make retaliatory counterattacks with jet planes which, even though they have less range than the piston-powered B-29, could reach their targets by virtue of these forward bases."

From Iceland to Britain, one of the major Soviet war goods centers, is about 3,800 miles; from the new American base at Thule, Greenland, to Moscow about 2,600; from the United Kingdom to Moscow about 1,600.

Miss Elma Willis, in the prepared text of his address to the Seattle Chamber of Commerce luncheon honoring the Boeing Airplane Company, made no direct mention of recent criticism by congressional committees of slow production. However, he asserted:

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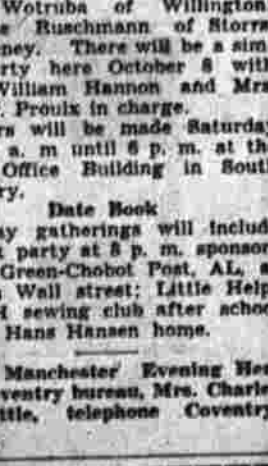

in the end, did have final respon-  
sibility for it.  
In all this, it was not General  
Eisenhower's primary effort to  
protect his own personal prestige  
and right of leadership, although  
that was indeed something of a  
factor. It was his primary effort  
to see that the Nixon case re-  
sulted in a deliberate, and not  
snap judgment on way or the  
other. It was his primary effort  
to convince this nation that the  
case was being seriously con-  
sidered, from a high public policy  
point of view, and not merely the  
level of normal political  
loyalties.  
For trying to follow this course,  
General Eisenhower deserves  
praise by both extremes. But in the  
end, we think it will be judged that  
his personal insistence on due  
deliberation, did more to take the  
political curse of the Nixon af-  
fair than did the latter's tremen-  
dous dramatic performance. In the  
end, we think the American peo-  
ple will conclude that General  
Eisenhower handled the matter as  
it should have been handled, by  
a capable and assuming high  
public responsibility.

The headline text was of Senator Nixon, but the even more important text, since it was a text he quoted and repeated, was the text which said that it drew the same kind of reaction he himself once described, in one of his great speeches, as likely to greet anybody who tried to take the so-called "middle way." His conduct was harshly condemned by both extremes.

**A Timely Favor**  
The Communists have one un-  
failing virtue, from the point of  
view of Western diplomacy. Whenever we have natural trouble-  
making a point, they are likely to  
take over and sell it for us. They  
achieve blunders which are un-  
believably fortunate for us.  
Take, for instance, the visit  
of General Eisenhower to West-  
ern Germany the other day. This was a scheduled propa-  
ganda event which had Western  
German leaders worried, and  
Western foreign offices concerned.  
For it seemed in the cards that  
the Eastern Germans would come  
in carefully disguising the fact  
that they are Communists, care-  
fully refraining from seeming to  
be the puppets of Russia, and it  
seemed that they would be sure  
to try to speak to Germany as  
the German people. For it was  
logical for them to try and tap  
the great reservoir of all German  
resentment, which is toward national  
unity, and then capitalize on it.  
Fortunately for us, they did  
nothing of the kind. Instead, they  
drawing a beautiful picture of what  
German unity would be, they  
described conditions in Eastern  
Germany so frankly that it seemed  
to observers that they had fallen  
under some spell which made  
them think these conditions were  
really wonderful. They were ap-  
parently proud of the fact that  
they themselves had no control  
over the secret police in their  
midst. They were apparently  
proud and pleased of the fact that  
Russia is still holding German  
prisoners of war. They apparent-  
ly thought Western Germany  
would consider it a privilege, once  
Germany was united again, to pay  
reparations to Russia for 12 years.  
In other words, these East Ger-  
mans had apparently become as  
well trained in their role of Rus-  
sian puppets that they no longer  
had the capacity to let the Ger-  
man, even when that was the ob-  
vious propaganda role for them  
to play.  
As a result, the people they  
came to influence and persuade  
united in rejecting their advance,  
and in telling them to their teeth  
that they were not considered true  
German or true representatives  
of the people of Eastern Germany.  
Previously, no amount of West-  
ern diplomacy and argument had  
really been able to convince the  
people of Western Germany that  
German unity was an impossibility  
under present conditions. But  
one visit from the East German  
Communists seems to have accom-  
plished what our diplomacy  
couldn't do.  
This precious capacity the  
Communists have, for being their  
own worst enemies at the very  
moment when they might be ac-  
counted for as a post against us, is  
perhaps the best demonstration of all that  
their creed is a madness under  
which powers of reason and per-  
spective disappear.

(Continued From Page One) possibly can, mistakes are bound to occur and we know that they will.

Referring to charges that some of the signatures on her petition are those of dead people, or non-residents of Connecticut, Miss Kellogg implied that her workers were the only ones who made mistakes.

"If dead people signed those petitions, or if people signed that no longer lived in this state," she declared, "then there is something wrong indeed when the town clerk certified those names."

The clerk of a town which such a petition is circulated must certify it before it is sent along to the secretary of the state.

Miss Kellogg asserted she had more to say about the attack on her petition "at a later date and in court."

Republicans are reported to be considering legal steps to have her removed from the ballot, but no official action has been taken thus far.

Miss Kellogg, a successful assistant for the Republican nomination in 1950, said she had again this year, said the law providing for a place on the ballot by petition was drafted to benefit a person who "wishes to run for public office but cannot receive the nomination from a bona-fide, bona-fide-controlled convention."

"The terms her nomination 'win times more popular than that of Mr. President Bush, the governor of the Manufacturers association in the present Bush, the governor of Wall Street, who went to only a handful of delegates for her nomination."
