

500 Battle 2 Platoons **Of Infantry**

Cheju Island, Korea, Oct. 1 (AP) --- American guards with blazing guns killed 45 Chinese prisoners of war and injured 120 others in quelling a riot today. The POWs were celebrating the third anniversary of China's Communist regime when some fanatics turned the jubilee into an attack on their guards. "The majority of those killed and wounded were shot." said a Prisoner of War Command apokeaman. Two American soldiers were injured slightly. The spokesman said:

"It was really a fight. Due to all the confusion that surrounds an incident like this one, many details are lacking.

500 Fanatics

The 500 fanatical prisoners battled two infantry platoons-about 80 men -with stones, rocks, clubs, tent poles and weapons improvised from materials in their com pound.

From a standpoint of fatalities, today's riot was the second larg-est among. POWs in Kores an-nounced by the Army. Last Feb-ruary, in a similar riot on notor-lous Koje island, 80 prisoners were

Reports Anti-U. S. Feeling Growing in West Europe

Economically most European countries are making progress slong the road to recovery, with conditions better in some countries than in others. Great Britain is perhaps having the hardest strug-gle, with France running a close

For example, it is usual for most pupils to start studying anther language at about the age of 10 or, 11, and frequently your people of 16 or 17 will know two or languages other than their own. Their knowledge of these languages consists not only of a reading and writing knowledge of the language but also the ability to

Little social life is offered connection with the schools, and in most countries pupils attend school six days a week and the hours spent in the classroom are much longer than in the United States. Organized sports are not known in the schools, although they do play some games and do consider-able folk dancing in connection with the physical education pro

gram. Realizing the inadequacy of their preparation scholastically for such a trip, the local Scouts feel that perhaps a happy medium be-tween European and American ways of education would be the proper solution, with perhaps a little more emphasis on scholastic attainments at home and a few extra-curricular activities added to the European school curriculum. The young people in Europe cer-tainly seemed to take their educa-tion far more seriously than do most American young folks, per-haps partly because many of them have to leave school at the age of 15 in order to go to work, and they realize that they must take advantage of what is offered to them when they are younger. Living in the homes of people in the various countries was de in the trip to Europe, which these young people of Manchester took. They saw many beautiful buildings, paintings and scenery; they be-came acquainted with much European history; they learned geo graphy firsthand and they dis covered something of the manipu-lations of finance. But the most important thing in their trip was the people they met, the homes in which they lived, what they think

and what they are.
