FIRST INNING YANKEES
Joe Black hurled the first pitch of the 1952 World Series, to lead-off batter Bauer and it was low and outside for a ball. Bauer fouled off the second pitch, then raised a soft line to Peafly in straight left. Peafly moved to his

Operators See Coal Pay Hike Closing Mines

Washington, Oct. 1—(AP)—For the second straight year John L. Lewis has come up with a wage boost for miners without a strike—but at a price that industry leaders say may force many mines out of business.

Southern coal producers came to terms with the United Mine Workers chief late yesterday, thereby avoiding a threatened walkout today of their 100,000 miners.

The Dixie group agreed to the same terms Lewis had previously negotiated with the rest of the industry—a \$1.90 daily pay increase, plus 10 cents a ton hike in the operator-paid royalty for the union's welfare fund. The daily wage now becomes \$3.25 and the royalty 40 cents a ton.

Higher Costs Predicted

A number of industry leaders said that undoubtedly a number of mines would have to close, rather than try to pay the new costs. These, they said, are the least-mechanized, hand-labor mines where labor cost is relatively greater.

Even union leaders conceded privately some mines would have to close. One union man told a

New Delhi, India, Oct. 1—(AP)—U. S. Ambassador Chester Bowles has accused the Bombay news magazine "Current" of attempting to smear him by publishing a "blatant forgery." He called on the Indian External Affairs Ministry for an investigation.

Bowles charged "Current" published a letter purported to have been written by him to R. K. Karanjia, publisher of the pro-Communist weekly "Hitz."

The purported letter, he says, appears in "Current" states, "I would be eager to meet Mr. Karanjia and his Communist friends at a quiet

McCarthy to Push War On 'Skunks' in Capital

Bridgeport, Oct. 1—(AP)—Senator Joseph McCarthy (R., Wis.), has promised that even more vigor is going into the fight against what he calls "the skunks in Washington." Almost all the Republican bigwigs in Connecticut—officials and candidates—joined McCarthy on the platform here last night as he defended the methods he uses in attacking Communists and left-wingers and pleaded for a Republican victory in November "to save western civilization and America."

Earlier, addressing a crowd of 8,500 at the Danbury Fair, McCarthy predicted the removal of lawmakers who "lack the intelligence to detect those betraying freedom."

Sees Rougher Time

"The fight can't get gentler," said the Wisconsin Senator. "As it gets near the nerve center, it will get rougher and rougher. You ain't seen nothing yet."

A group known as "The Republican Victory Committee," sponsored McCarthy's appearance here. It is not connected with the State Republican organization, but almost every top rank Republican accepted invitations to attend except Governor John Lodge, on a speaking tour to California, and Lieutenant Governor Edward N. Allen, who had another engagement.

The Klein Memorial hall was filled to its 2,200 capacity, and police estimated the number turned away at 500.

In defense of the methods employed in his anti-Communist campaign, McCarthy recalled a boyhood chore of hunting skunks which killed his mother's chickens. "The more success you have hunting skunks, the worse you smell," he said. "Do you want me

Yoshida Wins Support In Free Japan Election

Tokyo, Oct. 1—(AP)—Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida got solid backing as 28 of his supporters, including three cabinet ministers, won Diet (Parliament) seats today in Japan's first completely free election since World War II.

Yoshida's liberal party captured 53 of 80 seats decided in early elections. Of the Liberal party's 16 seats, 16 support Ichiro Hatoyama, former leader of the party who is waging a hot battle to regain control.

Ten of the Liberals who have won are counted as neutral in the Yoshida-Hatoyama fight.

The Communists have failed to win a seat. Left wing Socialists have taken six. Others were scattered.

In his own district, Yoshida seemed certain of keeping his seat. Yoshida's dominant Liberal party was expected to win the greatest number of the 466 parliamentary seats sought by 1,243 candidates.

Battle Within Party

Yoshida's main fight was within his own party. His leadership has been challenged by Ichiro Hatoyama, founder of the Liberals and

Red Parley In China Hit By Acheson

Washington, Oct. 1—(AP)—Secretary of State Acheson today denounced the forthcoming Asian and Pacific peace conference in Peiping as an obvious propaganda operation of the Communists.

He indicated that some of the 15 Americans who are reported attending may be prosecuted on charges of obtaining passports fraudulently.

The Communist-run conference, one of a series, is due to open tomorrow.

Acheson told his news conference that it would deceive nobody. He described it as an obvious propaganda operation, and noted that while the Chinese Reds are sponsoring this they are defying the United Nations, waging war in Korea, and joining with Soviet Russia in a hate America campaign.

About 15 Americans have been identified as attending, Acheson said. He added that none was given a passport to attend or asked for a passport for the purpose. All these documents since May 1 have been stamped "not valid for travel in China."

The State Department, he said, is now making efforts to find out whether any of the delegates obtained passport on false information or violated the instructions barring travel in China. He said appropriate statutes cover both cases.

Denies New Korea Plan

Acheson stressed that the United States has reached no firm decision on what proposals may be submitted at the United Nations General Assembly session opening Oct. 14. He declared that any rumor or report that the government has decided to produce a new plan of any plan to deal with the Korean situation is quite untrue.

UN Plane Toll 30 Last Month In Korean War

Seoul, Korea, Oct. 1—(AP)—The U. S. Air Force today reported 30 Allied planes were lost to all causes in September. But it said only seven of the jet fighters were shot down in the furious air battles which the Communists destroyed the previous one month record for 30 jets downed was 44, set last April.

The announcement came soon after the Allies opened another month of air blows with a massive B-29 attack against a sprawling chemical plant only 400 yards from the Manchurian border. An armada of 48 Superforts dropped about 425 tons of high explosives on the Namsan plant in one of the biggest B-29 raids of the war.

The Air Force said four F-86 Sabre jets and three F-54 Thunderbolts were lost in air battles; five Allied planes lost to Communist ground fire and 18 other warplanes lost to "other causes," which were not reported.

Truman Says Ike GOP Reactionary

Aboard Truman Train, Oct. 1—(AP)—President Truman, dedicating the \$108,000,000 Hungry Horse dam, today accused Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower of turning against such projects after learning "the Republican party line." Truman said the Republican presidential nominee is talking "like one of the lobbyists for the private power monopolies" and if he is elected, "it will be a long time before you see another structure of this kind."

It was another speech in the President's coolly-calculated attempt to "destroy Eisenhower's prestige in a 'give 'em hell' campaign tour from coast to coast." Truman is working the role of the Democratic party's "hatchet man"—as the GOP labeled him—with the calm and reluctance assurance of a veteran campaigner going about his familiar work.

Leaving his campaign train at Columbia Falls, Mont., he viewed the dam and drove on to Kalispell for a dedicatory speech in the high school gymnasium.

All of you who are here today had better go over and take another look at this dam, because if the Republicans win this election, it will be a long time before you see another structure of this kind," Truman said.

The Republican candidate for President made it perfectly plain in a speech in Boise, Idaho, a few weeks ago that he was against dams like this," the President added.

And he said Eisenhower now accepts the "good view" that dams like Hungry Horse, and government transmission lines, and low-cost public power, are part of the "creeping socialism" of which—as Truman said it—the slogan writers for the power monopolists talk.

Eisenhower, Truman said, "has adopted the line of the private power monopoly."

Cites the Change

The President cited that he said "I have a perfect right to say that by the general after he became the GOP nominee. He said Eisenhower, visiting the Boulder Dam last June, learned it was self-liquidating, and declared: 'Here we have a perfect example of doing something for the people and doing it intelligently.'"

It was after "many men" visited Eisenhower at Denver, following his nomination today, that he declared that the general changed his tune.

He quoted Eisenhower as saying at Boise this country has a government monopoly.

Will Push Red Issue

The Illinois governor was busy, among other things, on a speech for next week to be built almost entirely on the explosive Communist issue.

At the same time, he took steps to head off any exploitation by the Republican rival, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, of Gen. Walter Bedell Smith's statement that Smith believed Eisenhower would cooperate with Democrats and make them "real partners" in working out basic foreign policies.

Eisenhower gave this declaration in a speech at Flint, Mich., as he carried his time-for-a-change campaign westward on a 28-state drive that could make or break his presidential hopes.

Optimism was running high on this push through Michigan into states that will have 361 electoral votes out of the 531 total—or more than enough to swing the election in his favor if he can carry them.

Frauds Vandenberg

The GOP presidential nominee chose Flint as the point to give high praise to the late Republican Sen. Arthur Vandenberg, Sr., of Michigan, who was a strong opponent of a bi-partisan foreign policy.

He said Vandenberg saw that no nation, no matter how strong, could win security by its own efforts alone and that collective security meant "enlightened self-interest."

The fervor of his faith, Eisenhower said, "was so contagious that he ended once and for all the old American belief in isolationism."

Eisenhower charged that Democratic presidential nominee Adlai Stevenson had failed to give Vandenberg and the Republican party credit for the part they played in a bi-partisan foreign policy.

"What might be said in truth," he said, "is that... the bi-partisan approach to which Senator Vandenberg was dedicated is being crushed by the abuse to which the party in power and its leaders are subjecting it."

"It is not possible to have continuing cooperation on the administration basis of heads they add and tails the Republicans lose. That is the way bi-partisanism works today. The Democrats claim all the credit for its good fruits and blame the Republicans for its bad fruits."

Eisenhower said the Republican party platform gives "complete support and endorsement" to foreign policies which have been worked out on a bi-partisan basis. He added: "It attacks and criticizes only where there has been such cooperation, as in relations

Assails Choice of Vanech To Justice Department Post

Washington, Oct. 1—(AP)—House investigators said today that former Atty.-Gen. J. Howard McGrath showed "no enthusiasm" for a Justice department clean-up rather, he "appeared to wish to delay and frustrate investigation."

From their findings, investigators said, it appears clear that the Justice department under McGrath wanted to prevent an examination of its files for reasons which "cannot but arouse suspicion."

He made "inappropriate appointments to high office," specifically the appointment of A. Devitt Vanech as deputy Attorney General. Vanech, investigators said, had made "improper" repre-

sentations to gain admittance to practice before the Tennessee and U.S. bar.

Vanech was shown by investigators to have failed the District of Columbia bar examinations three times and the Virginia bar examination once before being admitted to the Tennessee bar as a non-resident.

500 Battle 2 Platoons Of Infantry

Cheju Island, Korea, Oct. 1—(AP)—American guards with blazing guns killed 45 Chinese prisoners of war and injured 120 others in quelling a riot today. The POWs were celebrating the third anniversary of China's Communist regime when some fanatics turned the jubilee into an attack on their guards.

"The majority of those killed and wounded were shot," said a Prisoner of War Command spokesman.

Two American soldiers were injured slightly.

The spokesman said: "It was really a tight. Due to all the confusion that surrounds an incident like this one, many details are lacking."

500 Fanatics

The 500 fanatical prisoners battled two infantry platoons—about 80 men—with stones, rocks, clubs, tent poles and weapons improvised from materials in their compound.

From a standpoint of fatalities, today's riot was the second largest among POWs in Korea—announced by the Army last February, in a similar riot on notorious Koje Island, 80 prisoners were killed.

About 6,400 hard core Chinese Communists are quartered in various camps around Cheju City on the island south of Pusan. Also on Cheju are about 13,800 Chinese captives who have said they would resist repatriation to Communist China.

Relatively minor incidents have plagued the POW command since the Allied crackdown on Koje last summer.

Full-Scale Riot

Today's fighting was a full-scale riot, the Army said, with the prisoners "reverting to former patterns of violence."

The Army said the commander of the Cheju camp yesterday issued an order against prisoner demonstrations. Presumably he had anticipated trouble on the Red anniversary.

American guards went to the compound and singing, but found the prisoners had put up improvised Communist flags in the compound.

The guards called the camp commander and he "issued orders for loudspeakers that if the demonstration was not stopped, force would be used to effect compliance."

Refuse Orders

"The POWs refused to obey this lawful order of the camp commander and two platoons of U.S. infantry entered the compound to restore order."

The presentations were made in behalf of the Manchester Council of Churches. Rev. Clifford B. Johnson, pastor of the First Baptist Church, presented the Bible to Mr. Perrett. Rev. Edgar's remarks on the significance of the new translation of the Bible follow in part:

"Through the ages, God's word has been brought to men in the languages of their times—Hebrew, Greek, Latin, Middle English—and now at long last the people of our generation are to have the word of life in the living language of our day. The completion of the great task of translating the Bible for our day is hailed in many quarters as the greatest Bible news in 341 years.

A Need Revealed

"There have been many translations of the Bible, among which are the King James and the American Standard Versions. Modern scholars, however, in studying these various translations, as well as the manuscripts from which they came, have discovered errors and inaccuracies in the most widely used translations. This error revealed the need for a new translation of the Bible that would combine accuracy with the simplicity and the directness and authority of the King James Version—a Bible written in language direct, clear and meaningful to people of today. The Revised Standard Version was conceived in all that need.

"Today, in some 3,000 communities across America, there will be solemn assemblies such as this in recognition of the great event."

Red Parley In China Hit By Acheson

(Continued from Page One)
Published reports from the UN today said the U. S. has drawn up a resolution calling on the Chinese Reds and North Koreans to end the Korean fighting on the basis of terms submitted by the UN Command, Acheson, in response to questions, refrained from a denial that the draft of such a resolution has been circulated among friendly UN delegations.

The Secretary's explanation was that in preparing for the session the U. S. has been consulting with other members on what action might be taken in various contingencies and added that nothing has been decided.

What happens in the UN will be very largely affected by what happens in the true negotiations, he went on. Only the Communists can say whether they accept the latest proposals for breaking the Korean deadlock. These offered alternative ways out of the dispute over forcibly repatriating prisoners. They were submitted Sunday and the Communists have 10 days to respond.

On other matters, Acheson said the North Atlantic treaty alliance will realize its goals although a deal remains to be done. Asked about criticism of French "re-tape" by General Matthew J. Ridgway, NATO commander, Acheson said that great deal has been done in France and elsewhere in building up defenses, though much remains to be done. He said there is a natural tendency among those trying to bring the Reds down to be impatient.

He declared that Soviet Russia in boycotting a Big Four meeting to continue work on an Austria treaty provided additional proof that Moscow does not want a treaty for restoring Austrian independence. He restated the American view that the Arab nations should be consulted before final plans crystallize for the new Middle East Command.

Acheson said again that the United States, Australia and New Zealand consider it premature to bring other countries into the new Pacific alliance at the same time he said new arrangements had been made to keep Britain and other countries with specific interests informed about the progress. Britain has been pressing vainly to be represented at the current Australian-New Zealand-U. S. council meeting at Honolulu.

Orange Cranberry Rice Bowl

Remove from heat, let stand for another 15 minutes until covered. Add sugar and grated orange peel. Cool. When completely cold, fold in whipped cream. To make filling, mix coarsely chopped unpeeled orange with whole cranberry sauce. In your favorite glass bowl, alternate layers of orange-rice with filling, beginning and ending with rice layer. Chill. Serve with additional whipped cream if desired. Makes 8 servings.

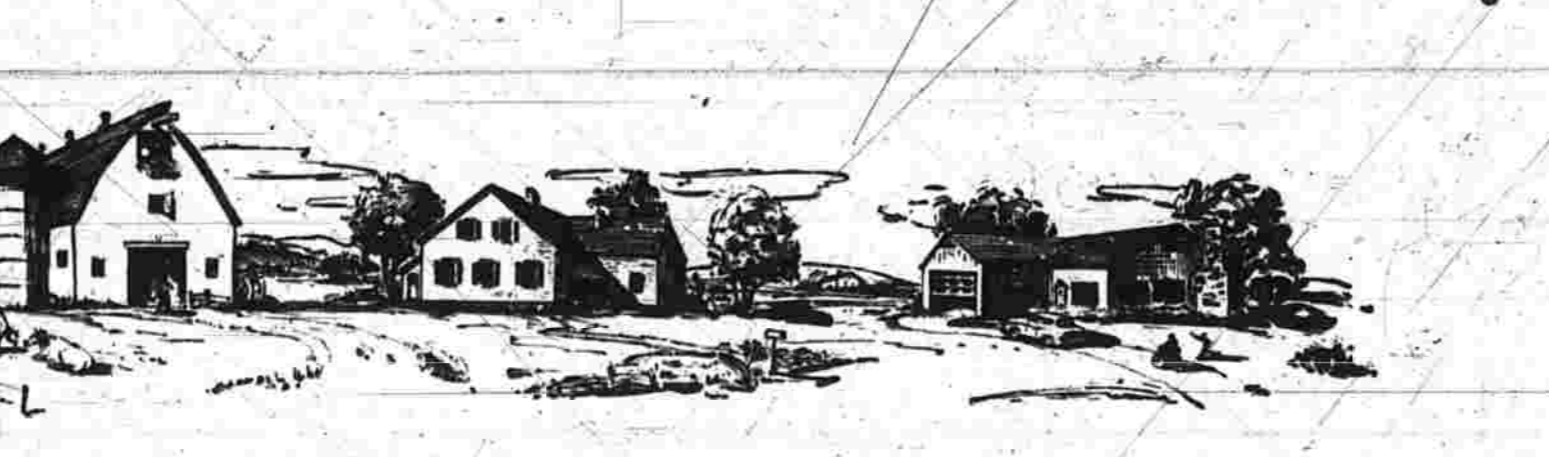

2. The adoption of a merit system whereby employment and promotion are made fairly and justly without regard to favoritism or without thought of political gain.
3. We recommend the establishment of a long term capital improvements plan for the Town of Manchester. Many tax dollars have been wasted by the lack of such a long range program. We must build needed facilities, sidewalks and curbs, off-street parking lots, and many other essential improvements. All these things can be done more intelligently and more economically if we have a master plan.
4. It is evident that the economic growth of the Town of Manchester has not kept pace with the residential growth. We blame this on the lack of foresight on the part of and lack of co-ordination between the Town Planning Commission, the Zoning Board of Appeals, the Town Development Commission, and the Republican-dominated Board of Directors. We promote immediate and positive action along these lines in order to keep the tax rate from soaring further.
5. We recommend that a separate bi-partisan Water Commission be established to do the work now done by the Board of Directors sitting as a Water Commission. The rapid growth of our town requires constant planning and supervision of the water and sewerage system.
6. We favor an immediate investigation of the water situation in the North End of town with a view toward ultimate acquisition of the Manchester Water Company by the town.
7. We believe that it would be in the best interest of the taxpayers if the town auditor were appointed so that no firm would serve more than four consecutive years.
8. We propose to set a tax rate which will be sufficient to pay only necessary expenditures. Last year's inflated tax rate cost each taxpayer \$1.00 extra for each \$1,000.00 assessment.
9. We believe that the rapidly increasing voting registration requires:
 - a. More polling places which are more conveniently located.
 - b. A full time employee in the Registrars of Voters' office to provide continuous service to the public.
 - c. We advocate placing the office of Town Clerk on a salary basis instead of the present outmoded fee system. The town treasury should be the beneficiary of our business.
