Morescombe, Eng., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Labor party leader Clement Attlee's moderate forces today beat back a strong attempt by Aneurin Bevan's left wingers to commit the party to demands for new cuts in rearmament spending.

The party's annual convention threw out a resolution put up by a Bevanite outfit—the Union of Shop, Distributive and Allied Workers—calling for reduction of the arms program so that Britain can spend the money to produce more exports and increase social services.

Denies TV, Radio Plan To Aid Ike

New York, Oct. 2.—(AP)—The Citizens for Eisenhower organization said today it does not plan an intensive radio-television campaign to beam the Republican presidential candidate into as many American homes as possible.

Frank C. Hilton, Veterans division chairman of the Republican National Committee, contended in a statement today: "Unless there is a change in the national administration, the Veterans administration will continue to grow worse."

Hilton said that Democrats and Republicans are uncovering instances in which the VA is "squandering millions of dollars."

With educational benefits now extended to Korean veterans, Hilton said, "there are further opportunities to repeat the known overpayment of approximately 100 million dollars for training."

The Veterans administration allowed the waste of tens of millions of dollars for supplies, he said. "Additional tens of millions were wasted on worthless training courses."

Strike Ties 12 Rails in Kansas City

Kansas City, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Operations at the Kansas City railroad terminal, vital Midwest junction were crippled today by a sudden switchmen's strike.

Freight trains were halted on 12 trunk lines. Supervisory personnel of the Kansas City Terminal Railway Company were attempting to move passenger and mail trains.

Terminal employees operate all trains while they are on terminal property.

Bill Allen, vice-chairman of the Switchmen of North America, Lodge No. 102, said locomotive engineers and firemen were observing the picket lines.

The switchmen went on strike unexpectedly at 8 a. m. (east) just before the heavy passenger train movement through the yards.

Allen said the major issue was what he termed the refusal of the company to honor provisions of a contract calling for payment of time and a half for extra men called back for a second tour of duty within 2 1/2 hours of the start of their original tour.

By EDDY GILMORE Moscow, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Prime Minister Stalin said today it is more probable that capitalist nations will go to war than that there will be a war involving the Soviet Union.

Stalin expressed his views in a 50-page article (probably 23,000 words) in the magazine Bolshhevik. He spoke on the eve of the Communist Party Congress, meeting here Sunday for the first time since 1939.

Stalin told his fellow Communists that Japan and western Europe will not necessarily remain obedient to the United States, as he put it.

Mayor Opens Fund Drive To Aid Building of Pool

The William Horowitz Foundation was founded to benefit charitable, educational, religious, philanthropic, literary, scientific, recreational, cultural, benevolent and artistic causes of a local, sectional or national scope or character.

The foundation has presented to the City of Rockville \$20,000 for the purpose of establishing a swimming pool to be built in Henry Park in the name of the William Horowitz Foundation.

Long before his death last May 4, Mr. Horowitz dreamed of providing such a swimming pool facility for the city. Following his death, the trustees of the foundation, Mrs. William Horowitz, Benjamin Horowitz, Abraham L. Brooks, and Nat N. Schwedel, through an intermediary, offered the city the beginning of a fund of approximately \$20,000 for the proposed swimming pool. The city government accepted the donation and will assume the maintenance of the project following its completion.

The drive for public subscription officially opened today when Mayor Fred Berger made the following announcement:

Mayor Berger's Message

"As mayor of the City of Rockville, I consider it a distinct honor to officially open the drive for contributions to the William Horowitz Memorial Swimming Pool and Field House to be located in Henry Park.

"I urge the people of the community to lend their support to this worthwhile project.

"Mr. Horowitz was a generous



supporter of many charities and a firm believer in Rockville and its future. His fondest hope was a swimming pool for the children of Rockville. His untimely passing cast short those hopes, but today the trustees of the William Horowitz Foundation are spearheading this drive so that the hopes and dreams of Bill Horowitz may become a reality.

The foundation is making a substantial contribution to start the fund and the trustees are giving generously of their time and talents.

"May I again urge all organizations and every individual to support this drive so that the William Horowitz Memorial Pool and Field House will be a real community accomplishment."

Advisory Committee

An advisory committee will work with the trustees of the foundation and city officials in completing the plans for the project. This committee will be composed of citizens from all walks of life and Oct. 20 has tentatively been set for the first meeting of the advisory committee. Scheduled acting for the trustees, has an announcement that the swimming pool field house will measure 84 by 21 feet, with a stable wading pool among the principal features of the project.

It is planned to have the wading pool ready for use next summer and it is hoped that dedication exercises can be held on May 4, the first anniversary of the death of Mr. Horowitz. A sum of \$35,102.00 has already been subscribed or pledged.

Contributions Are Sought

A boy's pay (or as little as 1/4 of 1% of annual earnings) from each person living in Rockville, who has an income will bring in enough funds to complete the swimming pool at Henry Park.

All funds needed in excess of the building requirements will be turned over to the City of Rockville for maintenance purposes.

Any organization or individual whose contribution is \$1,000 or more will be honored by listing on a suitable plaque in the building.

Any individual making a contribution may designate the name of the organization he wishes to have credited towards such honor listing.

S. Coventry G.I. Hurt in Korea; Is Hospitalized

Coventry, Oct. 2 (Special)—A South Coventry soldier has made light of wounds recently received in combat while in Korea. Mr. and Mrs. Philip Giglio were told by their son Corporal Lester G. Giglio, 21, "that others were hurt far worse than I."

The message was contained in a letter written for the combat engineer by a Swedish nurse at a hospital in South Korea. The letter did not elaborate on the extent of his wounds or how they were received. Apparently he had written that his company had been bombed and many of his companions were killed in an enemy raid. Giglio was unhurt at that time.

He has been in Korea more than a year and is assigned to Company B, 11th Engineers (Combat) Battalion, APO 301, San Francisco. His letter revealed that he expected a transfer to a Japanese base hospital soon.
