# Match the Candidates and Their Jobs, Then Vote for the Ones Best Qualified

The League of Women Voters of Manchester has compiled a list of the elective offices of the Town of Manchester and the duties of these offices. These offices will be filled by citizen vote in the town elections on Monday, Oct. 6 (The first Monday in October in even numbered years).

Biographies of the candidates for various offices have been appearing in this Herald. The League has expressed the opinion that every citizen will want to compare duties with biographies and decide for himself whether or not he is electing the best man for the job, regardless of party affiliation.

Under the Town Charter of Manchester adopted by the referendum of the people in 1947, the town has executive, legislative and judicial officers, some appointed and some elected. The executive official, the General Manager, is appointed by the Board of Directors for an indefinite term. The Board of Directors is the chief legislative body— all nine members are elected every two years. Manchester has minority representation on its Board of Directors. Each party nominates its candidates at its primary election, making a total of 12 candidates. Then in the October election, each voter casts his vote for six candidates. The nine candidates receiving the highest number of votes are elected. Three representatives of the minority party will be represented on the Board.

The chairman of the Board of Directors and the secretary are in that capacity as an official of the town. The chairman is the mayor of the town and serves as secretary of the board each receive \$300 per year while the other directors each receive \$200 per year. The Board of Directors exercises all the legislative powers of the town (unless otherwise specifically stated in the charter). The General Manager, Board of Assessors, Planning Commission, Zoning Board of Appeals, Board of Tax Review, Auditor, Finance and Advisory Board of Health, and the Honorary Authority.

The Board also acts separately as a Board of Water Commissioners and may make, alter, or repeal laws or ordinances. It may fill a vacancy in any elective town office, except the Board of Education rate and decides on salaries for town employees. It acts as trustee of all bonds and may levy special taxes.

The time and date of meetings of the Board of Directors must be published in advance and all meetings are open to the public. If citizens are dissatisfied with any action of their board, they have recourse to petitions of referendum.

Town Clerk The Town Clerk also elected biennially, records vital statistics, some business transactions, property transfers, mortgages and other documents. He issues dog licenses, hunting and fishing licenses, etc. on the amount of fees collected. His fees are based on standards set by state law. The office staff is also paid from these fees.

The duties of the Town Treasurer are to have custody of and to disburse town funds belonging to the town and to deposit them in banks on a true and correct account as required by the Board of Directors. He keeps books and records as prescribed by the Board of Directors, and his signature must appear on all payments from town funds. His salary is \$1,000 per year.

Three Selectmen are elected annually from the registry list and to exercise the powers of the office of selectmen. Their powers are to serve legal papers and to make attachments. They may make arrests for violation of criminal laws.

Board of Education The Board of Education consists of nine members, but only six are elected at each biennial election. Three are elected to serve for a term of three years beginning the following November, and three members are elected to serve a term of three years in the year of their election, and three members are elected to serve a term of three years beginning the following November. Minority representation on the Board of Education is required by state law. Of the three elected for any year, only two can be voted for in one political party; thus insuring that both parties will be represented on the board. This system is set up on the ballot in such a way that the voter has no difficulty in determining the number of candidates for whom he may vote.

The duties of the Board of Education are to submit the school budget to the General Manager, to appoint the superintendent of schools, principals and teachers and to remove them for just cause. The board establishes salaries for all school personnel, reviews complaints on school matters and establishes the school curriculum based on requirements and recommendations of the State Board of Education. It receives no fees for its services.

There are seven justices of the peace elected for the two year term. They may marry persons who are legally married and have no power as a notary public to take acknowledgments of legal documents.

Under the judicial branch of our government is the Judge of Probate who is elected on the first Tuesday in November, every four years. His office does not come up for vote until he has jurisdiction over settlement of estates of deceased persons and the estates of minors and incompetents. He has power to remove admissions and commitments in all persons.

Voters are reminded that this is their last only of those officials elected by the public. There are also a great many administrative positions and boards which are appointed by the Board of Directors and the General Manager.

# Town Safest For Traffic

Largest in State Without Deaths Recorded So Far This Year

Manchester is the largest town in Connecticut that has had no traffic deaths so far this year, according to information released by the Connecticut Safety Commission.

The town's last traffic death was caused 238 days ago, Nov. 1, 1951, the report points out. Fifteen traffic deaths reported by the Department of Motor Vehicles for September represent, according to the Connecticut Safety Commission, second lowest September toll in years resulting in a nine-month record with 177, same period last year. Decrease of 26 cases, or about 15 per cent, retains Connecticut on declining list of states created by National Safety Council with fewest September fatalities for 1952 than any state.

Most September fatalities were charged smaller towns. Hartford, Waterbury, Stamford, Norwich and Danbury were only towns of more than 10,000 population on traffic death list.

**What, No Platform?**  
 We note, as the short campaign between the town election and Monday opens, one of those advertisements which features the so-called "deadly parallel" between the Republican Party and the Democratic Party. The advertisement is a document called the "Republican Platform." Opposite there is a blank space for the Republican Platform ought to be, but it isn't.  
 The Republican Party didn't, it seems to us, draw up a proper series of paper promises. The Republican Party, this Democratic advertisement would seem to allege, has no platform. It stands for nothing. That, at least, is what the "deadly parallel" is established.  
 Our answer is simple, and it is, we think, a little "deadly" too, as political arguments go.  
 The Republican party in Manchester has a platform which is not in writing, but in brick. It is not paper, but in brick and mortar and wood and stone. It does not come out of any group of heads sitting down at campaign time to devise promises which might be popular, but out of the cooperative effort of Manchester people themselves over a very long span of years.  
 The Republican party platform in Manchester is that.  
 In this, we make no excessive claim of virtue or efficiency for the Republican party in Manchester. Sometimes it has been able to lead the people. Sometimes it has merely carried out wishes the people themselves have formulated. Sometimes it has been bold with progressive innovations. Sometimes it has had to be pushed a little. There have been times when it has made mistakes.  
 But even the mistakes have been mistakes of responsibility. And responsibility is what the Republican party has had all through the long history of self-government in Manchester. As a leader, as a servant, as the legislative power, as the executive power, as a formulator of policy, it has been the Republican party which has held responsible throughout the long process by which Manchester has become what it is today.  
 To have had responsibility is not to claim credit for everything that has happened to Manchester. As we said before, the development of Manchester has resulted from the cooperative effort of Manchester people themselves over a long span of years. It is that which the Republican party principally belongs. But the Republican party has been the executive agent for this cooperative effort.  
 And it has had to play this role satisfactorily, or it would have been rejected and discarded long before this, and its own best interests would have deserted, temporarily, to some other political standard in order to bring about a change.  
 But the years have gone on, and those citizens with the best and highest interests of the town at heart have never found it necessary to cease being Republicans. One minor reason for this, incidentally, is that there are sometimes factions within the Republican party, which act to stimulate and correct and chastise the other, and thus keep the party healthy.  
 All this is perhaps a curious kind of campaign argument to make before a town election. But after all, the main truth about politics in Manchester, the Republican party platform, is all about us. It is everything that is our Manchester living, in our standing and reputation as a town, in our services to ourselves and to strangers, to our

The inevitable course of Japanese politics and the election just held constitutes the first tentative step in that direction.

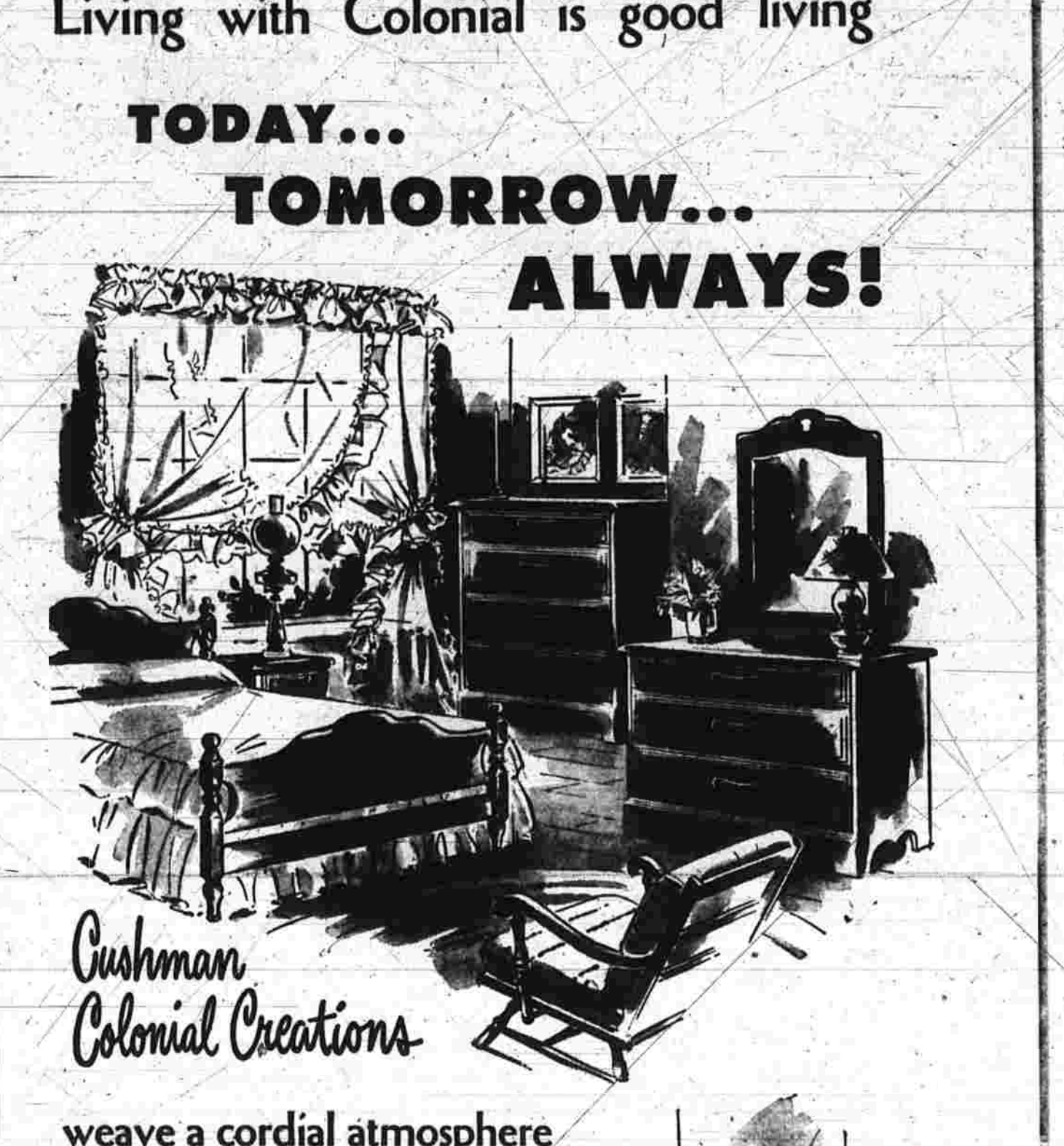
