U.S. Studies Plan to End UN Blocks

The State Department is studying a proposal to break a long deadlock with Soviet Russia by offering to lower the bars on admission of new members to the United Nations.

This developed today from a background conference in which department officials and representatives of several score civic and other organizations exchanged views on UN problems. Officials said a general readiness is being made in the hope of ending the East-West deadlock which has blocked admission of any new UN members for the past two years.

The idea of making UN membership virtually universal was met with the amendment of article four of the charter and admitting applicant states on a non-voting basis, provided they are not complete allies and are not actively fighting the UN.

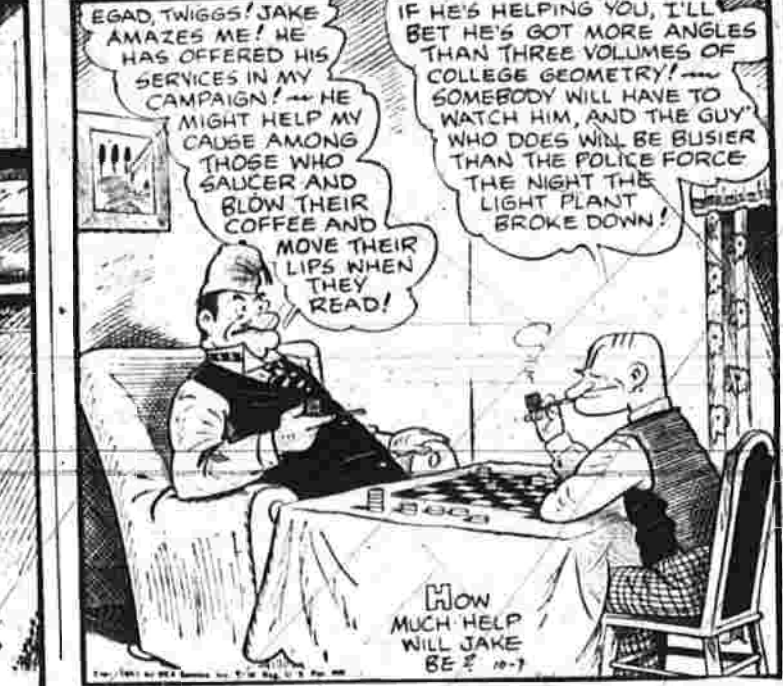

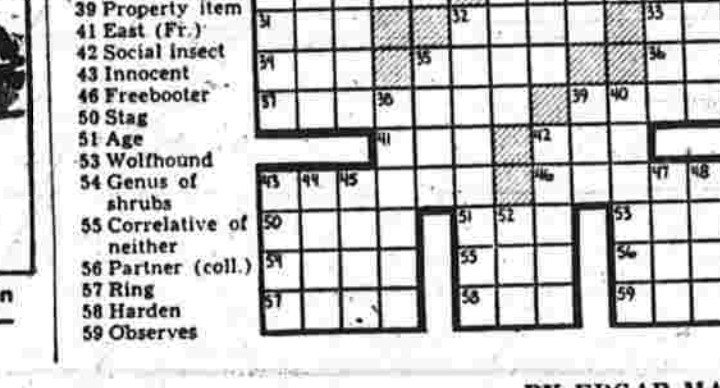

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Bar Resident Use In Industry Zone

The Town Planning Commission has amended the zoning regulations to forbid all future residential uses in industrial zones. The change becomes effective tomorrow.

Up to now the regulations have forbidden only residence use for more than one family in a building used for an industrial purpose, but permitted all other residence uses.

Existing residence uses will be permitted to continue and will continue as non-conforming uses unless they involve buildings assessed at less than \$1,000 in which case they will be discontinued within five years after the zoning regulations provide.

In addition to forbidding ordinary residence uses, the new regulation will also mean that an applicant for a certificate in an industrial building will have to seek an exception from the Zoning Board of Appeals.
