### Standardization Cuts Plane Cost

New York—Standardization of service specifications for the aircraft industry has resulted in savings of millions of dollars for the taxpayer, says the Aircraft Industries Association.

During the past four years, 251 drawings have standardized 18,410 hardware parts for aircraft engines and propellers alone. A typical saving, the association says, is that of an engine bolt and nut which cost \$2.68 before standardization. Now it costs \$1.

### Directors to Consider Extending Purnell Pl.

#### Plan Would Push Wider Street to Birch from Oak; Martin Asked to Appoint 3 Appraisers

A plan to alleviate traffic congestion on Main street by widening Purnell place and extending it north to Birch street—a plan which merchants in that area have been urging on the town for a long time—may be one step nearer realization as a result of action taken by the Board of Directors last night.

The board directed General Manager Richard Martin to appoint three appraisers to determine the fair market value of property on Oak and Birch streets which would be needed if the plan were adopted.

The directors took the action after George Marlow, who was representing merchants in the area, and who has advocated the plan before the board many times in the past, discussed it with them again last night. Present proposed plans call for widening the narrow street, which follows an L-shaped path between Main street and Oak street, to 38 feet and making it two-way all the way from Oak through to Birch street.

Marlow said this property, which is owned by Adolph Barreza, and which is located at 18 and 20 Birch street, has been assessed for \$5,000, but that the owner has asked as much as \$50,000 for it since he has been approached by advocates of the plan to widen Purnell place.

Barreza's property includes a house and tavern. The price of the property on Oak street, owned by Fiorentino Zanzingo, has been quoted by the owner at \$100,000, although it has been assessed at \$12,000. Marlow said this property, located on the north side of Oak street at Purnell place, includes a barber shop, a shoe repair shop, a auto shop and a liquor store.

Should the town decide to go ahead with this project, therefore, it might have to go to condemnation proceedings to get the property if it needs.

Marlow said the plan presents two immediate advantages to the town as well as benefiting the establishments in the area, which he said are assessed at \$8,000,000. A two-way street between Oak and Birch streets would, he said, give the town another through street in a highly concentrated area. It would also, he pointed out, serve needed fire-fighting function, since fire trucks have had a difficult time in the past getting to fires in the rear of the Main street establishment.

Two Parking Lots  
At present, two parking lots are along the route of the proposed extended and widened Purnell place. There is a privately owned lot, with a 400-car capacity, and one owned by the town capable of handling about 60 cars. Marlow said motorists now wanting to use the lots at busy times of the day find it difficult to get down Purnell place to them.

### Approve Bond For Officials

The Board of Directors last night confirmed a vote approving a \$75,000 bond for the collector of revenue, whose bid bond expired yesterday, and approved another \$75,000 bond for the town treasurer, whose bond will come due next month.

Martin said he had received five letters of approval of the collector's bond in the mail, a method he used to give himself some authorization for having a new bond drawn. The urgency was dictated by the fact that Collector of Revenue Paul Cervino's bond had expired.

Two weeks ago the board was unable to get together on a competitive bidding on a new amount of bond to be set for the two officers. At last last night, however, the board recommended a bond of \$50,000, but the opposition of Director J. H. Hathaway, who felt the bond should be set at \$75,000, prevailed. The award was made at the recommendation of state officials, at a meeting when only six directors were present. It was enough to defeat the motion made for \$50,000 bonds.

The amount of bond recommended by state officials, however, was \$100,000, but the board was willing last night to go along with Mayor's new recommendation. He said most municipalities in the state set a \$75,000 bond.

The premium on a bond of this size, which is paid by the town, comes to \$600.

The new bonds mark the first time in 16 years that the amount of the bond for the collector of revenue and the treasurer has been raised from \$50,000.
