Instead of granting pipeline certificates to both companies, Northeastern was denied the right to appear in subsequent hearings on Algonquin's case and immediately appealed the FPC decision to the Philadelphia court which last March reversed the FPC ruling on the ground that it had been wrong in denying Northeastern's appearance at the hearing.

This reversal was said to have left Algonquin without a certificate of public convenience and necessity, but the company appealing to the U. S. Supreme Court continued construction of its pipeline.

Monday's action by the Supreme Court was said to have left Algonquin in the same status it was placed by the Philadelphia court's decision.

Harold E. Willey, clerk of the Supreme Court said in Washington last night that Algonquin will have to obtain a stay of execution "of some sort" in order to continue operation.

Beale said this action would be taken "within a few days."

White Plains, N. Y., Oct. 15.—Three lawyers today prepared show cause orders to dismiss continuation proceedings brought by the Algonquin Gas Transmission Company for a gas pipeline across northern Westchester County into New England.

stormed back to the top of Triangle just before noon.

Allied warplanes pounded the Reds with bombs, rockets and flaming gasoline.

Early morning fog provided a swirling mantle of protection as the attacking doughboys scrambled up the steep, sandy slopes of the Chinese outpost.

Allied tanks and artillery roared in support. But the fog cut down the usually savage Chinese mortar fire.

An Allied officer at the front said the American casualties were much lighter than yesterday. In Tuesday's opening battle, the city reached the crest, only to be hurried back by counterattacking Chinese.

Once atop the crest today, American mortar crews lobbed smoke shells into the valley just to the north. These cut down visibility of Chinese artillery spotters on towering Papsan mountain.

On White Horse mountain, South Korean engineers tunneled under the last three Chinese positions. They planted stacks of land mines, then withdrew.

The mines exploded with a deafening roar and the whole mountain shuddered.

"It just about blew the top off the mountain," said Colonel Lim, the South Korean regimental commander.

While the Chinese still were hunched, South Korean infantrymen charged with barred bayonets. They captured the first knob easily, the second after four hours, and the third and last after a two-hour fight.

Chinese dead and wounded littered the slopes.

This officer told reporters that Attorney Gen. James P. McGrath had another of a series of long distance telephone conversations with Doyle late yesterday, in which Doyle, on his own initiative, asked to be relieved of his duties "in the best interests of the government and the Justice department," pending completion of dual investigations by the department and the Internal Revenue bureau.

The Attorney General said only "the department has acceded to Mr. Doyle's request and has relieved him."

In its weekly morbidity reports the State Health department once again goes into the subject of the much disputed bird with an article entitled "Lost A. Possible Carrier of Disease."

The bulletin distributed to medical men continues: "The newspaper article you have seen recently headed 'Lost A. Parakeet' should be entitled as above. These birds, charming little pets though they may be, carry the virus of the disease psittacosis or parrot fever."

"Twelve out of 20 parakeets examined in Connecticut this year were found to carry the virus. Anyone feeding them may expose himself to the disease. If a parakeet is seen in your vicinity, notify your health officer or police. Take up chances yourself."
