The New York Speech

Whether General Eisenhower's attempt to build a successful campaign structure on a sectional division of his own natural views will have worked, could be seen day in the sections to which he has appealed, we do not pretend to know. In any event, it is heartening to find the candidate clearly coming back to himself, as he did in his speech at the New York A. Smith memorial dinner Thursday night.

Up To The President

The only friends Ebel and Julius Rosenberg have are the wrong friends—the very Communists and fellow travelers whose attempted intervention for them merely increases the public hardness of mind toward them.

Against such considerations there are various factors at work in the national mind. These two individuals still talk—even when proclaiming their innocence—as if they were sound body and soul to the cause they were serving in their treason. There very little that is humanly appealing about them as individuals, unless one goes far beneath appearance in the quest of that portion of their character which has some place.

It is interesting to note that, at least for a few days this week, the jumble that is world politics got top billing in this country's newspapers, over the jumble that is American politics.

Perhaps it merely was that the fourth estate was bored—and bored people might be bored—with the more and more meaningless sound and fury of the presidential campaign. Perhaps it was merely because the United Nations offers a new kind of head-batter that it won sudden prominence.

But perhaps, as well, there was an element of realism in it—a realization that, after all, what goes on in the United Nations is the world politics, may actually have more to do with our own very day fate than any of the very absorbing presidential choice in which we are engaged.

Two things, at least, seem to be the main reason why the United Nations is so interesting to us. First, these are the first peace-time spies in our history who are under sentence of death. Second, the state which retains the atomic secrets for them, and who turned against them to tell the story which convicted them, is merely serving a prison term.

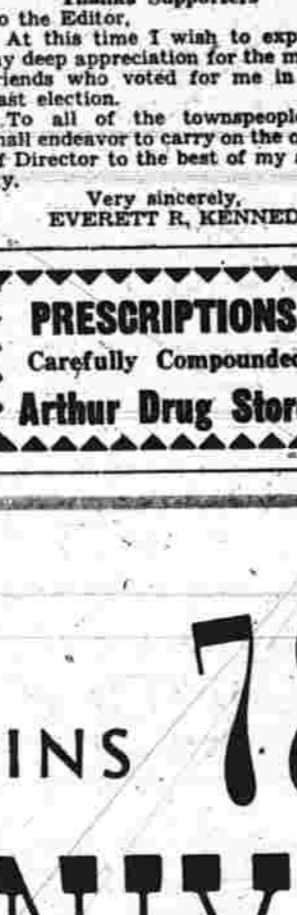

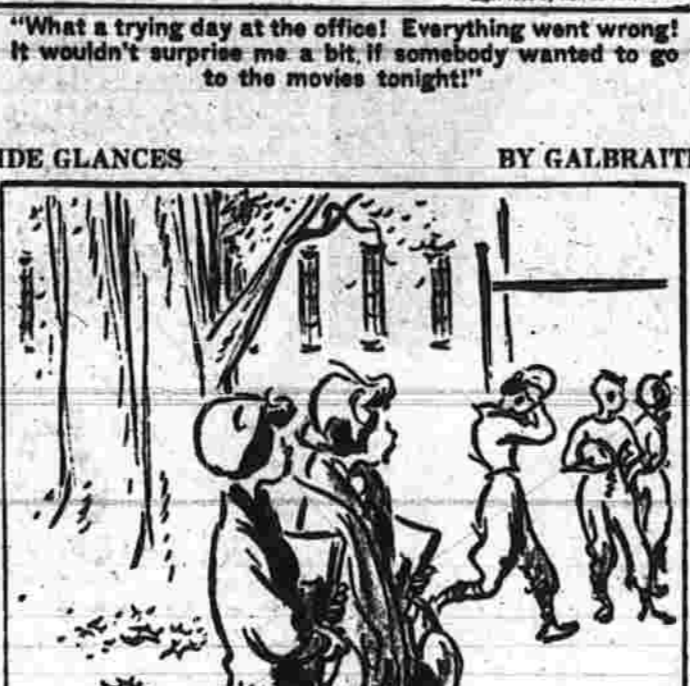

Best Way to Watch a Football Game

Chicago, Oct. 17.—(AP)—The National Collegiate Athletic Association has been alerted to plan to cope with a possible "television and overprinting" problem in the future.

Ending a four-day meeting yesterday, the NCAA's 1952 TV director, Am Bushnell, said his committee is looking for a way to cope with the prospect of enormous receipts possible from subscription (pay-as-you-use) video.

"The committee feels the incentive to become a TV school might be a problem and we are looking for a way to cope with it," Bushnell explained. "We are looking for a way to cope with it."

Bushnell said TV experts predict subscription television in three years but that his committee thinks it is a better estimate.

Stressing that the NCAA is not attempting to hinder the growth of television but only "adjust" to it, Bushnell said he had written Robert A. Hall of Yale, committee chairman, said response to the TV prospect, spearheaded by Ed Krause, Notre Dame athletic director, were "labeled by Bushnell as an 'excited talk.'"

"Opposition at this time appears to be inspired by organized groups," Bushnell said. "I have sent a bunch of letters and wires that should be read by the committee."

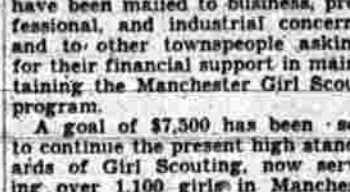
