turned one delivered against him by Benton the night before.

Benton, acting on Purcell's former post of president of the Connecticut Manufacturers' Association, enumerated a list of social gains which he said the Association opposed.

By so doing, said Purcell, Benton launched an "eleventh hour program of smear by implication, innuendoes and accusations of guilt by association, something which he has usually protested against under the guise of the 'Benton code of ethics'."

Purcell said he viewed Benton's attack on him as a "pretty good indication that he has reached the point of desperation in his losing battle for reelection. Why otherwise has he abandoned the previous clean tone of his campaign?"

Threat to Peace
"A representative may be forgiven if occasionally he is out of step," Purcell said. "But when a Representative walks with both feet backwards when the nation is walking for reelection, why devoting the needs of the state to represent him is a tragedy to the security of the nation and a constant threat to the peace of the world."

U. S. representative A. A. Ribicoff, Democratic candidate for the four-year Senate term, invaded the normally Republican stronghold of New Canaan where he delivered a talk in which he urged all to remember that military and economic strength is no substitute for moral strength.

Asserting "new weapons cannot change our moral laws," Ribicoff said.

"The free world needs brave soldiers and strong leaders, but the export of economic and military aid will be of no avail unless at the same time, our nation is exporting great and compelling ideas."

Save Campaign on Slipping
At the Republicans' weekly luncheon in Hartford yesterday, a representative of that national committee said that the Republican campaign was slipping, but he

still predicted an Eisenhower victory.
