Washington, Oct. 24 (AP)—House investigators hinted today at new man king in the Income Tax Bureau, the revelations of scandal within the Internal Revenue Service in the wake of mounting allegations of lax book-keeping and auditing procedures. 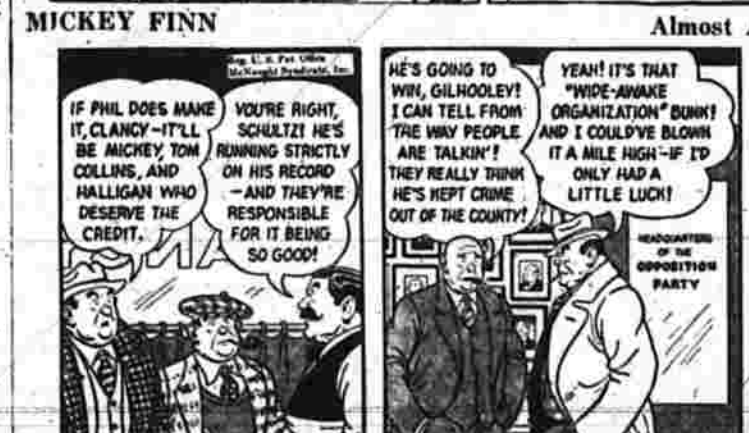

Lucky Stall We commute about 25 miles each day, coming to and from the paper. Our course takes us through Manchester proper and into the outlying sections over streets with fallen leaves.

The usual childhood prank consists of getting the leaf pile big enough so that a youngster can slide without being detected.

Our experience was nerve-shattering in this respect. We had occasion to make a stop on the West Side of town and wheeled the car over to the curb. About four feet from the curb wheel was a large pile of leaves.

Our business completed, we got into the car and prepared for a quick get-away. The obvious course would be to travel in a straight line and then gradually swing away from the curbing. This would take us over and through the leaf pile.

As luck would have it, the motor stalled. While we fiddled with the motor and cursed briefly, the pile of leaves began to move. In a moment a boy of perhaps 4 or 5 years of age emerged and stood up shaking the leaves from his clothing.

Only the quick of fate—a stalled engine—prevented us from driving over that leaf pile and over the body of a youngster at play.

What happened then could happen any time to anyone during the fall season. Steer clear of fallen leaf piles; they may hide a child at play.

Another remedy would be the rapid clearing of such debris to prevent their use in this manner.

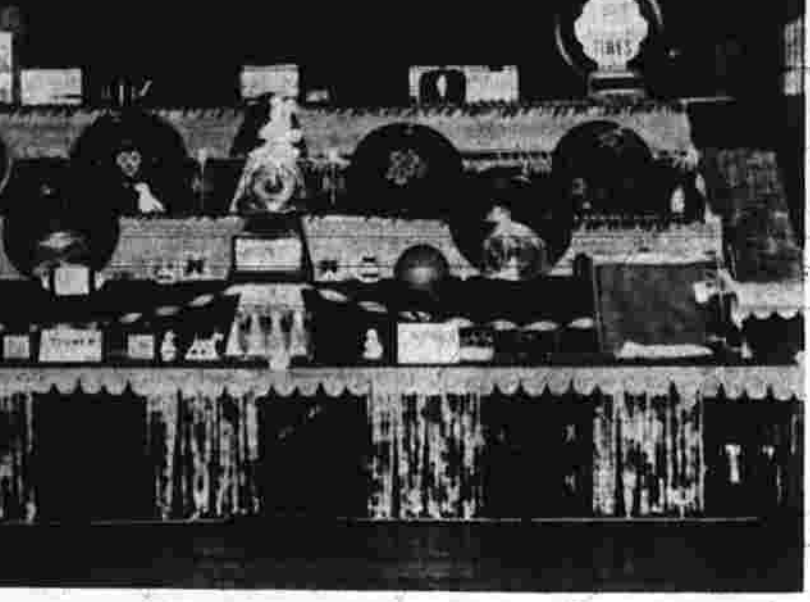

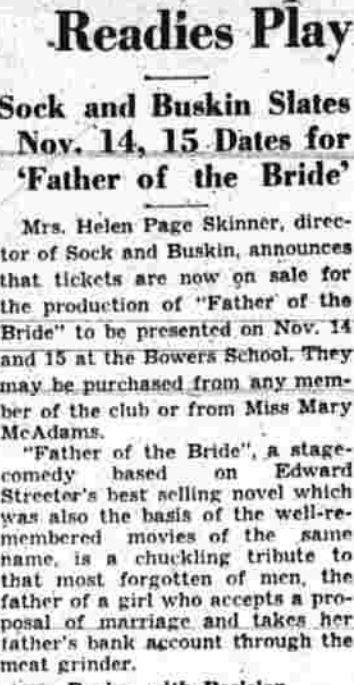
