

Truman Raps Sen. McCarthy

Aboard Truman Train, Oct. 28.—(AP)—President Truman turned his fire on Senator Joseph R. McCarthy and Republican "slander and character assassination" in a fighting campaign through Minnesota today. He declared that if McCarthy had followed "we would have lost both Europe and the Far East by now, and we would be standing alone against Communism with our backs to the wall."

That was at Winona, where, in a step at Gen. Douglas MacArthur, he declared that "in the Far East, one general almost got us into a much bigger war, against China and Russia, and I had to remove him."

There, too, he called GOP vice presidential nominee Richard Nixon the inexperienced protégé of "a little group of rich men," made up of oil men, real estate operators and tax lawyers, who "pay him extra money for his office expenses" while he votes for "the interests and against a little fellow."

Speeches at Winona, Red wing and Hearings preceded a main talk at St. Paul where he accused the GOP of using tactics of "smear and fear" in an effort to win the election.

He declared such tactics have been used against Democratic Rep. Gene McCarthy in Minnesota and if they succeed in his case, "the rights and liberties of all Americans will be in deadly peril."

Truman spoke in St. Paul's Rice Park before a crowd estimated between 3,000 and 4,000 persons.

The President told the train-side crowd at Winona "our sacrifices in Korea have kept us from a third world war."

And he took a slap at what he called the "one party press."

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Treaty by Egypt, Sudan May Be Signed Tonight

Cairo, Egypt, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Reliable sources said today that Sudanese political leaders and Premier Maj. Gen. Mohamed Naguib would sign an agreement tonight on the future status of the disputed Sudan and Naguib would put it before Britain later this week.

Informants, close to the current talks here between the Sudanese government and delegates of the Sudanese political groups, said the agreement would—express the wishes of both Sudanese and Egyptian governments, and long standing Sudanese problem, mainly obstacle in recent years to a solution of the Anglo-Egyptian dispute.

West Reich Will Ratify Army Pact

Bonn, Germany, Oct. 28.—(AP)—The West German government said today it will ratify the European army treaty as soon as possible, despite the breakdown of talks with France over the future of the Saar.

This was the government's answer to a demand by Socialist opposition leader Erich Ollenhauer that the West Germans stay out of the European Defense Community until the Saar question is solved.

"The federal government does not believe that the European defense community and the Allied West German pact are a contradiction," he said. "The Saar should be dependent upon a solution of the Saar question," an official spokesman said.

He added that German-French territory will be resumed but no proposals now for settling this ancient quarrel.

Soft Coal Diggers Heed Lewis' Order to Work

Pittsburgh, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Most of the nation's 350,000 soft coal diggers heeded the order of United Mine Workers' president John L. Lewis today to return to work after a week-long strike over a wage dispute with the government.

Special membership meetings were called throughout the coal fields within hours after Lewis wired local UMW officials across the country yesterday to get their men back at the job. But the unanimous reaction of miners: "Let's go to work."

A few scattered pits—in Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Illinois and other top coal producing states—managed to get production under way. Operations at most mines were delayed by the meetings and safety inspections.

Virtually all local in District 4 in western Pennsylvania, representing about 25,000 members, agreed to begin work on Monday. A spokesman for U. S. Steel Corp. said maintenance men had gone into the area and put them in shape for immediate production.

Miners Rejected

Some of Illinois' 15,000 workers returned to the pits yesterday but

most mines will not be fully operating until today because of unheeded instructions were not re-ceived. Operators spokesman said Lewis' appeal was received by many union locals in time for full scale resumption of work.

Miners generally expressed regret when Lewis called off the war. Said one miner in southwest Pennsylvania: "Christmas is just around the corner. It would have been pretty rough on the kids if I lost much more time."

Another soon-to-start aspect of the strike was pointed up in Fayette County, W. Va., where the General Department Bureau, a subsidiary of Eastern Gas and Fuel Association, has to close its eight mines because of a strike of striking coal miners "tried to force us to extend them more credit than we can afford."

The nationwide walkout began last Monday after the Wage Stabilization Board announced that the \$180 daily pay boost Lewis won recently in negotiations with the industry. Miners, whose ex-pected 1953 basic minimum wage for a day's work was cut to \$112.50, took the stand that the government had nullified their contract.

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McCarthy Charges Adlai Helped Reds

Chicago, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy charged last night that Gov. Adlai Stevenson, Democratic candidate for President, has given "aid to the Communist cause." McCarthy, speaking on a nation-wide television and radio broadcast financed by a privately-sponsored \$500,000 plan, said the Stevenson campaign is "a Communist plot to take over the United States."

McCarthy said Stevenson is a Communist or pro-Communist, but I must have something wrong somewhere. "I do not state that Stevenson was a Communist or pro-Communist," McCarthy said, "but I must believe something was wrong somewhere."

In his prepared text, McCarthy said that "I do not state that Stevenson was a Communist or pro-Communist, but I must believe something was wrong somewhere."

Four Main Points

1. That Stevenson is a Communist or pro-Communist.
2. That the Democratic Party is a Communist plot to take over the United States.
3. That Stevenson, assigned the task of formulating policy in Italy, prescribed a plan for "foisting Communism" on the Italians.
4. That Stevenson is "part and parcel" of the "Acheson-Hull-Lattimore group."

McCarthy did not conclude his speech when his broadcast time of 30 minutes ended. After he went off the air, he charged that Stevenson had the endorsement in effect, of the Communist Daily Worker.

The speech, which McCarthy prefaced with a description of the facts and the evidence in the case of Stevenson vs. Stevenson, made an immediate splash of controversy in the fast-churning presidential campaign.

A spokesman for the Daily Worker in New York, however, said the paper is supporting Vincent Hallinan, the Progressive party candidate for President, and there was no comment on the story.

Hits Mortgage On Presidency

New York, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson said today he would not hold out false promises of "an easy way out of Korea . . . even if the election depended on it." The Democratic presidential nominee pointed out that the political campaign is near an end and said that "candidates in search of vote-wise make empty promises—raise false hopes—promise things they know they can't deliver."

His attack aimed at his opponent, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, who has said he would go to Korea if elected in an effort to settle the war, was broadcast at noon over the Columbia Broadcasting System radio network.

Stevenson had a crowded campaign day in New York and New Jersey. His climax will come at a mass rally in Madison Square Garden tonight. (Radio and TV at 10:30 p. m.)

The transcription of his noon radio broadcast was given out by the "Women's Division of the Democratic National Committee." It was directed to women voters. Stevenson along the New York streets today. Confetti and streamers showed on him from sidewalks and packed streets.

As he left the Biltmore hotel a surging throng of about 8,000 people packed the street outside, and broke through police lines, stalling his motorcade for some time.

At an outdoor rally in the garment district, people packed sidewalks to see Stevenson. He was seen from side-to-side between 34th and 40th streets. Unofficial estimates put the number there at 70,000.

Regarding Korea, Stevenson declared: "I have not once said or suggested that there is an easy way out of Korea—for I know there isn't, just as you know in your hearts that there isn't. And I wouldn't promise you an easy way out—even if I did. I would be putting a mortgage on the presidency that I could never meet."

"To play politics with Korea is to bettle our soldiers and their families," he said, adding that "this sort of fakery is not only dangerous, it involves grave

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Reds Push ROKs from Sniper Top

Seoul, Wednesday, Oct. 29.—(AP)—About 700 Chinese Reds in a surprise attack by moonlight, threw 5 or 10 Korean troops off the crest of Sniper ridge early today.

The Reds struck the central front, height Tuesday night, with out the usual preliminary artillery barrage. They would have won the Korean defenders an attack was coming.

A front dispatch said the Reds were forced off the height—Pinpoint hill—shortly after midnight. Allied artillery then began to pulverize Pinpoint with an intense barrage.

The Chinese battalion launched the assault from a strong point on the northern edge of Sniper.

On the eastern front, North Korean Reds slammed twice at Rugged Korea on hills and Allied bombardment ridge. UN troops threw them back with fierce counterattacks. About 500 Reds covered the twin assault. Each attack forced a slight penetration which was

Reddick Goes On Trial for Blast Deaths

New Haven, Oct. 28.—(AP)—The trial of James Reddick for the 18 explosion deaths of a New Haven couple got under way before Superior Court Judge John A. Cornell today.

The 28-year-old Negro convict is accused of blasting to death the couple, who were in their home at 27 Cornhill, Oct. 11, when an explosive rigged to the ignition system of a Buick sedan exploded.

State Attorney Abraham S. Ullman, hinting it will take at least a week to pick the 12 jurors to hear the case, said he would not ask the jury to begin the state's case until Nov. 1.

The Superior Court will not sit on election day, Nov. 4.

The explosion which blew the Wrights to death as they drove away from their home at 27 Cornhill on March 18 caused neighborhood damage to the neighborhood.

It occurred in the shadow of the New Haven County Jail where high Sheriff James Reddick said damage to windows and a wire mesh fence was "high."

Reddick was captured two days later in Harlem on what police called a "tip" from a woman he had been seeing there. Subjected to lengthy questioning, he has consistently denied complicity in the Wrights' deaths.

Police investigators have been indicted however that Wright was to have been a witness against Reddick in a robbery case.

Ullman has indicated he will try Reddick only in the death of Homer Wright, but Howard Jacobs, chief counsel for the couple, said he may press for trial on both indictments.

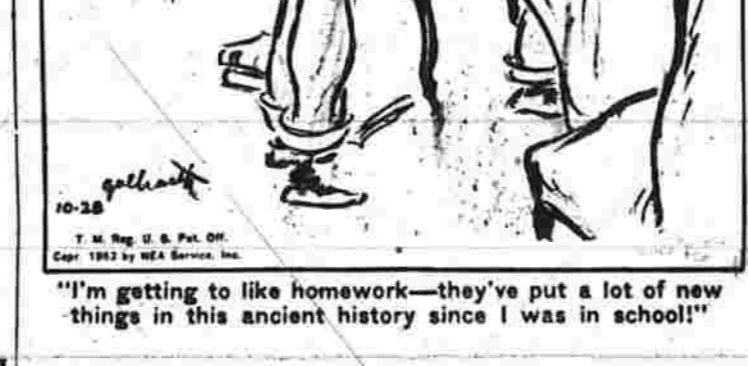

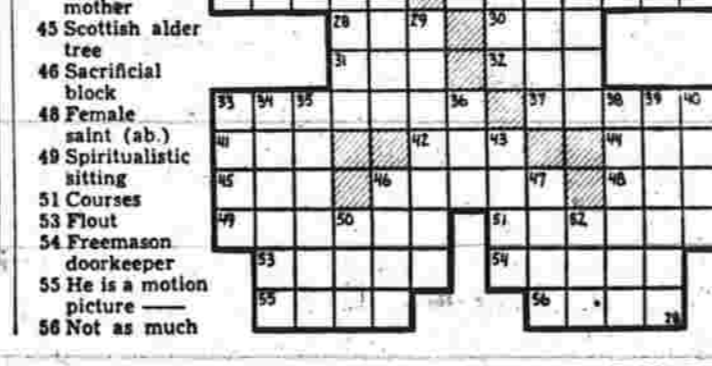
