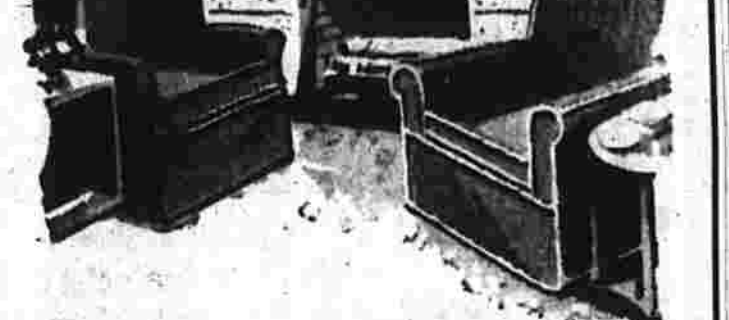

Balanced Budget Due By 1954, Taber Says

New York, Nov. 25 (AP) - Rep. Taber (R., N.Y.), ranking GOP member of the House Appropriations committee, said today he believed the federal budget could be balanced in 1954 with total federal spending brought below 65 billion dollars.

Taber conferred with top-ranking advisers to President-elect Eisenhower but did not see the general personally. When someone asked him whether he thought taxes could be reduced next year, Taber replied: "I think that question can only be answered after the President-elect (Eisenhower) gets back from Korea."

**The Truer Way**

A week ago today, in this space, we produced an editorial which was the result of fear, and which, unaided, in itself, all the inaudible capacity of fear to demoralize the thinking of human beings, would have made the editorial because we were afraid of what the human race may be going to do in the future. We wrote the editorial because we were afraid of the hydrogen bomb. And our technique was the technique of fear.

We tried to make our readers gain some apprehension of what mankind might be doing to the sun of civilization by imagining that something had happened to our real sun.

The editorial was widely read. The language of fear is the most contagious and universal of all languages. Or, at least, it is easier to believe certain effects in this language than in any other. For what its effects are, a low order talent of expression can achieve them relatively easily.

What we want to say today will be less effectively said, less widely read, less widely understood, than we want to imagine today will be less readily accepted, in the imagination of others.

The reason why we want to say something today is that we know that the editorial of a week ago was a betrayal of our own belief and philosophy. We do not believe in the self-damnation of man. We do not believe in the technique of fear as a remedy for the problems facing the world today.

There comes times when seeking answers, we feel driven to the technique of fear, when we would seek to stir people by shocking them, when we would like to change the world by sounding an alarm. It is in the nature of things themselves that this instinct should be present in us. But, every time that instinct is followed, our times themselves become weaker and the very things we fear are brought the nearer.

The cure is not in fear.

Saturday night on the radio, a period of an hour and a half was devoted to the memorial service for the late President Roosevelt. The recording of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony, it was a public service feature which the radio treated as if it were an extraordinary event in human history. It was that, for it represented the supreme genius of one tortured human individual, Tocanini, who manages to keep his spirit focused on essential things through war and rumors of war, devoted to the supreme product of another tortured genius, Beethoven, who struggled through all his wanderings about life and philosophy and human nature and the fate of the world to an expression of the most affirmative belief in the basic joy and love and brotherhood of man.

We don't know how much of this we might have understood from the music itself had it not been for a commentary beforehand. But, with the help of the commentary, it was evident even to unskilled ears that there was a rising triumph for goodness as the declamatory and basic forces in the world. It was a call to human beings to stand together, in love and joy in one another and in their own eternal source, and we would judge that this call went into many groups of listening hearts and created, for the moment, a lifting after, a bond of exaltation and serenity and uplifted human thought and purpose which is the kind of mood which, if it could be made to sweep this nation, would really sweep mankind and civilization and the world.

If we had the power to spin the words which might send this concept vibrating from heart to heart, then we would be happy, and then we would be writing an editorial which truly reflected the belief
