Town Wants Land on Pearl Street, Ready for Court Action to Get It

Directors List \$15,000 Offer, Authorize Commencement Proceedings if It's Necessary

Attorney George C. Lesmer of the Sherman Corporation has a letter offering \$15,000 for a 7 by 110-foot strip of land at Pearl and Main streets or the town will initiate street layout proceedings.

The Board of Directors issued what amounts to an ultimatum last night by making an offer of \$15,000 for 48 hours and then authorizing the town council to start condemnation proceedings if the offer is not accepted.

When told by a reporter this morning that the board had decided to condemn if necessary, Lesmer said he had "no comment." He did not rule out the possibility of accepting the offer before the decision on condemnation is made.

Work on the building at the location began Nov. 12, was continuing this morning. It is estimated that the corporation would not be assessed for new sidewalks if the street were widened.

Expenses involved in the widening of the street include those for construction and for architects.

When the \$15,000 offer was made, Lesmer said "the board is not fair and constant." He said earlier he wanted negotiations to take place if the board was unwilling to accept his offer.

Voting in favor of condemnation last night were Directors Harry J. Frato, Harold A. Turkington, Sherwood Bowers, Everett Kennedy, Theodore Fairbanks, all Republicans.

Democratic directors Mrs. Helen Fitzpatrick, Walter T. Mahoney, and Matthew Paine voted against it.

324 bombers reported destruction of 133 trucks last night and early today. That brought the total for the past 11 days to approximately 1,400 Red trucks.

Cheney-Union Arbitration Talks Now in Second Day

Arbitration hearings on Cheney said yesterday that a decision in the company's wage-cut proposal would be forthcoming in a month unless supplementary briefs were filed after the hearings ended. In that case, the period in which the decision was to be reached could be extended another month.

The dispute was submitted to the association after the union rejected the company's wage-cut proposal in September.

The company is after the wage-cut to bring its wage scale in line with southern mills that have a vast supply of cheap unorganized labor to draw from and other New England mills who were granted a wage cut last summer.

Both these mills and Cheney Brothers had granted wage increases early in 1953, but a continuing wage differential between

north and south and a recession in the industry caused the Cheney brothers to seek a return to a wage scale predating the increase.
