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Police Probe Fire Deaths of 14 Mentally Ill

Huntington, W. Va., Nov. 28.—City and state officials kept probing today among the charred interior of a mental hospital building which killed 14 women and children, their lives lost in a deadly conflagration of smoke and flames.

Deputy State Fire Marshal John Gallagher had a word of caution. "It is definite," he declared, "that the remaining buildings are as subject to fire as the one which burned."

The Huntington State Hospital, with 607 male and 731 female mentally unbalanced patients, occupies a 14-acre tract.

Gallagher suggested that "every citizen of Huntington and the state members of the National Fire Protection Association," Gov. Okey Peterson and Gov.-elect William C. Marland, "take prompt affirmative action to be taken on a proposed program for all state institutions."

State Fire Marshal C. A. Raper would not add weight to a statement by an unidentified patient attendant that sometimes patients, against the rules, sneaked into the basement to smoke.

Raper said the buildings fireproofed at last year's inspection. In another report made last year, nine corrective measures regarding fireproofing were recommended. But other buildings had even longer lists of suggested alterations.

Most of the buildings were constructed in 1906, when the hospital was established.

Common Cold Best Friend of Workman

It is frequently stated, with considerable emphasis, that medicine has in its recent advances been unable to crack the common cold. But why bother?

Viewed in a number of lights, the common cold is the working man's best friend, and if we didn't have it, we'd have to invent something else.

First and most important, there is no disguising a cold when it is there to run its course. The victim—of subject, as I prefer to call him—starts off with a magnificently inflated nose, drooping eyes and dramatic sneezes. These symptoms can only be imitated by the hay fever victim, and even liberal administration of sneezing powder can't simulate the rich and wonderful distress of a common cold.

At this point of the misery, a highly infectious condition—anyway, he certainly seems to be—and the premises of his employment. What makes the common cold particularly adaptable is that the subject feels wretched enough to leave work, and—he can do it with a free conscience—secure in the knowledge that his employer can be under no delusions that he is soldiering or faking.

Don't Show Up Only a phlegm-caster in an impressive bandage compares with a fresh cold as a valid, comfortable excuse to take sick leave. There are many things more uncomfortable than a cold—acute indigestion and a sick headache, for example—but they don't show up so nicely.

All sorts of statistics have been gathered to show the number of work-days lost annually by the common cold, but any sensible employer would rather accept cheerfully a couple of days' absence from one employee than allow the bug to run rampant through a whole department.

Therefore, I say, any employee who attempts by medication, or even his fresh cold symptoms while still around his factory or office, is just upping his end and his employer's appreciation. Wait until you get home, and you must about anti-histamines.

Late Phases Good Too Later phases of cold seem custom-tailored for easing the conscience, too. There is the plugged nose—very impressive and impossible to fake successfully—and the disagreeable choking, blowing and coughing routine. At this point in the cold, the subject is awaiting in the morning usually wakens seriously ill, but he is not alive through the day. The symptoms begin to mitigate around mid-morning, but they do not subside. His wife or his mother has already called the doctor and his personal opinion that it is better psychology for the subject to make the call himself, so that the boss can hear the frog voice and the boss couple can be seen to the employer happier, because he gets common colds too, but he is so sick with one that it is impossible to stagger to work.

The common cold has other advantages. It usually occurs when the subject is tired and needs a break to mend the ravaged sleeve of earning a living. It usually clears up enough in a couple of days to permit the subject to get back to work just when he's getting bored or when his hazy mind is on the verge of nervous collapse. And there are so many old wives' tales surrounding the treatment of the ailment, that he can indulge his fancy to eat and drink to the hilt. Some take their sick leave administering to the cold liberally from the bottle, others go along with the "feed 'em and starve 'em" routine. Others just moan and groan and receive lots of sympathetic attention. Still others shut themselves in their room and enjoy some solitude, reading or music, if that's what they want.

So, I'm for the common cold. And I, like all other working stuffs in their right mind, will rue the day when the research labs come up with the wonder drug to banish it forever.

Mona Lisa Stamp Is Hit in Germany

Frankfurt, Germany.—(AP)—An Italian masterpiece that is the best known painting in France's Louvre has become West Germany's most popular postage stamp.

Last April postal authorities here issued a 20-cent stamp bearing an excellent color reproduction of Leonardo Da Vinci's "Mona Lisa." It was a commemorative issue on the 500th anniversary of the Italian master's birth.

The new stamp caught on at once with philatelists already more than a million have been printed. German postal authorities say that collectors throughout the world have written for stamps.

England has the biggest order. There is no limit on the issue and Mona Lisa stamps will be printed according to demand.

Automatic Device Mixes Paint Colors

Management and labor at Cheney Brothers began marking time Wednesday, waiting for the arbitrator's decision on their wage-cut dispute which is expected to close in about a month.

The two-day hearings on the dispute, which involves the company's proposal to cut wages at the local textile mill 3.4 cents an hour, ended about 1 1/2 p.m. Wednesday, with the Local 63, Textile Workers Union of America, CIO, presenting its arguments against the reduction.

When the hearings began Tuesday, Professor John A. Hogan of the University of New Hampshire, the arbitrator, said that a decision would be given in a month, provided no supplementary briefs were filed after the hearings. That day will be Wednesday.

The hearings were held in the presence of the arbitrator, who was assisted by a panel of three arbitrators. The company was represented by Henry Maloney, executive vice president. C. Foster Harry, vice president in charge of manufacturing, and Richard E. Wright, industrial relations manager, and by attorneys of the Jones Construction Company and Ackley's Express Company. The union was represented by Frank Foster, president, Matthew Patton, vice president, and Michael Kleinschmidt.

Trippers for the light will be on the north and south corners of Woodbridge street at the turnpike. This is the same type of signal light used at five other intersections on the road.

Martin Asks LaBelle to Get Copy of New Law Now Used in Hartford

With the recent crack-down in nearby Hartford on after-hours drinking in bottle clubs, authorities in Manchester have set machinery in motion to prevent the mushrooming of such clubs here and to curtail the activities of one already in town.

General Manager Richard Martin has requested Town Counsel John D. LaBelle to obtain a copy of the Hartford ordinance, which in effect bans bottle clubs there, and advise him whether it would be possible to prohibit or regulate bottle clubs here.

It is expected that a public hearing on an ordinance banning bottle clubs in Manchester will be placed on the agenda of the Dec. 19 meeting of the Board of Directors. Martin said the matter may be taken up before then.

In an event, no action can be taken until a public hearing is held, and because it is necessary to advertise for the hearing, it can not be held before Dec. 19.

Expect State Action

Since it is believed that the state legislature will pass a bill governing bottle clubs, the action taken by the town may be needed only as a stop-gap measure. The new legislature will convene for its first session early in January, and observers believe an anti-bottle club statute will be one of the first bills acted on.

A number of members of the Board of Directors, including Mayor Sherman G. Bowers and Harold A. Turkinston, have already declared they would support an ordinance banning bottle clubs, and one, Theodore L. Fairbank, has taken up several complete forms from persons living near the town's only bottle club who have charged that there has been a great deal of noise emanating from the club on several occasions.

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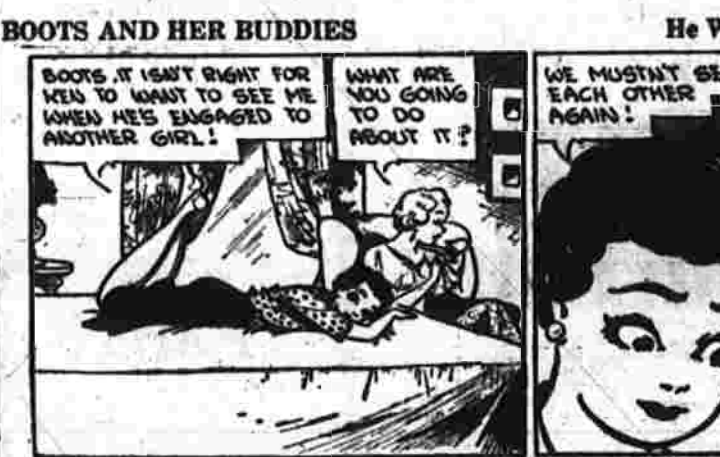

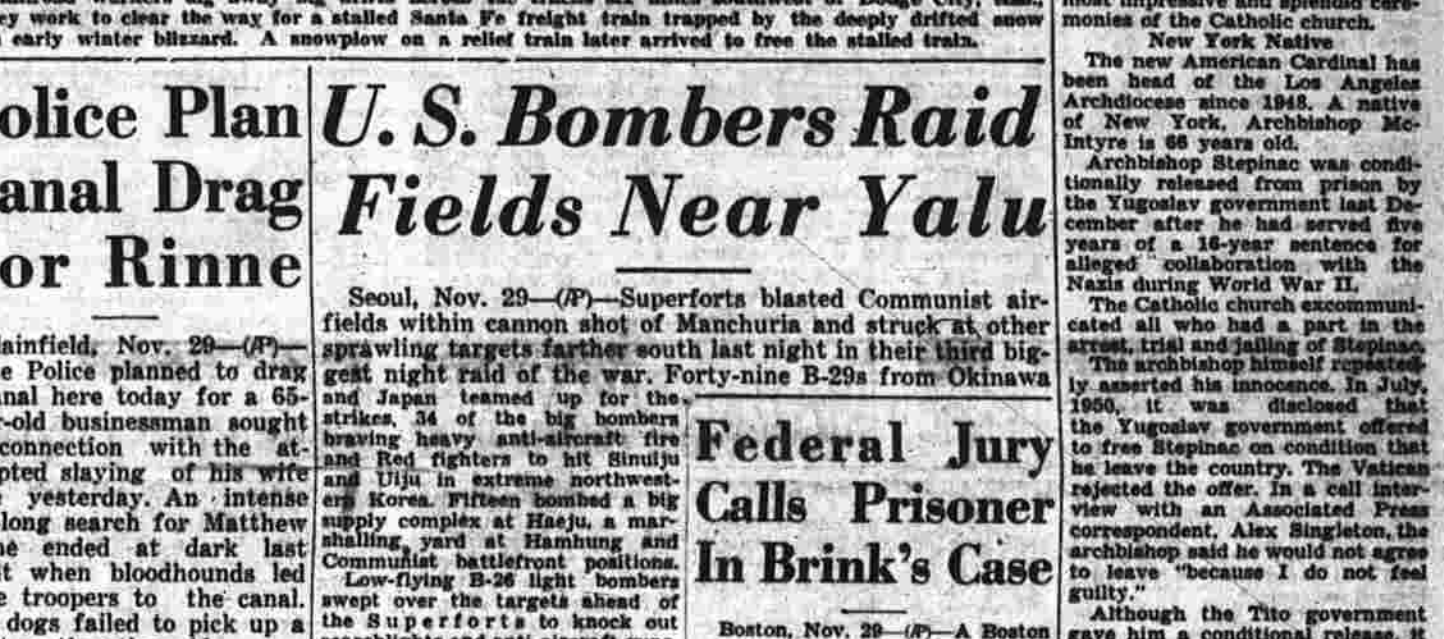

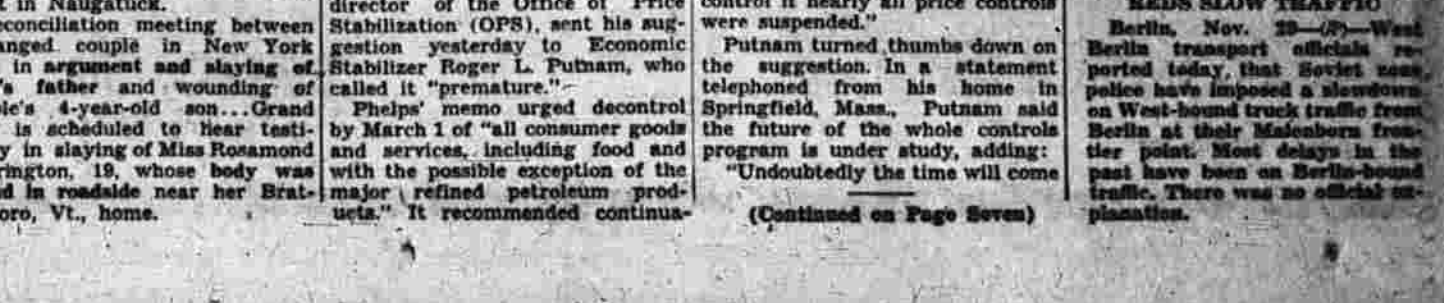
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
