shaky economies of America's Allies. Started in 1951, the program is to be continued through 1953. The total amount of military equipment to be purchased in the next few months is estimated at \$1.5 billion. In most cases, they said, 30 to 60 days will be required to complete specific arrangements and actual production may require months, perhaps years.

Contracts for offshore procurement last fiscal year emphasized ammunition, spare parts, electronic equipment and naval vessels. The specific items now being added are being kept secret but officials said many new supplies are included, among them the complete foreign-made aircraft.

The actual placing of orders is handled by the Army Procurement Office in Frankfurt, the Air Force counterpart in Wiesbaden, and Naval Procurement Headquarters in London.

In a foreign aid report to Congress Nov. 18, President Truman disclosed that \$22 million of the \$30 million dollars spent in the last fiscal year for this purpose went to France. Italy ranked second with \$5 million, The Netherlands with \$3 million, and the fourth largest amount, \$2.5 million, was spent in the United Kingdom.

List Month's Tax Income

Town Collects \$39,179 From Sources Outside Of Town From Meters

The town collected \$39,179.44 in revenue from all sources except parking meters and parking lot during the month of November, bringing total collections up to \$127,128.88 for the period from Aug. 15, the beginning of the fiscal year to Nov. 30.

The figures are based on a report yesterday to General Manager Richard Martin by Paul Cervini, collector of revenue.

The report also shows that drivers have contributed \$9,041.08 to the town's treasury in parking meter fees since mid-August.

Of this sum \$258.81 came from meters in the town owned parking lot at Purnell place, and \$8,782.27 from other meters.

The balance in the parking meter fund is \$22,215.23, the report indicates. At the close of the fiscal year the fund contained \$43,174.15.

Walkout Curtails Northeast Airline

Boston, Dec. 5.—(Special)—Approximately 220 Northeast Airlines mechanics, inspectors and maintenance men struck early today after what they called a break of negotiations for higher wages.

Romano said current salaries range from a low of \$1.29 an hour for maintenance helpers to \$2.50 an hour for lead mechanics and inspectors.

The union local president said the men would picket Northeast Airlines operations in all the air-

lines operations in all the airports from which it has flights.

A spokesman for the airline said the company would continue operations on a curtailed basis throughout its system.

He said also the company had offered to submit the dispute to arbitration but that the union refused.

ness outpost on the western front Thursday. The raiders withdrew to their own lines after killing an estimated 58 Reds.

Subzero temperatures discouraged action along most of the front. Allied artillery duled with the Communist guns early today. Spotters reported 31 Communist bunkers were hit.

South Koreans standing firm on Sniper ridge on the central front, repulsed Chinese squads probing the icy slopes. Oidawa-based Superfortes blasted a big supply center at Cholan in extreme western Korea, some 25 miles southeast of the Communist jet-fighter base at Antung, Manchuria. The B-29s bucked 500-mile-an-hour winds to reach the target. Five reported flames and smoke billowed over the supply base.

Night-flying B-26 bombers struck Communist supply facilities elsewhere in North Korea. The Fifth Air Force reported at least 90 trucks destroyed. Most of the strikes were centered west of Wonsan, big eastern Korean port.

Police Drive Hikes Record of Arrests

How Did Lewis Know Coal Hike Was Coming?

 Washington, Dec. 5.—John L. Lewis is hardly the man to go scamping out of the "country" when his miners' wages are at stake and he might have to call a strike if they didn't get what they wanted.

Yet, there was off in South America when the announcement came that President Truman had overruled his top stabilization officials to give Lewis' coal miners a \$1.50 a day pay raise they wanted.

Roger Putnam, the economic adviser, broke the news to reporters. Under questioning, Putnam said the President had reached his decision just a week ago.

Since that would have been a couple of days before Lewis took off southward, it's possible he knew how his miners' wages were to be raised. How he knew it, if he knew it, was not disclosed. Maybe a bird told him.

But the thundering Lewis, who supported the Democrats in the Presidential election, has never been so uncomformable under government wage controls. In fact, he's made out dandy.

All through the fall of 1950, after the Korean outbreak, the Truman administration hounded and hauled about setting in motion the machinery to control prices and government wage controls. In fact, he's made out dandy.

On Jan. 18, 1951, Lewis and the coal mine owners agreed on a wage increase of \$1.00 a day for the miners. Eight days later the government froze all wages and prices.

But, the government sent Lewis his way with official blessing, deciding he could keep his raise all right since he had obtained it before the freeze went in. He had a say on all raises agreed upon after the freeze date.

This fall Lewis reached another agreement with the mine owners, giving his miners a boost of \$1.50. But this time Lewis couldn't get it, so it was thought, unless the Wage Stabilization board approved.

Meanwhile, on Oct. 1, Lewis and his miners decided to support the Democrats in the Presidential campaign of Governor Stevenson.

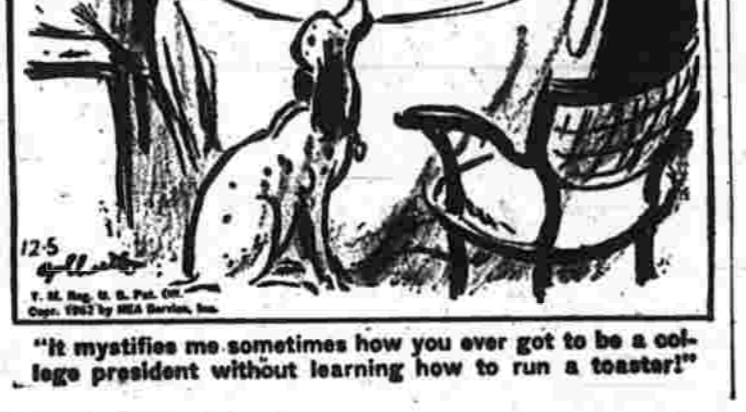
