### Crime Shows Stress by TV, Radio Assailed

...the radio-TV industry is making progress in self-discipline which, so long as the public interest is served, is preferable to government-imposed regulations.

Until the industry has had an opportunity to explore fully whether effective self-regulation is possible, "there appears to be no good reason" to impose federal controls, it said.

Other highlights of the report:

1. A voluntary code of ethics developed as a guide to broadcasters cannot be a substitute for the responsibility of the individual stations and the accountability for programs remains with the local station.
2. There have been programs of objective, objective, objectionable, or suggestive material, and the industry should take "corrective action."
3. "There is entirely too much emphasis upon crime programs and too much time is being devoted to such programs. The fact that radio and television crime programs are being broadcast in great numbers does not mean that crime does not pay... does not in the least affect the subcommittee's feelings that crime shows are not suitable subjects for children's programs or for programs that are so titled that they show some degree of regularity by children."
4. "One of the greatly encouraging aspects of the present state of development in television programming is the growing interest of commercial sponsors in cultural and educational programs."
5. Interested and constructive public criticism is required to enable broadcasters to discharge their responsibilities and to establish a code of ethics effective. Some civic and religious groups have made important contributions in this field, and the industry should stimulate such contributions."
6. "Poor taste has been used in the advertising of certain licensed and regulated products which has been offensive to a large segment of the public. Sponsors, advertising agencies and broadcasters should 'adopt' measures to correct the condition."
7. "The committee was impressed with the efforts of the radio and television industry and the manufacturers of distilled spirits" to eliminate all advertising of such products on radio and television.

The committee said it heard witnesses who "took exception to low necklines," complained about "offensive plays involving adultery and other deviations from good moral behavior," objected to beer and wine commercials illustrating drinking scenes, and took a dim view of impersonations of doctors and other professional people for the endorsement of products.

crew members on a breeches buoy. The Grommet Reeper, a refrigerator ship carrying supplies for U. S. Army forces in Austria, put into Loughrea from New York. It was to have docked today to unload a 176-ton cargo of footstuffs. She is a welded ship built in 1945 by Butler Shipyard, Duluth, Minn.

Buffeted by the high winds and seas the vessel dragged its anchor early today and crashed in the rocks just before dawn. Although no communication was possible to crew members, witnesses on shore said the crew apparently realized the ship was breaking up and scrambled to the stern. The bow floated away immediately after the ship broke up.

Loughrea is about a mile south of the Loughrea dock area and directly in front of Italy's Naval Academy. Capt. James O'Brien, public information officer for the Army base here, said it appeared to be firmly lodged on the rocks and did not seem to be in danger of breaking up further.

He said huge waves continued to pound the wreck, sending spray over the superstructure. The crew members came on deck only occasionally, he said, because of the high wind and spray. They indicated no one was hurt.

About 500 Loughrea residents crowded the shore line near the wreck to watch operations, while others combed the area in search of drifting foodstuffs. Butter, fruit and other foods floated into a canal running through the center of Loughrea and was quickly picked up until customs authorities intervened. Most of the food broke out of wooden cases as they floated out of the ship and crashed on the rocky shore.

**Cautious But Positive**

President-elect Eisenhower, back from his journeys and policy meetings, did not give, and cannot be expected to give, any definite indication of his policy conclusions. What he intends to do will be done, in time, with or without words, as the circumstances indicate. It is as clear as daylight to judge the good in which he is operating.

This is, from his own remarks, a mood of cautious hope, in which it is clearly recognized that there can be no simple formula for winning a swift, victorious end to this war, and in which it is also recognized that the Korean war is but the most dramatic and most painful phase, for us at this time, of our worldwide struggle against Communist aggression.

Not only is the Korean situation difficult to identify, but its complexities are increased by the fact that it is part of a world-wide picture. Against this outlook, President-elect Eisenhower obviously has certain intensions. He does not intend to regard peace as impossible. Nor on the other hand, does he intend to have the Kremlin making all the plans for the future and us doing all the guessing. He intends to have us do some planning and the Kremlin doing some guessing.

He does not intend to be rash. He does not intend to be merely passive. He intends to give American policy some positive leverage on world affairs. But he does not intend to do this by the reckless use of force alone. He intends to weave a policy of many elements, proceeding with care and patience, and yet with positive design.

He took care to make plain, in both his formal statement and in his informal remarks on his return to New York, his emphasis on something that too many American spokesmen have tended to ignore. In his prepared statement, he took care to list and praise the contributions of 13 other members of the United Nations who, having troops in Korea, and in his informal statement he emphasized the fact that the "operation out there is a United Nations operation, and so I didn't go out to try to tell them how they should run that particular business that activity."

There is healthy indication that he knows that whatever new policies may be possible in Korea, they can be valid and effective only if they enlist the positive approval of the nations who have assumed with us the moral and practical responsibility for a new approach to the problem of peace and war.

**Senator Lodge On The UN**  
 Not only the first public address of John Foster Dulles since his appointment to be secretary of state in the incoming administration, but also the first public address of Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., who is to be United States Ambassador to the United Nations, have featured ringing and heartening declarations of the truth about this nation's relationship to the United Nations.  
 Significantly, both Mr. Dulles and Senator Lodge, in their addresses to the National Council of the Churches of Christ, looked forward to 1955, the date when the members of the United Nations should hold their first session for review and possible amendment of the United Nations charter. This is significant, coming from the two men who are to be most closely identified with the attitude toward the UN in the Eisenhower administration, because it is in such contrast to the attitude of the Acheson-Truman regime, which has repeatedly cast cold water on that large segment of American thought which holds that the United Nations must be built up and strengthened in the

**A Beautiful Word**

Experts can be very wrong. That is one comforting thought for those hundreds of thousands of Americans who are currently engaged in improving their health through various kinds of contact with that miraculous substance, chlorophyll, which is the green growth which makes the grass green.

And, so far, it's only one expert, insignificant professor of chemistry, as opposed to the more cheering experts who draw up the advertisements and blurb which are making chlorophyll the latest thing for healthy Americans.

We would guess, off-hand, that the expert doesn't have a clue, and that the chlorophyll had swept on and on, all facts to the contrary.

The facts, according to Prof. A. H. Corwin, head of the chemistry department of John Hopkins University, are as follows:  
 "Chlorophyll is indispensable in photosynthesis (the means by which green plants convert light and air into their basic food). It is found to be highly aesthetic in coloring the vistas visible from hills and mountains. It furnishes chemists, physiologists and other scientists with a lot of good clean fun. For other purposes, we are not certain that it has any value."

It is not even, says Professor Corwin, of any value as a deodorant.  
 "With respect to the claim that chlorophyll derivatives exert a deodorant effect on perspiration and other odors when given by mouth, we may conclude that it is improbable that chlorophyll derivatives are present in the blood stream in amounts sufficient to influence the functioning of the perspiration glands after eating chlorophyll derivatives. Furthermore, if they were present in such amounts, they would be extremely dangerous in rendering their users sensitive to light."

Professor Corwin tells the fascinating story of laboratory experiments in which chlorophyll really was put into the blood stream of rats. When they were taken from darkness into a bright light, the rats jumped up with more vigor than they had ever exhibited before, and fell back dead.
