Tito Ends Vatican Tie over Stepinac

Belgrade, Yugoslavia, Dec. 17—(AP)—Premier Marshal Tito's government broke diplomatic relations with the Vatican today as a follow-up to the naming of Archbishop Alojzije Stepinac to the College of Cardinals.

Stepinac, deputy foreign minister, informed the Vatican ambassador, Mgr. Silvio Di Oddi, of the action. Mgr. Di Oddi said he had no comment. He has been serving as chargé d'affaires here in the absence of the American Archbishop Joseph P. Hurley, the Vatican minister to Belgrade.

Says Vatican Hostile
Marshall Tito, in a speech yesterday to workers in a factory near Belgrade, accused the Vatican of hostile activity against Yugoslavia. Tito also threatened to call off a projected visit to London, because of British charges of religious persecution here.

The future was touched off by British newspaper reports quoting Dr. Geoffrey Fisher, British Archbishop of Canterbury, as saying that British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden would urge Tito to ease up on religious persecution when the Yugoslav leader visits Britain next March.

Tito, speaking before a crowd of about 15,000 in a small factory town last night, said that the charges of religious persecution were inspired by the Vatican. He declared he would not go to Britain unless at least half the British people want him to come.

"I am not going to England to make concessions," he declared. "There will be no discussion of our internal affairs."

Vicarious Prodanov, patriarch of the Serbian Orthodox Church, added his warning against foreign interference in letters today to two Belgrade newspapers, Borna and Politika.

The Yugoslav people are free to worship where they please, he wrote, and "our friends abroad can help us by leaving us in peace and leaving us to settle ourselves our relations."

Annals Reminiscence
Tito again attacked Pope Pius XII's nomination of Archbishop Alojzije Stepinac as a Cardinal and declared that Stepinac would never be permitted to serve even as an Archbishop in Yugoslavia.

Stepinac was conditionally re-nominated.

Gale Damages, United States, Delays Voyage
London, Dec. 17—(AP)—The crack new American liner United States was damaged and other shipping imperiled today by furious winds buffeting the British Isles. There were gusts of more than 100 miles an hour.

The United States had just pulled away from the Southampton dock on a homeward voyage to New York when a gale caught her broadside and drove her back to the quay.

The port side of the ship's bridge jammed in between two high dockside cranes denting the bridge work and scraping paint off the observation deck.

The liner quickly worked loose and tugs resumed trying to get her out to sea. After an hour of tricky maneuvering in the gale force gusts, it was decided to wait until the wind died down. The liner was tied up at dockside and the 600 passengers aboard were told that sailing would be delayed.

The 1,800-ton Finnish freighter Sobritt was driven on to rocks off the Scotland Isle of Arran. She was refloated five hours later by the Clyde tug Forrager.

Czech Leader Bares Unrest

Venue, Dec. 17—(AP)—Czechoslovak Communist Premier admitted today that "discontent and rebellion" in the nation, and indicated the Red regime has not yet been able to bring popular defiance under control.

This startling admission was published in Rude Pravo, official Czechoslovak Communist newspaper. Premier Antonin Zapotocky was quoted as blaming the rebellion on shortage of food and coal.

The Communist president, Klement Gottwald, previously admitted that the production of milk, eggs and farm goods in Czechoslovakia has fallen lower than it was in 1947, before the Communists seized power.

The admissions lent weight to western reports that the Soviet Union's industrial demands on Czechoslovakia have been severely milking the nation and producing chaotic conditions. The production of heavy industry goods for Russia has cost the satellite country terrifically, pushing down its former high living standards.

Bribe Try Story Told At Inquiry

New York, Dec. 17—(AP)—A detective told the New York State Crime commission today that he rejected a bribe offered by a member of the AFL International Longshoremen's Association to "lay off the boys" on the Jersey City waterfront.

Jersey City Detective John Waldron said the bribe was offered him in November, 1951, by a man named Johnnie Alu. The bribe—starting with \$10,000 for three Jersey City detectives—was intended to put 10 policemen on a stevedoring firm's payroll, Waldron testified.

Waldron took the witness stand as the crime commission's probe of racketeering in the world's largest port stepped up spotlight focused on Jersey City for the second day.

Waldron identified Alu as a member of Local 824 of the I.L.A. Alu made the offer to three detectives when the police were hunting for a bombing on the Jersey City waterfront in March, 1951, Waldron said. The bombing injured five union officials, including Barney (Cockeye) Brown, whose name has figured prominently in the commission hearings.

Waldron said he and two other detectives came to a Manhattan restaurant in response to a tip. There they met Alu. Waldron said that when he asked him what he had on his mind, Alu replied he would "do no business unless you lay off the boys."

Immediately after Waldron left the stand Alu was summoned. The squad, holding man, he declined on constitutional grounds to admit having met the three Jersey City detectives in a Manhattan restaurant.

An Refuses To Answer
Commissioner Thomas Theodor Klend called the three detectives to the front of the courtroom and asked Alu if he ever had seen them.

Again Alu refused to answer on grounds that to do so might incriminate him.

Asked whether it was true that he had tried to bribe them to lay off the payroll of the Dade Brothers stevedoring firm, he again took refuge in constitutional privilege.

As the commission waded into Hudson County, N. J., politics yesterday in its study of crime along the piers, witness pictured Jersey City Mayor John V. Kenny as a protector of waterfront racketeering.

It was a picture described as completely unrealistic by Kenny, who defended himself from New Jersey while showing no inclination to take up the commission's invitation to come to New York today to give his side.

Kenny was the chief topic at yesterday's public hearing. Witnesses whom Kenny called irresponsible—gave testimony that Ken-

Pravda Blasts Allied Slaying Of 82 Captives

Moscow, Dec. 17—(AP)—The Communist party newspaper Pravda today printed in heavy black type a report that 82 Red prisoners had been killed in Korea's Pongam island and again bitterly attacked United States' treatment of Chinese and North Korean war prisoners.

In a lead editorial, the newspaper charged that "American aggressors are committing crimes against the conscience of humanity."

The United Nations Command on Korea announced that Allied guards last Sunday killed 82 Communist and wounded 120 others in quelling a mass breakout attempt by war prisoners at Pongam island.

Pravda said the Pongam incident was a new "link in the monstrous chain of crimes by the American military who are following the road of Hitlerite tyranny and blood terror."

"American monsters are using civil law against both POWs and civilians herded in numerous American death camps," the editorial continued. "The lead underfoot the most elementary foundations of international law by

Brink Case Judge Cites Two More

Boston, Dec. 17—(AP)—A parade of witnesses accused of contempt in a federal grand jury investigation of the \$1,219,000 Brink's holdup in 1950 increased to seven today when two men were cited for refusing to answer questions.

The latest so charged were Adolph Maffie of Quincy, and Edward A. Bennett of Boston. They were held in \$10,000 each for hearing Friday.

Their bail is double that originally set in the case of four other persons so charged and was set at the request of Asst. U. S. Atty. Edward D. Hassan, who told the court "in view of the knowledge we have we feel \$10,000 is reasonable."

Defies Judge
Maffie and Bennett, Judge William T. McCarthy by saying, "I refuse to answer, when the judge asked him, 'What do you do for a living?'"

The background of Maffie and Bennett was not available immediately to Boston police and news men. "The federal authorities aren't taking anyone into their confidence, they have all the answers, you'll have to get your information from them."

The FBI acted in customary fashion by refusing to talk. Previously accused of contempt were Mr. and Mrs. Paul A. Hooley, parents of three children; Donald T. O'Keefe, Boston street cleaner; Joseph T. "Specs" O'Keefe, a Pennsylvania convict; and Joseph H. Carlson, Boston bookie. The O'Keefe men are brothers of Mrs. Hooley.

"Specs" O'Keefe, referred to in open court as a "suspect" in the robbery, is being held at Suffolk County jail. He was brought here from Bradford, Pa., county.

Appeals Court Studies Dispute In Natural Gas

Boston, Dec. 17—(AP)—The First Circuit Court of Appeals today had under advisement the latest chapter in the long wrangle between Algonquin Gas Transmission Company and Northeastern Gas Transmission Company for the right to serve New England with natural gas.

Chief Judge Calvert Magruder and Associate Judges Peter Woodbury and John P. Hartigan heard three hours of testimony yesterday on the court's order to the Federal Power Commission to show cause why it cannot grant a temporary emergency certificate allowing Algonquin to finish its \$45,000,000 pipeline.

Denies Authority
The FPC, which twice turned down Algonquin's application for the certificate, argued through its assistant general counsel, Bernard A. Foster, that it hasn't the legal authority to allow completion of Algonquin's line.

Attorney Paul Porter, representing Algonquin, told the court the pipeline was built pursuant to lawful authorization by the FPC and would have been operating if a court order forcing cessation of construction had been delayed "10 to 12 days."

Foster said "This is the first case in which the FPC has exercised its authority."

10c Charter Oak Toll For Transients Urged

Hartford, Dec. 17—(AP)—Return of the 10 cent toll on the Charter Oak Bridge for transients was recommended to the Governor's Committee on Highway Financing. The suggestion was made by A. Ward Spalding of Suffield, chairman of the executive committee of the State Grange.

With a second bridge planned at State street in Hartford and a third bridge projected across the Connecticut river near Windsor Locks, Spalding told the committee he felt the legislature should reinstate the toll on the Charter Oak bridge in Hartford for all except local commuters, to help finance the other bridge projects and possible highway expansion.

Spalding said that he felt the present one-cent toll for those who buy books of 100 tickets "hardly pays the effort of getting the books out."

The committee is wrestling with the problem of ways of possibly financing urgently needed highway projects, estimated to cost between \$10,000,000 to \$375,000,000 over the next 10 years.

In opening the meeting State's Attorney Robert P. Anderson of New London, chairman of the group appointed by Governor Lodge, said their assignment was to determine what sources of revenue might be tapped if highway income appears to be inadequate to cover the 10-year program.

Committee member William H. Mortensen, former Hartford mayor, asked Spalding his reaction to the advisability of increasing the gas tax one per cent.

Spalding replied that the organization would oppose it at this time but if tolls were found to be insufficient to pay the costs of meeting the highway expansion he considered it "the next fairest tax is an increase in the gas tax."

Mortensen pointed out that there were indications of a \$44,000,000 gap between highway revenue and costs in the 10-year program. He said that a one per cent increase in the gas tax would cover the gap.

Eisenhower Set to See GOP Chiefs

New York, Dec. 17—(AP)—President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower and Gen. Douglas MacArthur conferred today in the home of John Foster Dulles, the Secretary of State-designate.

The meeting was arranged following MacArthur's statement there was a clear and definite solution to the Korean war.

Eisenhower and Dulles left the President-elect's Conynodora Hotel headquarters together to keep the appointment with the former Far East commander who was ousted by President Truman. MacArthur traveled separately to the Dulles home for what was described as a luncheon meeting.

James C. Hagerty, Eisenhower's press secretary, announced the conference shortly after the general and Dulles left the Eisenhower headquarters.

The President-elect's list of appointments for the day had contained no mention of MacArthur, but it did list a 1 p. m. appointment with Dulles.

The general had no further appointments scheduled for the day, which would permit the President-elect and MacArthur as much time as needed for a discussion of the Korean problem.

Will Meet GOP Leaders
Eisenhower announced plans for a series of meetings with GOP congressional leaders to discuss, among other problems, "methods of controlling the budget."

The first of the meetings, Eisenhower said in a statement, will be held at his Conynodora Hotel headquarters tomorrow morning (11:30 a. m. e. s. t.) with House leaders.

Sitting in with the general will be Rep. Joseph W. Martin, Jr., of Massachusetts, slated to be Speaker of the House, Rep. Charles Halleck, of Indiana, in line for the job of floor leader, and Rep. Leslie C. Arens, of Illinois.

Eisenhower said another meeting to follow "as promptly as possible" will bring in Sen. Styles Bridges of New Hampshire, who served as minority leader in the Democratic-controlled 82nd Congress, Sen. Robert A. Taft, of Ohio, chairman of the Senate GOP policy committee, Sen. Eugene D. Millikin of Colorado, chairman of the conference of all Republican Senators, and Sen. Leverett Saltonstall of Massachusetts, assistant minority leader in the last Congress.

Hagerty said the meeting with the Senate group probably will be held on Thursday.

It's been a long time since I've heard anyone say flatly and simply, "I can't afford it." And perhaps it would be a good idea to restore those four uncomplimentary words to a popular spot in our vocabulary.

Recently a federal survey showed that most families in the United States were spending a few hundred more dollars a year than they were earning. Lending money has become an enormous business as it has become easier to borrow money. Installment-plan buying puts almost anything you desire in our paths.

Everything from diamond stoneware to bedside radios, are available today on the dollar-down-and-a-little-every-month basis, which is fine and wonderful. Where most of us Americans fall down, apparently, is in the department of decision—determining what we really are justified in going in the hole for.

No Ours on Borrowing

Actually, the onus on borrowing money has been removed for a comparatively few years. Not too long ago, individual borrowing was not only frowned upon, but straggling

loan without security was practically impossible. People who wanted to buy something usually had their sights upon the object, saved their money until they had enough to cover the purchase price and then went out and bought it. 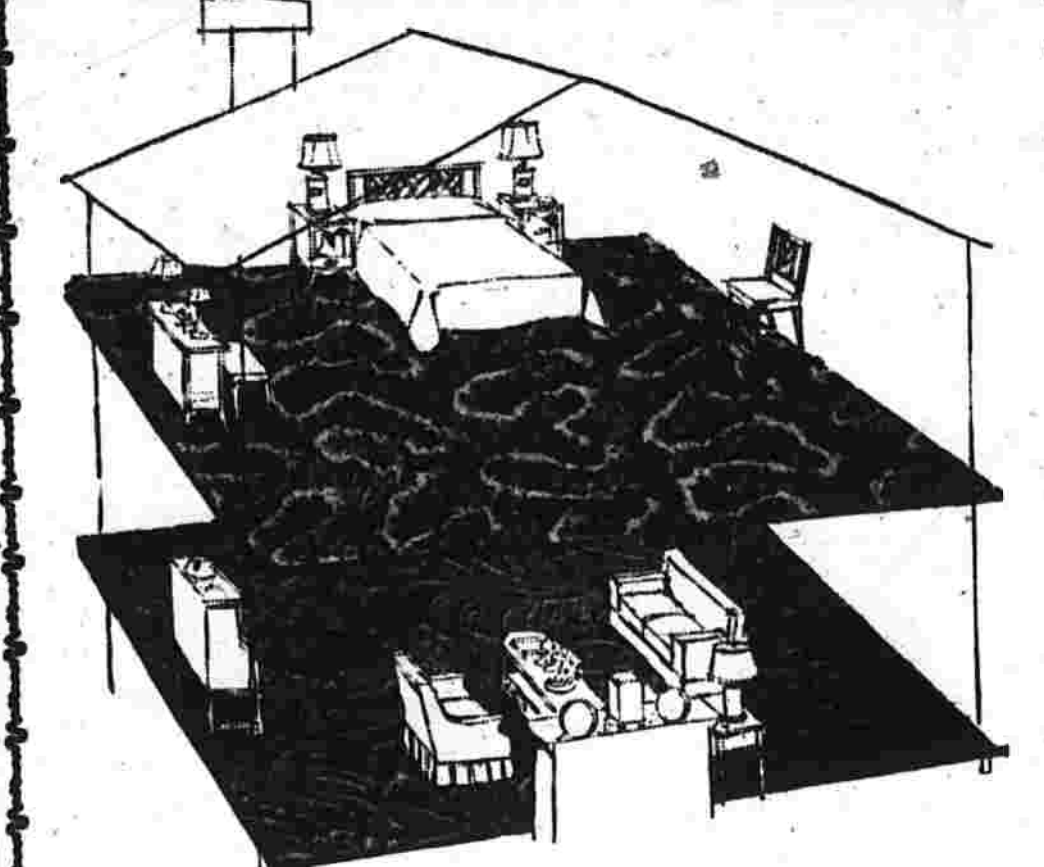

The Eisenhower Climate

When Senator Taft issued his considered blast against the appointment of Martin Durkin to be secretary of labor, the first immediate effect was to turn the Republican members of the Senate instinctively toward the retention of Senator Styles Bridges in the post of floor leader—a post Senator Taft had been preparing to take. In other words, by his action, Senator Taft put himself out of the cold with his fellow Republican senators. Not even his own best friends were interested in carrying on a feud with the new Republican President for the personal glory of Senator Taft.

Today Senator Taft is back in the warm again. He can again be Senate floor leader, if he wants to be. And this is clearly the work of not any disheartened Taft supporters rallying to his personal cause, but of President-elect Eisenhower himself. It was after conferring with him, yesterday, that two members of the Senate who are close to him announced their own personal preference for Senator Taft for the post.

It will, we suspect, take this nation a little time to get used to this kind of behavior. Why, when Senator Taft had seriously injured himself, did not Eisenhower, his political enemy, allow him to resign? Why, when your man has knocked himself down, in the course of his enmity to you, should you come to his aid?

Why tolerate such enemies, and do the things which seem to give longer life to them? The answers will require the American people to do a new and broader kind of thinking than has been their habit lately. For one answer is that Eisenhower does not, in his own thinking, have enemies. Another answer is that he is not out to have an all-out fight with any human or political being. Another answer is that he doesn't want to destroy anybody. Another answer is that he sees some potential good in everybody.

Another thing is becoming very clear about President-elect Eisenhower. It is that, although he has a mind of his own, although he is strongly capable of making his own decisions, and will make them, he is not afraid of divergent opinion or philosophies. He respects the right of other men to hold such opinions contrary to his own, and he never closes his own mind so much that he considers it useless to consult such contrary opinions.

This is a brand of largeness of mind and heart which is so novel to most of us that we will hesitate to believe that it really exists; that it is really being exemplified by the human being we have elected President.

But it was what some people sensed in Eisenhower when they first backed him for the nomination, and it is what he has demonstrated, since, especially in his relationship with those men who clearly have been his political enemies—Senator Taft and General MacArthur. What is disconcerting effect on these two men has been not only he imagined, but it is obvious that, in so far as they try to maintain animus in their own attitude, the Eisenhower technique blunts and disarms it, and reduces their power for evil. And in so far as there is something good in these men, it will bring it out and encourage it, and Eisenhower is quite capable of using this good and operating with it, and of convincing the man themselves a respected place in the national scheme of things. This pleases neither the more rabid Eisenhower adherents nor the more rabid Taft or MacArthur adherents, but as the people themselves begin to understand more and more just what quality of leadership is in-

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County Medical Unit Tells How to Avoid Common Cold

Death and taxes are usually considered the only sure things in a person's life. However, the common cold has long been just as pervasive every year, along with taxes.

Dr. William H. Upson, president of the medical association, said, "Colds help break down body resistance to more serious diseases, such as pneumonia, bronchitis, and ear, throat, sinus and tonsil infections."

Although medical researchers have not as yet discovered any specific cures for colds, there are certain procedures that will prevent their onset, Dr. Upson added.

A good diet, plenty of sleep, wearing enough clothes to keep warm without overheating, wearing clean socks and shoes, and keeping out of drafts and avoiding persons with colds will minimize the number of colds you get, he said.

You won't have to stay on a liquid diet, since this theory has never been proven, Dr. Upson said. Eat only what is reasonable in fruits and liquids with just enough meat and potato staples to give you some additional energy.

Laxatives don't help either unless your doctor specifically recommends them. Current popular drugs for fever breathing give temporary relief by constricting

the blood vessels in the nose and allowing air to enter more easily. Generally cold tablets contribute nothing in curing a cold, although they do give some measure of temporary relief.

If you feel difficulty in swallowing, sneezing or coughing, and are tired with a dulling in your sense of smell and taste, then prepare to be uncomfortable for five to eight days, the average length of a cold.

Most physicians do not like to use sulfonamide drugs and penicillin to combat colds, Dr. Upson said, because the body might build a tolerance for the drugs, which might prohibit their use in more serious diseases.

So, even though you're bound to get a cold this year, you can do something to limit the number or relieve your discomfort.

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County Medical Unit Tells How to Avoid Common Cold

Death and taxes are usually considered the only sure things in a person's life. However, the common cold has long been just as pervasive every year, along with taxes.

Dr. William H. Upson, president of the medical association, said, "Colds help break down body resistance to more serious diseases, such as pneumonia, bronchitis, and ear, throat, sinus and tonsil infections."

Although medical researchers have not as yet discovered any specific cures for colds, there are certain procedures that will prevent their onset, Dr. Upson added.

A good diet, plenty of sleep, wearing enough clothes to keep warm without overheating, wearing clean socks and shoes, and keeping out of drafts and avoiding persons with colds will minimize the number of colds you get, he said.

You won't have to stay on a liquid diet, since this theory has never been proven, Dr. Upson said. Eat only what is reasonable in fruits and liquids with just enough meat and potato staples to give you some additional energy.

Laxatives don't help either unless your doctor specifically recommends them. Current popular drugs for fever breathing give temporary relief by constricting

the blood vessels in the nose and allowing air to enter more easily. Generally cold tablets contribute nothing in curing a cold, although they do give some measure of temporary relief.

If you feel difficulty in swallowing, sneezing or coughing, and are tired with a dulling in your sense of smell and taste, then prepare to be uncomfortable for five to eight days, the average length of a cold.

Most physicians do not like to use sulfonamide drugs and penicillin to combat colds, Dr. Upson said, because the body might build a tolerance for the drugs, which might prohibit their use in more serious diseases.

So, even though you're bound to get a cold this year, you can do something to limit the number or relieve your discomfort.

Video Viewer Gets Signals From Deep South Stations

While it may not have established a new record for long distance television reception, a Coventry resident, Hans Holmstedt, said today that his set was tuned to two southern television stations last night.
A check with Manchester radio and television dealers and service-men indicates that although this is not a common occurrence, other video viewers in the area have at one time or another reported reception of stations from the South.
Channel 4 and 5, normally reserved for DuPont and NBC in New York were crowded out of the air last night when stations in Memphis, Tenn., and Birmingham, Ala., managed to get their signals through.
The Herald staff reporting the matter said his set is a 17-inch double console antenna mounted on the roof. It is tuned for New Haven. Joseph G. Ross, manager of Johnson Brothers' appliance and sales department, also a South Coventry, Gerald Park, and other residents of similar happenings in the town.
He told of the case of one Coventry farmer whose television signals first bounced off a barn before coming into the house. The effect of this, Gowan said, was to give the farmer an entirely opposite signal from that for which his antenna was set.
The salesman revealed that the farthest station picked up by his own set was in Philadelphia.
Peterson also agreed that the reception of two southern stations was unusual.
At Benson's, Theodore Mortenson explained away the freak broadcasts as a possible case of "reflection." Mortenson said that in many instances air masses lowered enough to make the television signals bounce in the right place—just enough to crowd out or interfere with normal channel operation.
A total of the time one of Benson's servicemen was concerned, a set within the town and managed to get the picture and sound of an Oklahoma station. However, when the serviceman called the store to verify the report, the sets in the store could not capture the same signal. Another instance of freak reception, said Mortenson, is the case of a viewer in New Haven who held a broadcast from London via the BBC for several minutes.
The best time for long distance reception is when the ionosphere (the layer of air mass above the atmosphere) pushes down to below its normal height. Then television dealers and newspapers are usually bombarded with phone calls from excited "set" owners telling of the strange occurrence.

Dr. W. H. Baldwin Attends Meeting

Dr. W. Howard Baldwin of 232 Middle Turnpike east, Medical Anesthesiologist at the Manchester Memorial Hospital, was among 1200 anesthesiologists from all over the United States who attended a meeting on anesthesia at the Hotel New Yorker in New York City this week.

Dr. Baldwin joined the staff of the Manchester Memorial Hospital as a medical anesthesiologist in August of this year. He is associated with Dr. R. R. Plante in the anesthesiology department which now consists of two physicians and two registered nurse anesthetists.

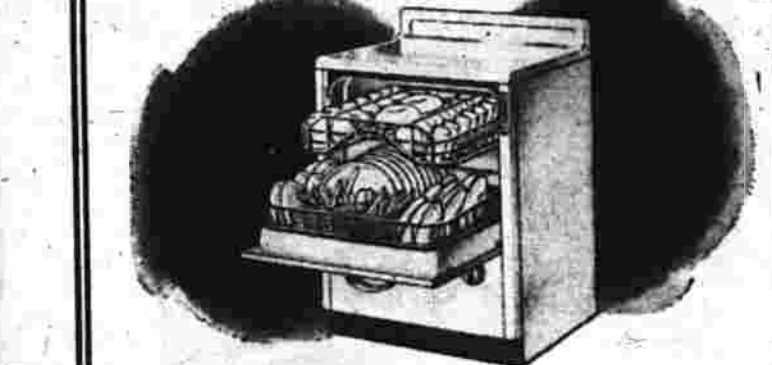

At the UN yesterday, representatives of India and Canada asked Lie to go slow on firing staff workers until a general assembly has had an opportunity to establish a general policy on the question of subversives.

Lie replied that the UN charter and staff regulations already give him sufficient authority to act. The Secretary General had been criticized by some persons in the UN for announcing he would handle cases of subversion on the basis of the recommendations of the panel of jurists.

The order, McCraney said, was issued as a result of the recent recommendations of a panel of three international jurists to UN Secretary General Trygve Lie.

The jurists, appointed to study the question of UN employment policies in the light of charges of subversion, recommended that disloyal Americans of the UN staff be fired and that any other UN employees also be ousted if they were found to have engaged in subversive activities or espionage against the United States.

The panel also recommended the ouster of any UN employee who refused to answer questions about espionage or subversive activities on the ground of possible self-incrimination. Several American employees of the UN recently have refused on that ground to answer some questions before the Senate Internal Security subcommittee.

Critics of the State Department a special federal grand jury here recently criticized the State department's methods of screening Americans hired by the UN, and the department replied that it had warned the UN in a number of cases.

McCraney told newsmen he had flown here from Washington to discuss Truman's order with Wiley, who now is a U. S. delegate to the UN.

A scheduled personal meeting between McCraney and Wiley did not take place, but they conferred by telephone.

Wiley, calling the Attorney General "a realistic, anti-Communist fighter," said in a statement issued at the UN.

"I wish the presidential directive for inter-agency collaboration had come long ago because a great amount of damage could have been spared all the way around."

"The lack of a modus operandi has been a crucial flaw in the solution of the whole problem and the cure could come only at the White House level."

"Whatever machinery is worked out will, I believe, be a step in the right direction and it will not prejudice the United States rule for the security of classified information. It will conform with the United Nations charter and will not interfere in any way with the development of an international civil service."

"Mr. Lie will have the facts. He may then act according to the charter and to the report of the panel of jurists. His inability to get the facts has severely hampered him thus far."

"It is my belief that when the General Assembly takes up this subject at its session next year, it will find that the subversive problem is well on its way to a fair solution."

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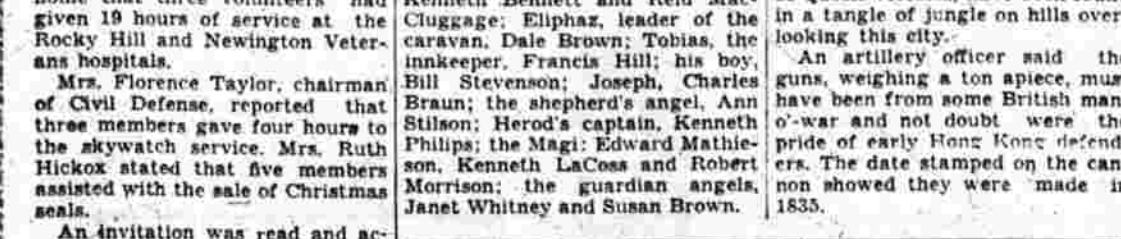

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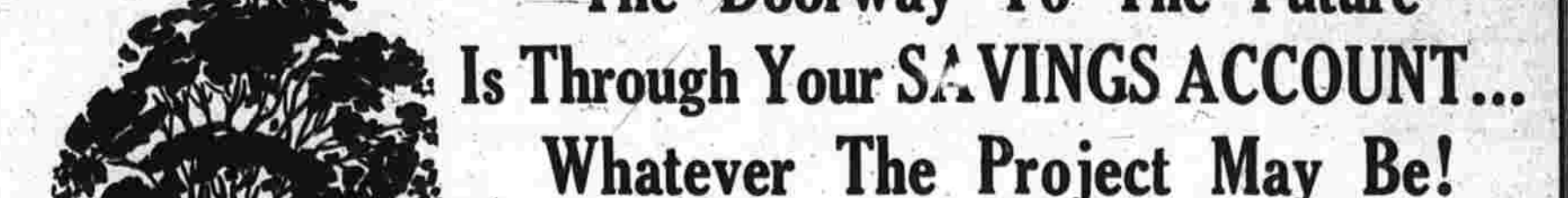
