Tolland TV-Influenced Youth Held For Shooting at Girl Friend

Tolland, Dec. 22—An 18-year-old local youth faced a charge today of trying to kill his former sweetheart as the result of an idea he said he got while watching television.

Horn, employed here as an apprentice tree climber, told investigators he drove away from the shooting and had been driving all night long without eating or sleeping. He said he drove to Vermont, New Hampshire, Boston and was in Rhode Island early Sunday prior to returning to Connecticut.

Shot At Saturday
Miss Smith told investigators that the shooting occurred early Saturday night while she stood at a table near a large picture window in her home, wrapping Christmas gifts.

Suddenly two shots crashed through the window, one shattered a small candy dish on the table before her and the other crashed into a chair close by.

Investigators focused suspicion on Horn after Miss Smith, who had been receiving telephone calls from him, trying to talk up things between them. She said she had refused them.

Turkish Officers To Study Economy

Istanbul—The Turkish army plans to open a national war college this year to teach such subjects as national and international economy.

Gen. William H. Arnold, head of an American military mission of 1,300 which is helping to train the Turkish army, announced the college. He said it would be established in Istanbul for senior officers and would be in addition to the present staff college.

Gen. Arnold said there are 35 major Turkish army schools modeled on the U. S. military school system.

Tokyo—(AP)—Square dancing, once highly popular among the Japanese, is on the way out, the Japan News reports.

The newspaper says responsibility for the decline belongs to the dancers themselves. One pioneer in the field observes that the dancers are "old-fashioned" and "outdated" after the war as a good way to reach the Japanese is to introduce American square dance. Some 500,000 of them—including the Emperor's brothers—look it up. But now, says the News, square dance enthusiasts have dwindled to 100,000.

GRANDMA'S SURPRISE MOLASSES COOKIES
Remember those large, soft, pungent cookies your grandmother used to make—nostalgic old-fashioned treats hard to find nowadays—well here is the recipe:
One cup molasses, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons soda, 2 teaspoons ginger, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, 1 teaspoon dry mustard, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup unbleached flour, 1 egg, unbeaten.
Cream together shortening, salt, soda and spices. Add sugar, cream until fluffy. Blend in molasses. Beat in egg. Add sifted flour alternately with cold coffee; beat batter 1/2 minute. Drop dough from teaspoon onto lightly greased cookie sheets. Keeping cookies round and about 2 inches apart. Bake 15 minutes or until done in a pre-heated moderate oven (375 degrees F.).
Variation: Press a solid chocolate mint wafer a pitted date, a dried fig, a piece of crystallized ginger, or a teaspoonful of mixed dried, glazed fruit into the center of each unbacked cookie mound from the above cookie dough. Cover with a small amount of dough. Bake as in above directions.

Martin said it would be impossible to compare the proposed salary brackets with past pay because no classification has existed and each case will have to be compared individually.

A sum of \$27,900 was included in the current budget for salary increases to town employees. Martin has said distributing of the sum will be made when classifications are set up and approved.

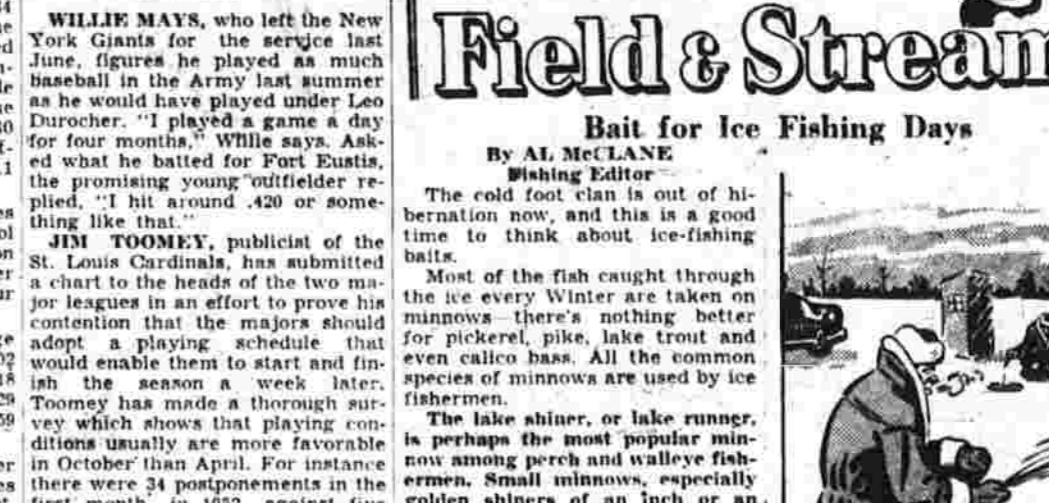
