man's last major acts was to declare this oil to be a naval reserve. States which claim the oil hope Eisenhower will reverse Truman's order.

Hagerty said about all he could say was that if Eisenhower does annual Truman's order, Eisenhower's own executive order will be announced when it is ready. He said this did not mean that Eisenhower would or would not issue such an order.

Many Messages The White House said Eisenhower was receiving a "fairly heavy" volume of telegrams, congratulating him in his accession to office and expressing reaction to his inaugural address yesterday.

In that address, the new President dedicated his administration to winning "an earth of peace" without ever appealing any aggressor.

Murray Snyder, assistant press secretary, said about 1,500 telegrams had been received by Eisenhower yesterday. He said they had not been sorted or answered, and that there was no report yet.

Newark, N.J., Jan. 21.—While bloodhounds have natural tracking ability, it takes a couple of years of patient training before a bloodhound leaves the fine points.

So says Patrolman Bill Taylor who makes a hobby of training dogs. His prize pup is a 10-month-old pure-bred American red who has proved his "nose" on several occasions. The dog's most spectacular feat was tracking a lost van to two miles, over mountains right to his front door.

"It was a gay luncheon he attended at Achenbach's house, Chief of Police, and the dog's presence attracted an affection for his chief he thought was 'unequaled in more than two miles."

Spreads in Florida Fernandina Beach, Fla., Jan. 20.—Schools here were ordered closed for a week because of the spread of an influenza-like disease. Dr. John W. McClaine, county health officer, said yesterday the outbreak has not reached epidemic proportions but that "it seems advisable to close the schools to prevent further spread."

McClaine warned parents not to permit children to "congregate in unnecessary assemblies."

Public and parochial schools at St. Augustine closed Monday because of what officials there de-

scribed as an outbreak of influenza. A respiratory disease had about 800 students at the University of Florida last Monday. The health officer reported that influenza may be spreading over the state, but it's not known what it is.

Dr. L. L. Parke, director of the state health department, said: "If it were real influenza, we'd expect more deaths than it. So far, none has been reported."

Last year a "small epidemic" of 2,207 was reported for the week ending Feb. 23, 1952, the peak for 1952.

Morse Says Ike Unfair To Wilson

The name, does it convey except by unanimous consent, was not a fair trial for confirmation of the floor and launched into an explanation of why he blocked action yesterday.

Morse denied that his action was "out of vindictiveness, retaliation, or revenge."

He said others would say this of him but he would not.

Morse resigned from the Republican party during the last campaign and supported Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee. He said he was not a member of the Senate and Democratic senators then joined in dumping him of two key Senate committees, Armed Services and Labor.

Sarcasically, Morse told the Senate he has reneged himself standing... no energy was created by his blocking confirmation yesterday.

Morse gave the Senate a lecture then on its duties in confirming presidential appointees, including cabinet members.

He said he would not oppose confirmation because he did not feel like an individual or his policies. The word at the White House that Eisenhower was blocking his selection of Wilson for Secretary of Defense came from James Hager, press secretary to Wilson. Hager's statement reported Wilson's questions about Eisenhower's position regarding the controversial Wilson appointment.

Hager said he knew of no change in the President's decision to appoint the former general Motors president to the cabinet.

Wilson's prospective appointment had been challenged by some Republicans and Democrats who quoted laws saying that a federal official on a non-making level may hold a financial interest in a company which is a defense contractor.

Senators Vile Oppose

General Motors, from which Wilson resigned as president, is the nation's biggest defense contractor. Some Senators who said Wilson should divest himself of \$2 1/2 million dollars worth of GM stock before taking any cabinet post.

Hager refused to discuss Eisenhower's early morning, 15-minute conference with the President, his Attorney General, and his chief of staff. He assumed the talk was about Wilson.

The press chief would say only that the President and the new President had a "very pleasant conversation."

A reporter asked, "Does the President feel that Wilson should get rid of his stock in General Motors?"

"I have nothing to say," said Hager.

The Senate Armed Services committee, which has been studying the prospective Wilson appointment, has put off hearings on the matter until Friday. Originally it had been scheduled to take up the case again today.

Ex-Convict Is Shot During Jail Break

Ansonia, Jan. 21.—An ex-convict who was shot as he lunged through a New Haven County jail window to freedom last night was recaptured at a point in a home here early today.

Donald Barker, 38, of uncertain address, offered no resistance when he was confronted by state and local police and New Haven Deputy Sheriff Daniel J. Patterson.

His captors found him suffering from a flesh wound of the leg, a fractured right elbow, and lacerated hand. Acting on a tip from Parker in the home of John Gabriel of 21 Beaver street.

Parker escaped the jail at 10:45 last night while being interrogated by Sheriff James P. Redding. He leaped through a ground floor window and was shot by turkey James Morano who was nearby.

Parker was returned to jail where Sheriff Redding said six stitches were required to close his leg wound.

Parker was scheduled to appear in New Haven Superior Court today for trial on a charge of theft of a motor vehicle. Despite the wounds, Redding said, Parker will make his scheduled appearance. A charge of escape from jail will be added, Redding said.

New First Lady Will Command Regiment of Whitehousekeepers

Washington (NEA)—The first lady to be called Mrs. Eisenhower, she is taking on an army yesterday. As ruler of the housekeeping staff at 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, Mrs. Eisenhower will be the Executive Mansion's regiment of maids, butlers, cooks, housemen, doormen, laundresses, gardeners and repairmen.

Sixty-five strong, with another 20 or so to handle miscellaneous jobs, they're battle-seasoned from years of battling with dirt, dust, and uninvited guests.

There's even an exterminator, except that at the Executive Mansion you politely refer to him as "the engineer" who sprays the place.

The new First Lady must learn some fine points of protocol. For instance, Mamie must never tell a White House maid to man a mop or wash a vacuum sweeper. Strangers who are tackled by maids to go outside, leaving a quiet of six to ten minutes, are charged with bed-making and sending a lady guest.

It would be a first-rate house to wait a butler to the grocery store. Each morning the shopping list is handed to Melvin Carter, the steward, who does all White House market purchases.

In spending the taxpayer's money for spinach and lamb chops, Carter doesn't have to stick to the same store. One rule, however, never changes—a White House policeman always accompanies him.

Another precaution Mamie will have to get used to is having every department state purchase requisited in the White House mail room before being delivered to her.

If she does shopping and carries the package home herself, there's that secret service man who'll stick by her side.

No Spring Cleaning

One housekeeping headache that doesn't exist at the White House is Spring and Fall cleaning. Preparing up the Executive Mansion is one perpetual process. Floors may be waxed three times in a single week and every few months floor-size dyes are sprayed on the dry cleaners and the carpets of separate crystals are sparkling in the big chandeliers are given a bath in ammonium sulfate.

The domestic staff works a 40-hour week and has different days off. Tubers probably work longer hours than anybody in the place. They've been known to arrive at 6 a. m. and stay put at their posts 'til midnight—with no overtime pay.

When veteran doorman Robert Mays takes his day off there are still four others to take turns at the front door. Mays is one of the real Washington teamsters. His tenure at the White House dates back to the administration of President Taft.

Another staff veteran, head gardener Robert Redman, started at the White House when he was 16 years old. Redman claims his work is light compared to the early FDR days. During Roosevelt's administration 32 greenhouses, which belonged to the White House, were destroyed in a fire. Redman's job is to take care of the White House's 32 greenhouses.

Redman says, "that this would be cheaper than rebuilding 32 greenhouses."

NOW IT'S LEGAL

Some Quit




