**SMFD to Draw Regulations Governing Fire Chief Job**

**Data Will Be Available For Those Interested In Applying for Post**  
A set of regulations and requirements for the position of fire chief for the South Manchester Fire District will be drawn up by the Board of Fire Commissioners and submitted before a new chief is appointed, a spokesman for the board indicated today.  
No action was taken by the board in naming a new chief at its monthly meeting held Tuesday night, one day earlier than the usual meetings scheduled for the second Wednesday of each month.  
Interested parties will be allowed to study the requirements of the post before they submit their names for consideration. Several requests for consideration have already been received by the board, both verbal and written applications, but the board feels it will not be hasty in the matter and will let applicants know the requirements of the job.  
The post, according to the spokesman, will be screened. Applicants will receive a copy of these regulations and will have been drawn up. It is not expected that any action will be taken on this matter before the next meeting of the board, scheduled for Wednesday, March 4.  
The department will continue to operate under its present setup until W. Clifford Mason acting chief and Cedric Straghan fire marshal.

contributed to early work on the atomic bomb.  
Most of these appeals for clemency were directed to Harry Truman, who did not get around to a decision, because the Justice Department was still studying the case, before he yielded the presidency to Eisenhower on Jan. 20.  
Att. Gen. Brownell carried the Rosenberg case papers to the White House about 4:30 p. m. yesterday. Little more than half an hour later, the President's decision was announced in a statement.  
Presidential aide said Eisenhower's refusal came after a detailed personal study of the case which he started before his inauguration.  
He said he anticipated there would not be time for the outgoing Truman administration to complete a study of the case to the convicted atom spies.  
Eisenhower reportedly withheld any decision until the case had been studied by the Justice Department. But he was said to have thoroughly familiar with all facts of the record by the time he returned to his report to him.  
"I have given earnest consideration to the convicted case of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg and to the appeals for clemency made in their behalf," the President said.  
"Exceeding the life of a citizen, it involves the deliberate betrayal of the entire nation and could very well result in the death of many, many thousands of innocent citizens."  
"But their act, these 100 individuals, was done in the name of the cause of freedom for which free men are fighting, and dying at the hands of their enemies."  
The statement went on: "The Rosenbergs were brave men and their conviction was not in any way a measure of justice; there is no new evidence and no mitigating circumstances which would justify changing the sentence."  
"I have determined that it is my duty as President in the interest of the people of the United States, not to set aside the verdict of their national and military courts."  
The Rosenbergs were sentenced to April 5, 1953. Morton Sobell, who was tried with them, was sentenced to 30 years in prison. David Greenglass, Mrs. Rosenberg's brother, got 15 years after slapping suspension.

**Flu Outbreak In Down Trend**

Washington, Feb. 12.—The Public Health Service said today reports from various parts of the country show that the influenza outbreak is on a downward trend. Declines in the number of new cases of respiratory illness or influenza were reported from New York, Virginia, Arkansas, Louisiana, California, and Alaska.  
However, influenza and pneumonia deaths in 56 reporting cities totaled 554 in the week ended Jan. 12, an increase of 20 per cent over the 463 in the previous week, the agency's weekly summary showed.  
"The disease apparently has been most widespread in the central and southern parts of the country," it added, "and generally has been a mild infection with the 'A-type' type of influenza virus, having a few days and having a low complication rate."

son of Sawa City, Ia. Thomson was captured by their captors on Corvair after Provoo, who was in favor with the Prison camp commandant, reported him as uncooperative and anti-Japanese.  
The jury of seven women and five men found Provoo guilty of offering his services to the Japanese and of leaking information to radio broadcasts from Tokyo during the war.  
The charges on which the jury was unable to agree were that Provoo tried to persuade an American soldier in questioning a fellow prisoner for the purpose of obtaining information for the Japanese.  
The judge returned the verdict at 9:30 p. m. last night after 13 hours and 45 minutes of actual deliberation. It had received the case at 4:59 p. m. Tuesday. The trial started Oct. 27.  
The judge told the jurors: "I believe in my conscience that the verdict at which you have arrived is justified by the evidence."  
The defense has called Provoo and 34 other witnesses to back his contention that he remained loyal to the United States after his capture but had courted the favor of the Japanese so as to be in a position to get extra food and other benefits for his fellow prisoners. The defense also contended that Provoo's propaganda broadcasts for the Japanese were made after he had become convinced that refusal would lead to his execution.  
The prosecution called 44 witnesses. The defense was brought from various parts of the United States and Japan.  
Provoo, a native American who formerly lived in Sausalito, Calif., quit his job in a San Francisco bank before World War II and went to Okinawa, where he learned the Japanese language. After returning to the United States, he enlisted in the Army and was sent to the Philippines.  
Two assistants to the U. S. At-Lawyer, Moses L. Kove and Albert Blumberg, contended at trial that Provoo betrayed his comrades when Corvair fell May 6, 1942, and continued to aid the Japanese until Japan surrendered Aug. 14, 1945.

**Chiang Ban Suggested By Ellender**

Ellender said today that the United States Seventh Fleet will no longer "shield" Red China from attack by Chiang's Formosa forces.  
"What I would like to find out is whether or not Chiang-Kai-shek is the man to lead the Nationalists. It may be difficult to get Chinese leaders on the mainland to rally around Chiang."  
In a speech prepared for House delivery today, Rep. Battle (D-Ala) proposed a "very comprehensive" U. S. Navy force operating under United Nations authority, of present efforts to embargo supplies to Communist China.  
Battle wrote the law which requires that countries receiving U. S. assistance must not send vital materials to China, unless exempted by the President. He said other methods for blocking such shipments are now being tried and said these should be reviewed before further action is taken.  
A naval blockade, Battle said, would stop some shipments but would not end them all. "Since China could be supplied by land from Russia and neighboring Asiatic countries."  
So far as is known, he added, no major allies of the U. S. are permitting war material shipments to the Iron Curtain countries. But he said the U. S. and Canada are the only nations which have severed all trade ties with Red China. He listed four other embargos now in effect among American allies:  
1. An agreement not to send ships or strategic items to the Soviet bloc.  
2. A UN resolution banning strategic shipments to Red China.  
3. An almost complete embargo by Japan against exports to Communist countries.  
4. Arrangements to keep vital items sent to British Hong Kong and Portuguese Macau from being trans-shipped to the Chinese interior.
