Mission Proves Challenge; Reuben Joins Press Table

(Ed. note: This is the third in a series of special articles by Gabriel Reuben, writing as the Herald's on-the-scene correspondent at the educators' convention at Atlantic City. The first dispatch appeared in the regular Bulletin column.)

Atlantic City, N. J., Feb. 19. (Special)—My double mission here (reporting as The Herald's special correspondent and attending the educators' gathering) is proving to be a challenge in more ways than one. It is difficult to sit in on some of the talks in my capacity as a school administrator and yet retain the unbiased, objective trend of thought so essential to journalism.

It came as no surprise that the day to hear the two principal faces of extremely difficult problems, The man who uttered these words is well-known to me. He is Walter A. Anderson, New York University school of education. I recently completed a course with him at NYU.

Outline Five Keys
Anderson's intensive study of the subject outlined five keys that may lead to solution of the principal problems. The obstacles were listed as:

1. Crowded conditions in elementary schools because of high birth rates during the past several years;
2. Securing and keeping good teachers because of the teacher shortage;
3. Keeping the professional staff professional through in-service education programs;
4. Finding time in very busy days for leadership in improving the instructional program;
5. Interpreting modern education to the public and uniting their participation in planning and operating the program;
6. Securing better services for children, including those with special difficulties and the gifted;
7. Evaluating and improving the educational program;
8. Improving preparation.

Graff, Rockville and myself had charming company for dinner last night. We dined with Mrs. Dorothy Hutson of Somers, chairman of the State Board of Education.

Area administrators also have attended the Connecticut state breakfast for the various delegations.

—Some special exhibits
Proving to be a great attraction here is an exhibit of school supplies containing everything from a pencil to gymnasium equipment. One of the interested spectators at this massive exhibition was Paschal Poe of Manchester, Conn. He agreed with me that for size and quantity of examples, this display is the largest ever seen in the United States.

By now you have all read in The Herald that Walter P. Reuther, president of the CIO, also addressed the convention. By using my press card from The Herald I managed to get in with the reporters who covered the talk and heard it from the press section.

After his address he was again interviewed and has his picture taken by a national service. It may be possible, if the picture is released in the Manchester area, that readers may be able to pick out familiar faces, including my own.

Speech Stands Out
One particular speech here stands out above all others in my mind. The speaker was Douglas Horton, minister and executive secretary of the General Council of Congregational Christian Churches in America.

Speech does not permit a detailed report of what he said but a world of meaning lies in his opening remarks:

"Undoubtedly many of you will remember the words of the Grand Inquisitor in Dostoevsky's Brothers Karamazoff:

"I tell you that man is tormented by no greater anxiety than to find someone quicker than he to whom he can hand over the gift of freedom with which he, ill-fated creature, is born."

Those words of a Russian novelist have a special significance for us in these days when we are all trying to understand Russia, its leaders and its people. I take it

that American educators as they face their task are determined to do for us in them lies to prevent the handing over of that freedom to anyone else by those who are born with it. These educators are engaged in the business of creating in the coming generation a love of their inherent liberties and an ability to maintain them.

—But how enormously difficult the task!

His long and thoughtful address concluded:

"The teacher who is a master of this world's freedom... is aware that at heart, it is both positive and affirmative. To teach a child to be free is to finally teach him what he can do in this world."

Tasks Are Aligned
At this point I see a very close resemblance between the educator's task and that of the religious teacher. It is that awakening of the soul to itself and to its opportunity for the world.

Let us say with the French that the world of the spirit is the United States.

Connecticut Not Alone
To hear these distinguished speakers at the various convention halls makes one realize that Connecticut is not alone in the ever-mounting series of obstacles and problems set in the path of education. The Hartford and Tolland County school groups have had the opportunity to swap chatter and ideas with representatives of schools all across the United States and many foreign countries as well.

An I mentioned yesterday, several states are seeking more time in which to file applications for educational TV permits. Governor Lodge of our own state has told of his plan to urge those attending the New England governors' conference to petition for more time. It is said that he will seek a two-year extension of the deadline.

Among other highlights of the convention, The American Association of School Administrators has adopted a resolution declaring that local school board and administrators can protect schools from subversive influence without federal investigation.

—The Basic Responsibility
The resolution stated "Basic responsibility for control and administration of public education rests with the states and local school systems." Administrators renewed their demands for federal aid to schools and organization of the U. S. Office of Education as an independent agency to provide research and service for schools.
