News of Local National Guard

This week, this column will explain one of the benefits and advantages of the National Guard, namely—retirement.
The National Guard has set up a retirement policy on the same basis as the regular Army. As a member of the Guard, any man, officer or enlisted, earns points every year towards his retirement. For instance, for every drill period attended he receives one point, summer training 15 days, 15 points, and for being a member of the Guard in good standing an additional 15 points. No limit is imposed as to the number of retirement points that may be earned in any one year and points up to 365 for a normal year or 365 points for a "leap" year.
However, the act provides that not more than 60 points per year may be credited for "inactive" duty in a year. That is if a man does not attend a service school, which is considered "active." The way many men in the guard receive more points is to request two years active duty in the Army of the United States or requesting to go to some service school of his choice or by taking an Army Extension Course, upon completion thereof, becomes an officer in the National Guard.
This retirement becomes effective upon the age of 60 years of age, whereupon the enlisted man or officer, retires on one-sixth of

Sign Contract To Modernize Church Organ

A contract has been signed with Austin Organ, Inc. of Hartford, to completely rebuild, modernize, and enlarge the present organ in the sanctuary of the Second Congregational Church, it has been announced.

The Spencer-Ford Memorial organ now in use was the gift of the late Mrs. Lucy Spencer and was installed by the Austin Organ Company in 1910. It has three manuals, 24 stops, 23 mechanical combination pistons, and it operates entirely by tubular-pneumatic action.

Heavy pipes and vital parts of the present organ will be retained and made a part of the new instrument. When completed, the new organ will have three manuals, 50 stops, about 12 electric combination pistons, and will be made to operate entirely by electric action.

The full specifications for the new organ have been drawn by the organist and choirmaster of Second Church, Barclay P. Wood, in collaboration with H. Leroy Baumgartner of the Yale University College of Music faculty, and Percival Stark, vice president and treasurer of Austin Organ, Inc.

The new console will be prepared for the later addition of nine-rank German classic positive organ which will add greatly to the tonal flexibility of the instrument.

The entire front of the church sanctuary is also to be changed at the same time that the new organ is installed. Incorporation of the plan is the removal of the organ display-pipe case, and the erection of a recessed, suspended cross, and central altar.

The choir will be located centrally to the left and right of the altar, and the organ console will be recessed into the wall on one side so that the organist will be out of sight of the congregation.

Work has already begun in the organ factory on Woodland street, Hartford, and it is expected that the entire renovation will be completed this summer. Dedication of the new organ will be performed in the fall and will be open to the public without charge.

The Doctor Says

Case of Old Yung Condition Is Unusual; of No Consequence, It Needs No Treatment

By EDWIN F. JORDAN, M. D.

The tongue is a remarkably healthy organ, but when something goes wrong with it it may be distressing and it is always worrisome.

Q—My 21-year-old daughter has what is called geographical tongue. The tongue peels in spots, gets better overnight, and then the same thing occurs again and again. Is there anything that can be done?

A—In this curious condition, the surface of the tongue appears slightly elevated and ridged over in certain portions. What causes this is unknown. The disorder does have a tendency to come and go and become somewhat sensitive. However, it is considered to be of no consequence and does not require any treatment, which is more or less ineffective anyway.

Q—Please describe an arterio-sclerotic heart. How does this condition affect one's health of life?

A—This is a rather general term which merely indicates that there is some hardening of the blood vessels and depending upon the degree of difficulty, the age of the patient and other factors, but may not seriously affect the expectation of life.

A—Since the trouble is apparently worse at night than when you are moving around, it seems doubtful that there is any serious difficulty with circulation. You could try warming the feet in hot (not burning) water just before retiring. You might also have some difficulty with this using an electric blanket.

Q—What causes a person to sigh every time he takes a deep breath? Could it be that I am so awfully lonesome for my daughter since she got married?

A—This sounds like a habit which might have started from lonesomeness. If this is the case, you should try to overcome this lonesome feeling by engaging in useful activity, rather than to sigh over something which cannot be helped and is probably for the best anyway.

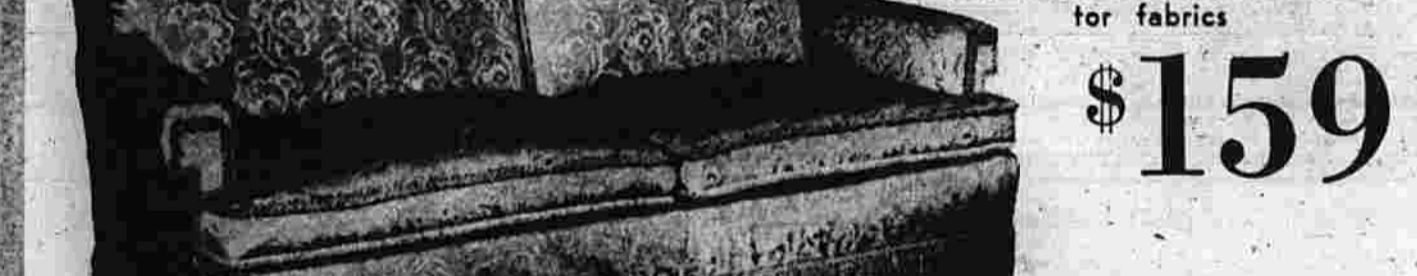

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He Got His Picture! Navy Cameraman Dies Doing Job on Orishany

By SAM SUMMERLIN
Tokyo, March 11.—(AP)—A young Navy cameraman captured on film the last seconds of a wild bomb which skidded toward him down a carrier flight deck. Then he was killed as the bomb exploded.

The Navy released the tragic story today.
Hot fragments and flames killed another man and wounded 15 more when the bomb blew up on the deck of the fast U. S. carrier Orishany off Korea's east coast last Friday.

The Navy said six of the wounded still are in serious condition, but all are showing definite improvement.
The tragedy occurred when a Navy Corsair warplane returned from an air strike over North Korea with one bomb still dangling from the wing. The missile had failed to come loose over the carrier.

The plane touched the flight deck, the bomb tore loose, bounced twice on the deck and exploded.
Flames burst out. Ammunition went off. Fragments pierced the gas tanks of a jet fighter, forcing it to crash into the hangar deck.

The pilot, knocked unconscious, was rescued by an airman who dashed through the flames and explosions, cut loose the parachute and bailed the pilot to safety.
The two killed were Thomas Lee McGraw, 22, photographer, Airman of the U. S. Navy, and Thomas M. Yeager, 19, aviation electrician, U. S. Navy.

The photographer was at his station to take motion pictures of the carrier landing. When the bomb came loose, McGraw started his camera. He was hit while taking the pictures. The camera was shattered by the explosion and McGraw was killed instantly.

The Navy said the film escaped destruction and would be released tonight.
Yeager was killed by fragmentation while repairing electrical circuits of an aircraft on the deck. Fire fighters and workmen labored all night.

At daylight, the big carrier was ready to resume the war against the Communists.
"Well-done!" said Vice Adm. Joseph J. Clark, boss of the U. S. Seventh Fleet.

The tragedy sparked deeds of heroism.

Langford W. Henshaw, 23, Aviation Electrician 3/C from Odessa, Tex., was struck in the back by a large fragment, but dragged Yeager from the debris and burning area in a futile effort to save his life.

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Says U. S. Takes Initiative In New Far Eastern Policy

Basic Factors Involved Are Outlined to Rotary By Dean McReynolds

Although the basic elements of America's foreign policy in the Far East haven't changed since the Republican administration came into power, the approach to this policy has changed in that the United States has attempted to seize the initiative in its dealings with Communist China, Rotarians were told at the Country Club last night by Dr. George E. McReynolds, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at the University of Connecticut. The speaker, recognized as an authority on the Far East, also heads the Department of Government and International Relations at the university.

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Reserve Launches Recruiting Drive

Two companies of combat engineers in the United States Army Reserve, which have been training in the West Side Recreation Building are embarking on a recruiting drive in the hope of getting into the top echelon.

In discussing an embargo and blockade of Communist China, the speaker stressed that the two ideas should be kept separate. He pointed to a blockade by the U. S. as a risky and inadvisable step. His principal objective, he said, would be to try to prevent the arrival in China of about one million tons of shipping.

The greatest percentage of this shipping would be non-military in nature and much of it would be in coastal waters in small ships that ply back and forth within the three mile limit. A naval blockade would force the Communists to rely upon their own resources and the UConn professor questioned whether the U. S. would be prepared to bomb these railroads and major risk of war with Red China when the major risk was to the U. S. in the Far East.

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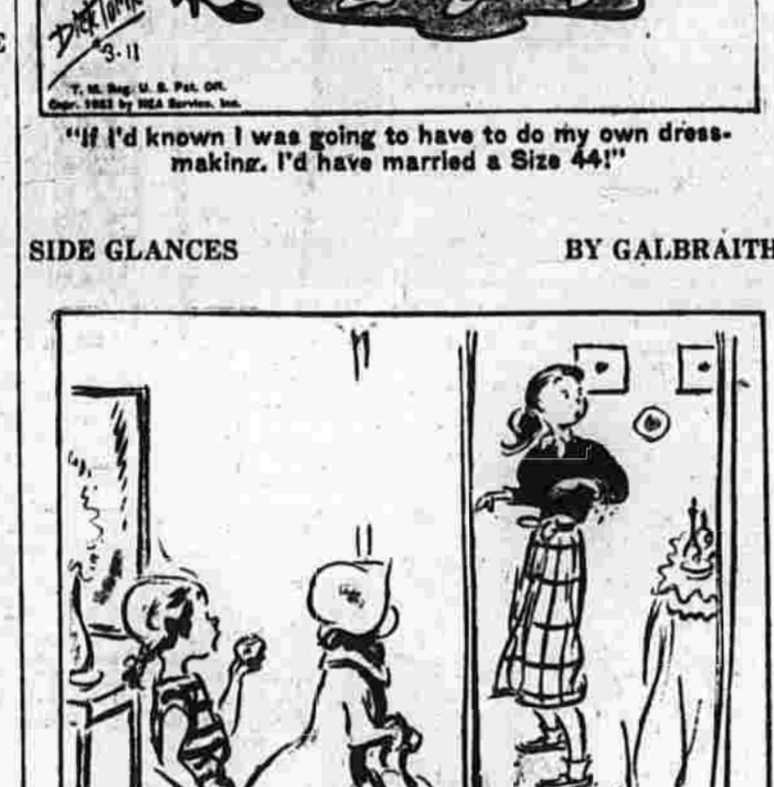

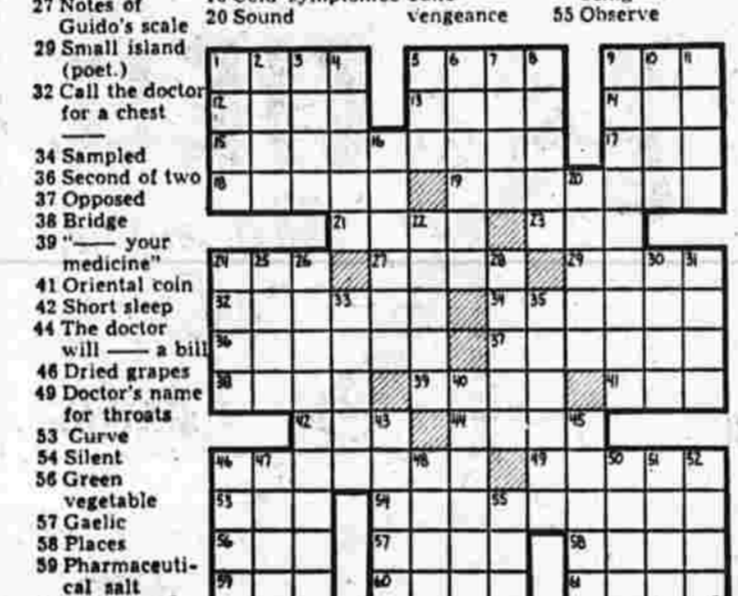
