Atomic Troops Unscathed In Yucca Flats Maneuvers

Model Town, Store Dummies in Atomic Blast

Atom Bomb Site, Nev.—America's most daring atomic troops took a battering today but came unscathed through a low level nuclear blast that tolled continuity as far distant as 300 miles. Shortly after the rumbling explosion, the two battalion combat teams moved through a heavy fall of dust in their scheduled maneuvers.

U. S. Views A-Blast on Television

New York, March 17—(AP)—Television viewers across the nation were given a close-up view of an atomic blast today as a grim reminder of the need for Civil Defense.

The pooled talent of the blast itself, over the ABC, CBS and NBC networks, was one phase of a three-part educational demonstration by the Atomic Energy Commission and Civil Defense authorities.

The first was a view Sunday of the blast site on Yucca Flat, Nev. Two typical dwellings, several types of home bomb shelters, and a number of automobiles, the first of which will be at 4:30 p.m. (E.S.T.) today when TV cameras are expected to arrive.

The device, of a type hitherto not used, was set off promptly on schedule at 8:20 a. m. (E.S.T.) as correspondents, after waiting the required four seconds, looked up the horizon was lighted with a glowing orange fireball.

U. S. Troops Whip Reds in Trenches

Seoul, March 17—(AP)—American infantrymen today virtually wiped out a force of more than 350 Chinese Reds in a bloody close-quarters battle along a trench network in Little Gibraltar.

Two reinforced Chinese companies began the assault at 2 a. m. under cover of a 2,000-round artillery and mortar barrage. The Reds scrambled up Little Gibraltar's steep, rocky slopes and were ordered to get into the trenches.
