Tito Sees Two British Airmen Die in Crash

 tar. Four men were listed as missing and presumed dead in that accident.
 Visibility was down to about 1,000 feet at the time of the crash. The scattered wreckage of the Meteors sent flames and smoke hundreds of feet into the air.
 A RAF officer said that before the flying began Tito twice had asked to cancel the display because of the weather. After the crash he turned to Lord Tedder, Marshal of the RAF, and said: "Please, do not have any more."
 But squadron leader Neville Duke—one of Britain's best-known pilots—already had taken up a glancing Hawker Hunter into the heavy overcast.
 Then Duke came roaring down. As his engines screamed he pushed past the speed of sound. Tito who had started for his car thinking the display was over stopped and looked up. Three sharp bangs and a whistle signalled that Duke had broken the barrier again.
 The planes that collided here carried only one pilot. As the formation flew past Tito, the pilots from their open cockpits each gave an eye left to the Yugoslav, who returned the salute.
 The Meteors were engaged in a "scramble," designed to demonstrate how fast the British can get jets into the air in an emergency.
 Tito, who has some insight into Russia's air might, showed keen interest in British equipment and flying techniques.

 He said he saw about 15 Chinese move up to the bunker. "I just stood there and fired with my BAR (Browning automatic rifle). I fired until it jammed. Then I got an M-1 from Whopiner in the bunker and fired."
 Stanley said he fired 31 magazines, each holding 20 rounds, with his BAR. Then he fired about 12 rounds with the M-1. "I'm positive I killed eight Chinese," he said. "Every line opened his head over the trench I fired about a dozen rounds. I saw eight drop."
 Stanley said he did not "tank" he was a hero.
 "If the Lord wasn't with me, I wouldn't have made it," he said. "It said in my Bible, 'The Lord is my shepherd.'"
 Stanley was attending DeSoto Parish High School in Mansfield when he entered the Army July 22, 1951, to serve in Korea. His first assignment was to the 8888 Central Postal Directory at Little Gibraltar, his first battle.
 He said about 10 Communist grenades exploded near him while he was guarding the bunker but that only suffered a slight cut on the face and another on the hand.
 Second Division officers had been looking for Stanley since they returned from Korea. The colonel now a colored soldier saved his life.
 The colonel described the Negro as "the bravest man I've ever seen."

Hebron Townfolk Show Irritation Over Torrential Rainstorm

Hebron, March 18 (Special)—Townpeople here are just about emerging from the effects of last Friday's torrential rain, which flooded cellars and caused irritated residents to dig out their drains, letting the unwanted water run down the street at Hebron center. This was the only place it would escape.
 The improvised cannon looked like a small child's toy. It was in vogue at the time, mimicking the hands and Hebron was dubbed "Pumpkin" then and there. A travel agent passing through, and noting the commotion, wrote "I am going to get you out of the pump. You may pray and fire your pump."
 This is the old story, as related by Rev. Samuel Peters, who traveled to Hebron in 1699. He called it "Pumpkin" because of an improvised library pole on the street.

Africa to Iran on the USSR's borders in Asia makes these countries a natural market for Communist propaganda.

1. Soviet agents in many guises, including their heaviest artillery, are using the young educated groups, have achieved notable gains which have permitted Communists and usable fellow travelers to penetrate high places.

3. In all movements, Communist agents have successfully penetrated virtually all nationalist movements, come to a greater degree than others, in the current surge of Africa and Middle East nationalism. These elements as a tool for leading backward nations in a state of turmoil and to whip up hatreds for western nations.

Last week OPS closed out all charges on consumer goods and foods.

Effect of all the decontrol, OPS officials said, may be price increases totaling three billion dollars a year, about one billion dollars of it felt by consumers directly and the rest in the form of higher taxes to pay for a two billion dollar rise in the cost of defense goods.

The first major reaction to the ending of the last price controls was a boost by the Prospect Building Co. from \$23.50 to \$27.50 for sulphur at Port Sulphur, Tex. Steel and tool manufacturers

used the threat of Communism as a blackmail in what they think will be a means of forcing the United States into a policy more oriented toward the Arab side away from Israel. But one and all, the Arabs have openly hailed the USSR's break of relations with Israel. They mutter that they will "shake hands with the devil" to get their way.

In exploiting differences between Arabs and the West, the Communists have not overlooked the Moslem religion. At the present time two prominent sheikhs, Mohammed Ali Ashmar and Salah Zaim, brother of the assassinated Syrian Premier Huzni Zaim, are touring the Soviet Union. Other religious leaders lured to Moscow or Iron Curtain countries are given the full treatment and return home to preach that Communism is Islam's friend. They overlook the fate of millions of Moslems under Soviet domination.

Such Arabs have been sold an anti-Zion bill of goods. They quote the old Arab proverb: "The enemy of my enemy is my friend."

Famous Choir To Sing Here

Children in 3 Grades To Hear Vienna Boys On Monday, March 30

Children of the fourth, fifth and sixth grades in Manchester schools are to have the privilege of hearing the world-famous Vienna Choir Boys at the Verplanck School on Monday, March 30. Two performances are to be given at 11 a. m. and 1:15 p. m. to accommodate the 2,100 pupils in these grades.

This is the 10th time Vienna's historic Konvikt School, founded by imperial decree more than 400 years ago has sent one of its finest trained groups to North America. The Choir is to appear in 70 cities in the U. S. and Canada this season. In addition to an appearance on television Sunday evening, March 22, they will give a concert at the Bushnell Memorial in Hartford on Sunday, March 29. In their repertoire are included operatic songs with orchestral accompaniment, sacred and secular music, and folk songs.

The 20 boys in the group range in age from 7 to 12. Thousands of parents try in vain to enroll their boys in the school. Only about 100 are accepted each year. Both Josef Haydn and Franz Schubert were members in their childhood.

The concert in Manchester is one of the three events of the Fine Arts program for this year, sponsored by the local PTA Council, with the cooperation of the Verplanck School, the Manchester Municipal Club, for the children of the fourth, fifth, and sixth grades in all the Manchester schools. The painting demonstration given in November by Harry Bellinger, famous marine painter, was the first event of the series. The third to be a play, "Hugoburg," presented last this spring by the Manchester Municipal Club of the High School under the direction of Mrs. Helen Page Skinner.

The program by the Vienna Choir Boys is made possible by the cooperation of the 11 PTAs of Manchester, the Educational Club, and a contribution from the Elementary School Music Fund. Arrangements were made by Miss Martha White, supervisor of music in the elementary schools.

Pick Students For CD Work

The first step in setting up miniature Civil Defense organizations in the town's schools has been taken with the appointment of a coordinator for each school, Edward W. Krasenics, CD director, announced today.

Krasenics said the coordinators will be trained by personnel in the present organization and they in turn will train pupils in emergency techniques, including first aid.

The purpose of the move, the CD director explained, is to enable the schools to handle any emergency which might arise in the town's organization can assist.

Each school group will be self-sufficient, Krasenics said, but will be part of the town-wide setup.

The hearing will take place at 2 p. m. in the hearing room of the Municipal Building.

East Center Dispute Has Plenty of Angles

Court May Not Rule on Whether the Planners Are Right or Wrong In Change to Business

By ALEX GIBELLI

The appeal from the Town Planning Commission's change to business zone of property at Lanox and East Center streets, scheduled to be heard by the Court of Common Pleas in Hartford April 7, may not result in a decision as to whether the commission was right or wrong in changing the land from residential zone.

One of the allegations in the writ by Attorney Herman Yule, representing 14 objectors to the zone change made after a March 6 public hearing, concerns the commission's procedure.

It alleges that a member of the commission is a personal or financial interest in the zone change. The statutes provide that no person so interested may participate in the decision as a member of the commission.

One of the objectors, William A. Allen, a member of the commission's office as owner of property in the zone, which is within 400 feet of the zone change.

The statutes do not specify that a person cannot participate in the decision if he owns property within a certain distance of land in question.

"The statutes do not define what constitutes being 'directly or indirectly interested in a personal or financial sense.'"

According to one local disinterested legal opinion, the court might decide that Allen should have participated in the decision himself and decision of the commission is therefore invalid.

That would leave unanswered the question of whether the zone change was proper.

The petitioners for the change would be free to apply to the commission again.

An anonymous vote of the court might also decide that although Allen should have participated in the decision, the five commission votes were needed to make the change.

Four is three-fourths of five (for voting purposes) and a three-fourths vote is necessary for a zone change when a protest is signed by owners of 20 per cent or more of the area of the lot within 500 feet of the property. Otherwise a simple majority is sufficient.

It has not been determined whether that number signed an appeal.

A warrant charging Philip R. Eisman, 45, of Brooklyn, N. Y., with obtaining narcotics by fraud, was sent to New London, where he is waiting trial in Superior Court under \$7,000 bond, where he is on the same charge and Saturday, a case involving Thomas J. Lally, 66, of Hartford, was continued to April 8 under \$1,000 bond.

In court this morning, Markham said that when denied the drug, he hemorrhaged and that he had suffered seven hemorrhages in the last week. He said that he had been administered the drug in a sanitarium and needed it for his medical condition.

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"Operation Cave"

The present of two sample houses at yesterday's atomic explosion test in Nevada gives specific emphasis to the report that the Eisenhower administration is concerned with whether or not the American people should undertake, at a cost of untold billions of dollars, what might as well be called "Operation Cave."

"Operation Cave" would do what construction and location measures could do to render this nation safe against atomic attack.

If we went into it realistically, we would soon understand why it ought to be called "Operation Cave."

For our industries, and the populations which support them, would have to be relocated, and our big cities dispersed. And if we were realistic about where to relocate, where to disperse to, we would have to come to the conclusion that there is only one place which is safe in an atomic age, and that is underground.

There may be refinements upon this. We may, for instance, discover that we can maintain the semblance of a normal industry, or home, so long as it has its own cave built into it. So long as we were always within a few feet of the cave mouth, we might proceed with the pretense of living on top of this earth. But we would certainly have to sleep in our caves. And we might as well be frank about it; where our security would be, there would we be, most of the time.

The question we have to decide, if we are going to permit ourselves this kind of world, is that of whether it is worth it. Is life worth preserving, if it must return to the cave? We doubt that it is. We suspect that, if man ever come to this point, man ought to give up.

And if we were to choose to survive in caves, for what purpose would we be surviving? Judging by the process which would have sent us into the cave, our only purpose in survival there would be to await the development of the weapon which would prove a cave-buster. We would live in caves only until the ingenuity of man associated with the development of the defense offered by the cave. Why survive in order to keep on plotting to end our own capacity to survive.

Can man hide from man? We do not think so.

Can we hide from the evil that it is in us, that makes us willing to plot and deliver death for each other? We cannot hide from the evil that it is in us.

We can live only if we face man. We can live only if we face the evil that is in man. We cannot run from them. We cannot hide from them. We have only one real choice—whether we are going to face them, and deal with them—or surrender the responsibility for doing so.

"Operation Cave" would not mean life. It would mean merely the temporary postponement of death. It would, therefore, be acknowledgment that death was certain and life impossible.

Should we head for the caves? Why? To gain a little more time during which human beings would start adjusting themselves to the life habits of the rat?

Self preservation, they say, would be the first law of our nature. On that basis, it might be considered the eminently practical thing to build ourselves a nation full of caves. But would this be self-preservation?

What, should we build in the atomic age? We should build far and open cities, and homes open to the sun, and on hillsides. We should open and expose ourselves to man, because we are man. We should give up the pretense that man can defend against man, and

The G.O.P. "Takes It Away"

The first important legislative measure to be introduced in the Republican Congress is of late eloquent tones.

It is the measure to elevate the Federal Security Agency to Cabinet status, calling it the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

This measure is nothing more or less than an official recognition, from the new administration at Washington, of the fact that national security is not only here to stay, but such an important national policy that it deserves Cabinet status becoming one of the main functions of the federal government. This is a proposed new department, within the Eisenhower administration, for the "twentieth state" heritage of the New Deal. It is to be the vehicle for the protection and the efficient operation and the expansion of these social reforms made by the New Deal which are, in the opinion of level-headed Americans here to stay.

Now for the ironies involved. "Don't let them take it away" was one of the Democratic war cries in the last campaign, and it was applied out by many Democratic orators, into the charge that the Republicans, if they got into power, would start "taking away" the security of the American people.

Now that the new Republican administration is making the first major legislative move one which strengthens and confirms such "security," what, we may ask, are the Democrats doing? They are, of course, admitting that they favor the general principle involved. But, in their committee and legislative actions, they are following a course of obstruction and delay, and some of the bolder among them are actually advocating the repeal of the Eisenhower re-organization plan.

Well, we can hardly blame them for wanting to protect their campaign song. But they had better watch out, lest they be caught in a bit turn against their own supposed principles.
