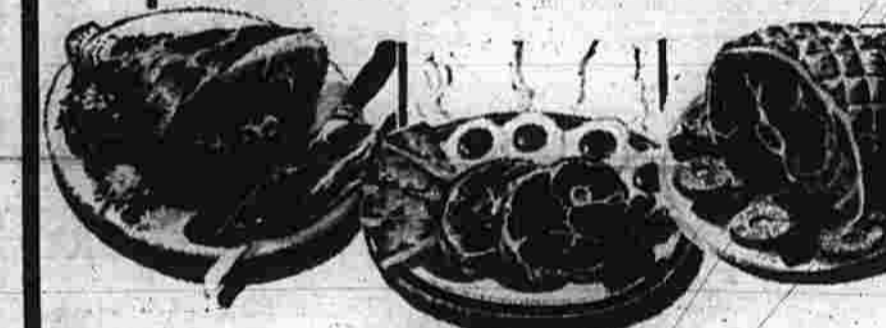

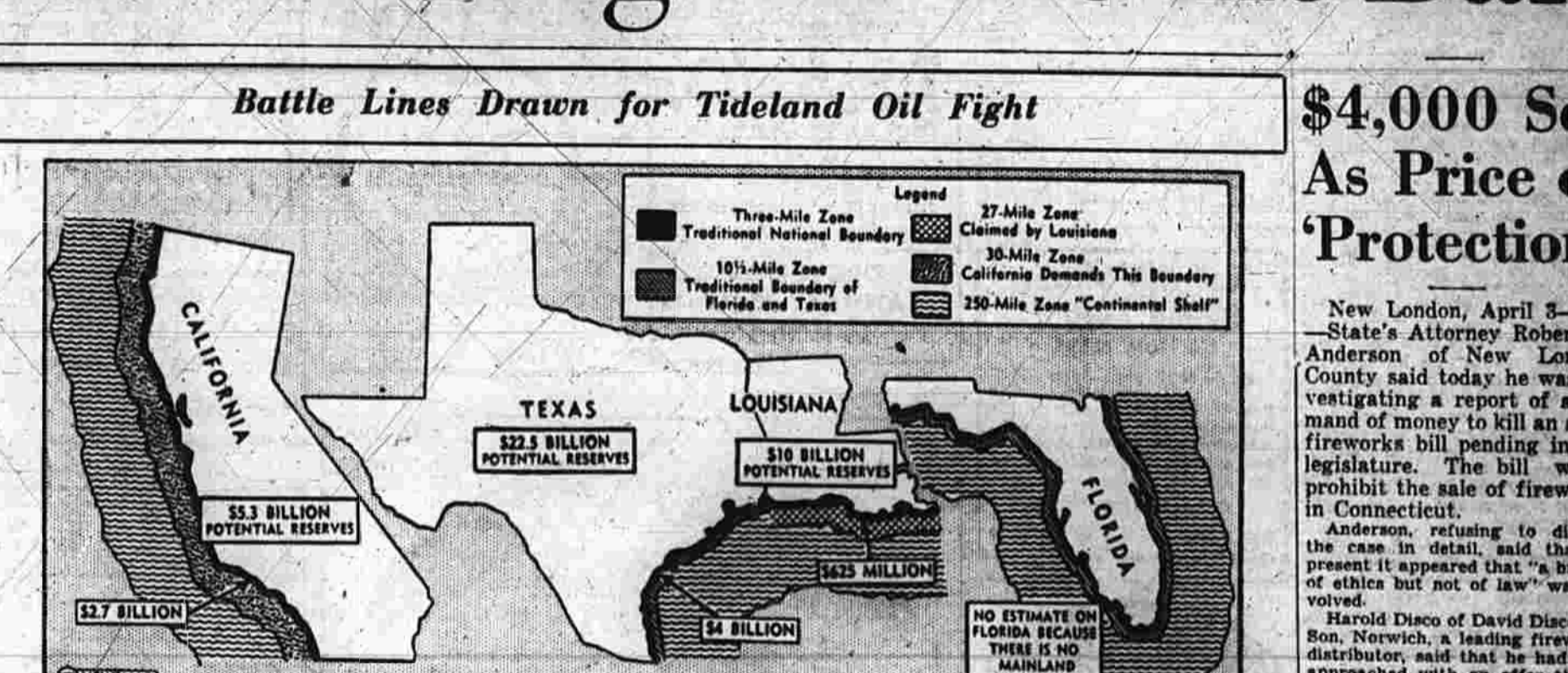

Estimate is Raised.

UN ENCOURAGED—A spokesman for the United Nations delegation said tonight that the Communists had freed 14 French civilians interned in Korea "voluntarily."

The news was relayed to the Allied armistice camp where a liaison officer headed by Rear Adm. John C. Daniel awaited a meeting Monday at Panmunjom to arrange exchange of sick and wounded prisoners of war.

Prisoners from Paris said the 14 French civilians would argue, even in Moscow.

"The reports are true," said the Allied spokesman said. "I would say it's encouraging."

Some Allied officers and observers here agreed that the latest news by the Reds appeared to be part of the new and apparently worldwide Communist "peace offensive."

These observers said the new message suggests that the Communists may readily accept on details for exchanging sick and wounded prisoners of war and thus clear the way for resumption of full-scale armistice negotiations broken off last Oct. 5.

The only times in the past the Reds have released prisoners of war to the Communists has been at the battlefield. Earlier in the Korean war, they announced they were sending soldiers from time to time in their own initiative.

They also said the Communists apparently felt this was good propaganda.

The last soldiers listed as released at the front were two Americans from the 4th Division. The Reds turned them loose on the eastern front last December.

If the Communists go through with the exchange of sick and wounded prisoners, and if that in turn promotes additional negotiations as they suggested, the President remarked, that certainly would come into his mind as a development which the U. S. Government would welcome heartily.

He said, without trying to speculate about what is behind it.

Commenting that the Communists has been trying to arrange a prisoner of war exchange for a long long time, the President said that it stands prepared to meet every honest advance by the Communists.

Confers With Bohlen—Shortly before he went into the news conference, the President conferred with Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen, who is leaving for New York to resume his duties as U. S. envoy to Mexico.

In response to a question about whether he discussed with Bohlen a Malenkov meeting, Eisenhower said that Malenkov had not discussed because he could not see there was no basis for discussing it at the moment.

He said that in conformity with regular practice, Bohlen came to call on him just before leaving for Europe and they discussed the situation in Moscow of the American Ambassador. He said that Bohlen could be helpful, and that general nature of problems that might come up.

With obvious reference to a question about whether he had given a personal message to Malenkov, Eisenhower said that he did not say anything further in the discussion was concerned, and he would have nothing to say to Malenkov.

Says Delay in Delivery of Repaired Machine Has Hurt Court Value

The Manchester Police Department alcometer, recently returned here from the factory where it had been sent for repair in September, may never be used to produce evidence in intoxication cases in Manchester.

The town has asked for its money back on the machine and has requested the manufacturer, the Alfred Bicknell Associates, of Cambridge, Mass., to take it back charging that the repaired machine has seriously damaged its value.
