Police Probe Explosion At Midnight Saturday On Main St.; Similar to Willimantic Incident

Local police are investigating an explosion of a "red smoke bomb" in the enclosed entrance to the Doughnut Shop, 20 Summit street, at midnight Saturday.

The explosion did not produce any serious injuries, but a fire of 20 Summit street, caused by the red smoke bomb, was put out by the fire department.

A similar explosion occurred in the Small Chateau, noted Willimantic night spot, early in the morning of Feb. 22, 1952.

The bomb was tossed into the woman's rest room at the Small Chateau, where it exploded.

It is believed by some authorities that someone with access to a government meeting had been using the bomb of a base.

State Police have entered the investigation, which is in the hands of Det. Francis Savary of the Willimantic Police Department.

A Revolution?

To all the external moves of the new regime in Russia there has now been added a move which must be classified as primarily internal in nature, even though it has obvious outside effects.

This is the action of the new regime in releasing the group of doctors who had already "confessed" to the murder of two government leaders. The new Moscow regime now proclaims that these doctors were and are innocent, were framed by false testimony and brought to their alleged confessions by methods not permitted by Soviet law.

All this admits that, in the past, something has been very wrong and very rotten inside Russia. It is to admit that Russia has been living a lie, following a wrong system of life, and suffering from whimsical and unscrupulous forces in position of great power.

It is, in short, notice to the Russian people that the aggression of conduct and principle and method known as "Stalinism" was a cruel error.

This kind of thing is harder to believe than all the "peace offensive" of the new regime has been conducting in its relationship with the outside world. For it has been held conceivable that, so far as this peace offensive is concerned, Stalin himself could have designed it and left it to his heirs, merely as a strategic mode of operation for Russia at a time when it would be historically natural for Russia to retreat.

But the symbolic development with regard to the doctors carries the strong suggestion that Russia's present course is not any implementation of a Stalin policy, but a repudiation of Stalin. What it seems to say—and what none of us will believe for a very long time—is that there has been a revolution inside Russia, a revolution which changes the entire character and direction of Russia's government, a revolution which says that the outside changes beginning to show themselves may represent not just strategy, but a change in the convictions held by Russian leadership.

Under such interpretations, the reign of Stalin would be turned into a long nightmare inflicting itself upon the Russian people and the outside world alike.

If this is an encouraging possibility—so encouraging that we have great difficulty even accepting it as a possibility—it also carries its dangers. If there has been a revolution in Russia, the situation in Russia must be regarded as less stable than would be the case if Malenkov were merely carrying out one strategy or Stalinism. For so drastic a revolution must inevitably include the possibility of a counter-revolution. If the aim is to depose the dead Stalin and his influence in complete and sweeping fashion, that could be a rough dose for Russia to take, considering the years of unchallenged public buildup for Stalin, and Stalin, even dead, may not be disposed of so easily.

Yet if this is to be judged to be an authentic revolution inside Russia, there are things we can do about helping it to survive. If it survives, it will have to be because it offers to the Russian people a brand of life Stalin did not offer them, a brand of life they like better than what Stalin did offer them. If it survives, in its present fashion, it will have to be because the Russian people like the idea of peace, and of freer intercourse with other peoples, and of freer living at home, and because these things begin to grip their imagination and attract their loyalty.

So the new and more startling interpretation of the post-Stalin situation inside Russia is an added incentive for us to follow the

BOUGH TREATMENT
 To the Editor:
 We would like to bring to your attention some facts which add up to what we feel is just about the rawest deal that has come our way during the 33 years that our Company has been in existence.

The question at stake involves the matter of stream pollution. We have now under construction a clarifier system which when completed will involve a total expenditure of approximately \$20,000.00 at our mill in Manchester. Since the white water effluent has contained some very small quantities of chemicals and has contained dyes, we are admittedly causing stream pollution that could be considered objectionable. Realizing this, we have cooperated with the Connecticut State Water Commission and proceeded with the above mentioned treatment plant upon receiving the written approval of the Connecticut State Water Commission and Town of Manchester.

The Hockanum River Valley Stream Pollution Policy formulated by the Connecticut State Water Commission and adopted on March 4, 1953 now makes our treatment plant completely out of date while it is still under construction—about half completed. We quote an our authority the National Council for Stream Improvement of the Pulp and Paper and Paperboard Industries, Inc., 221 Madison Avenue, New York 16, New York. This is a non-profit organization of which we are members along with the majority of the Pulp and Paper mills in the United States. The Connecticut State Water Commission had sufficient confidence in this council to have them make a survey of the effluent and other conditions of all paper mills in this state in 1949.

Specifically, our consultants inform us that no paper mill in the United States could meet these two demands:

(1) Biochemical Oxygen demand not over 30 ppm.
 (2) Color and turbidity shall not increase by more than 3 ppm the amount present in the receiving stream, assuming above any industrial waste outlet.

We will admit that after lengthy hearings, conferences, more double talk and so on that the standards may be made more realistic. It might even be that we will be given credit for what we now have under construction, but for an example of ingratitude, harassment, and false assurance, we wanted to bring this case to your attention.

We hope to justify our existence once again and we assure you that we will be most grateful for any help you can give us.

A Promise Cut Down

The Eisenhower administration, in the bill which has passed the House, and in the bill which is being debated in the Senate, is keeping what turns out to be the left of President Eisenhower's campaign promise with regard to the off-shore oil issue. But the letter of this promise is proving to be considerably short of the aspirations of the states involved.

There is quite a difference between what the states hoped they would get and what they are getting.

They hoped to get all the offshore oil deposits. They are getting only those deposits which lie within the three mile limit, or the 10 mile limit in the case of Texas and Florida. And oil deposits outside this limit are being reserved to the federal government itself. And in the House action, on the bill, the effect of the states to gain some share of the prospective income from these deposits, by application of state taxes to them, was defeated.

The failure of the states to gain control over the deposits outside the present legal limit is not particularly upsetting to California, where known deposits do not extend far beyond the three mile limit. But the fact is that the major portion of the oil deposits in the Gulf of Mexico lies in the so-called continental shelf area which is being reserved to the federal government, and which, in some instances, extends out as far as 150 miles.

In actual division of the oil deposits between the states and the federal government, then, the legislation now being passed, is probably quite as favorable to the federal government, and therefore to all the people of the country, as was the compromise proposal for a sharing of revenues which Adlai Stevenson made during his campaign appearances in Texas.

Once they have got this much safely assured to them, the next effort of the states involved will be, of course, to launch a campaign to have the rest of the offshore oil deposits handed to them. But there is no present indication, either in the outlined stand of the Eisenhower administration, or in the mood of Congress itself, that such a campaign will ever get anywhere.

The issue is being resolved, more creditably than seemed likely before the Eisenhower administration gave specific interpretation of its own campaign promises.

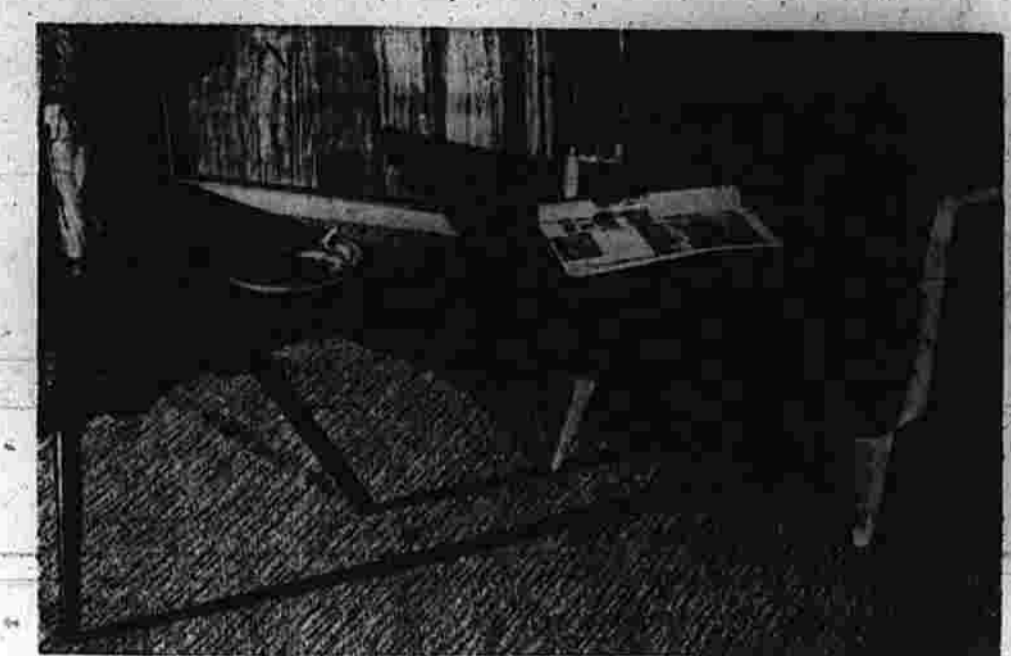
Hiring A Grudge

If, as appears possible, the Senate Appropriations Committee goes through with its intention of employing General James A. Van Fleet as its military adviser, it should be made quite clear that what it will be getting will not be so much expert military advice as it is a certain point of view.

The point of view is reflected in the fact that a day or two after President Eisenhower had announced that his personal investigation had revealed that no alleged shortage of ammunition had anything to do with the loss of "Old Baldy" in a recent Korean battle, this same General Van Fleet testified that he believed a lack of ammunition might have been responsible for that loss.

The committee will be hiring, then, a curious point of view—a point of view which is seemingly at war with President Eisenhower and with all of General Van Fleet's former colleagues in the Pentagon. It is a point of view which has already produced a tale of potential victory in the Korean war completely at variance with the General's own communications and statements for the period in which he now claims victory was in his grasp. It is a point of view which has illegally and persistently, against all other evidence, persisted in claiming a critical situation in ammunition in Korea, and which claimed this publicly at a time when the General had no way of knowing that the enemy might not take his claim seriously.

If the Appropriations Committee is looking for an expert who will oppose this nation's recognized military leadership with more than ordinary persistence and more than normal motivation, it has such an expert in General Van Fleet.

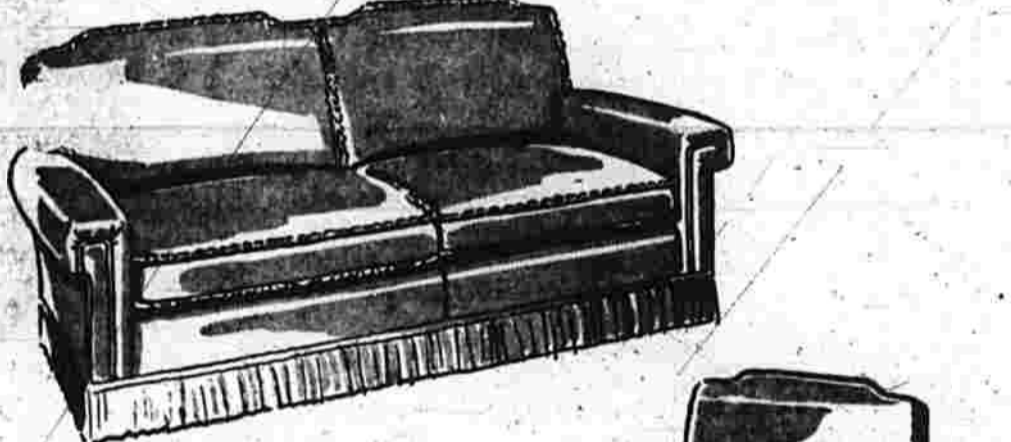
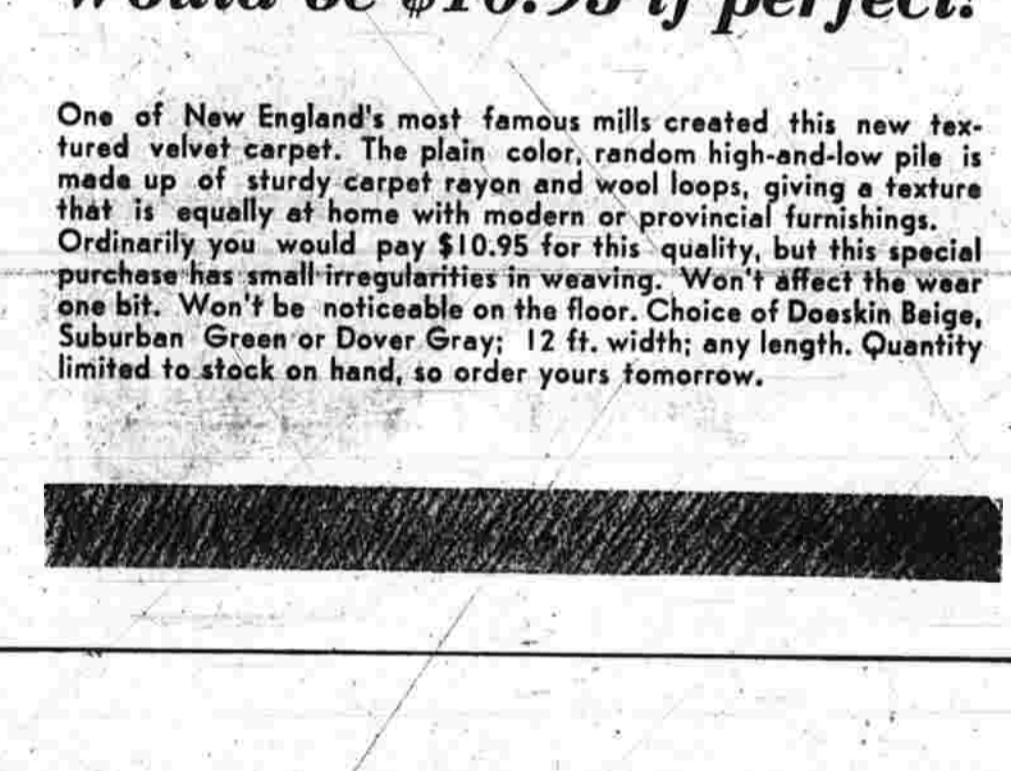

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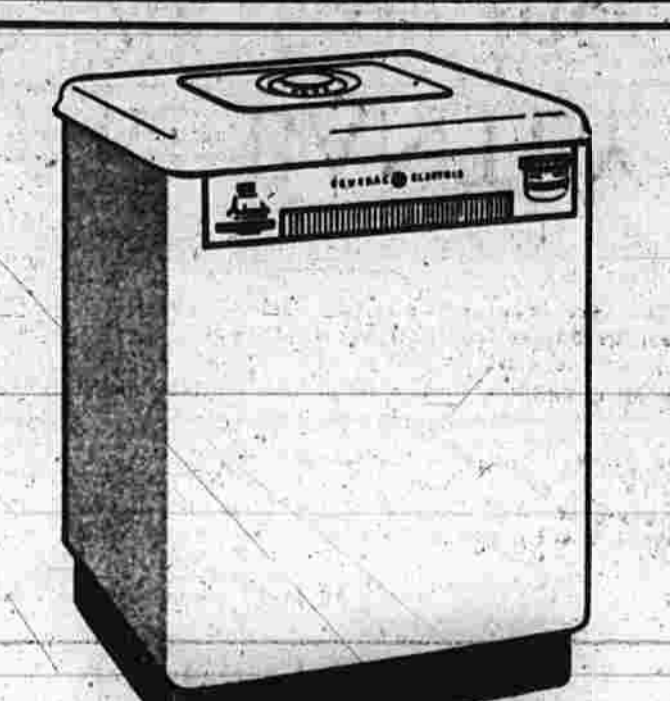
