

100 from U. S. In POW Swap

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Munsan, Korea, April 8.—(P)—The Communists today said they are ready to send home 600 disabled prisoners of war—a figure that includes only 150 Americans and other UN soldiers. The chief Allied negotiator asked for a recount, and added: "I have hopes we will get more." Observers here predicted that only slightly more than 100 Americans will be exchanged.

Asks Recount

Rear Adm. John C. Daniel told the Communists their figure was "incredibly small" and asked that they have these figures reviewed. He said later, however, that "I have no reason to believe at the present time that they are not acting in good faith."

The UN Command offered to return 5,800 sick and wounded Communists—5,100 North Koreans and 700 Chinese. This is 1 per cent of the 52,000 pro-Communist prisoners held by the Allies. The Communist figure of 600 is 1 per cent of the 12,000 to 13,000 UN and Korean prisoners the Reds have said they hold.

Both sides named lower-level staff officers to work out administrative details of the exchange. The UN Command appointed Col. Willard B. Carroll, of Galveston, Tex.; Air Force Col. Douglas Calma of Riverside, Calif.; and South Korean Col. Lee Soo Yung. The Communists named North Korean Col. Lee Pyong Il and Chinese Col. Wang Ching.

The staff officers went into session immediately after the liaison groups adjourned for the day.

Agree on Main Points

Daniel asked the Communists for a complete revised text of the whole draft agreement on transfer of sick and wounded. The UN command could consider any change in one package and agree rapidly to the items which are controversial. The Communists have agreed to the main points of Daniel's plan, and said they will submit their versions of the text.

The Allied protest on the Communist offer was the difference between the two versions. Daniel's statement yet made in the three-day-old conference. It was the statement of discord in the otherwise smooth negotiations which Tuesday resulted in agreement in principle to exchange disabled POW's. South Korean Maj. Gen. 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Washington, April 8.—(P)—Plans to make a permanent peace for war-wrecked Korea are perhaps being negotiated with the Communists on other critical Far Eastern issues as they begin to shape up here a truce prospects brighter.

One idea receiving official consideration, it was understood today, is that any long-term peace arrangements should provide for a north-south dividing line at the narrow waist of the peninsula about 50 miles north of present battle lines.

Under provisions already worked out, an armistice would become effective along this present line. However, some authorities here believe this would not make a workable division of the country over a long period.

See Red Objections

The battle line is generally already north of Parallel 38, which divided North and South Korea before the Red attack. The Communists presumably would object to the extension of the truce line to a position to the south.

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Ike Plans Defense Cuts, Warns Arms Lobbyists

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Washington, April 8.—(P)—President Eisenhower is reported to have advised members of Congress to ignore "military lobbyists' messages" as he plans to cut arm services spending to the lowest level at which he feels the nation will be safe.

A Senator reported Eisenhower's advice after Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey agreed in testimony before a Senate committee yesterday that defense outlays would have to take a four billion dollar cut if the new budget were to be balanced.

Eisenhower was described by the Senator, who asked not to be quoted by name, as being convinced that present defense spending is excessive and that a reduction in military outlays would be balanced.

The President has said he will make the final decision on the level of commitment to be maintained.

U. S. Delegate Ernest A. Gross and Britain's Sir Gladwyn Jebb argued that eliminating references to that resolution could give the impression the West was abandoning its insistence on international control of atomic energy and balancing reduction of atomic forces. Both factors are mentioned in "A directive to the commission."

Vishinsky applied the veto which changed the text to meet the West's plan. He said that the U. S. had given support of the previous resolution.

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"My government remains deeply interested in a considered study of the Soviet government's proposals. We will study any concrete proposals the Soviet government may make."

Because of Western acceptance of the first Soviet amendment was declined accepted, but the Assembly turned down the second one, 18 in favor, 33 in agreement with the UN agency.

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Washington, April 8.—(P)—Former Secretary of Defense Robert A. Lovett said today there was a "definitely unsatisfactory" performance on ammunition production for the Korean war and he "took it out of the army's control."

Lovett blamed the "army as a whole."

Sen. Byrd (D., Va.) asked him at a Senate investigation: "Who is responsible for this ammunition shortage? We want the name of the official responsible for the failure to let these contracts."

Lovett replied that he thought under the system and procedure set up in the Army, it was utterly impossible to identify an individual or a group of individuals as those personally responsible.

Then he asked, "Assign it to the Army as a whole."

That seems to be the Secretary of Defense's view.

Lovett told investigating Senators that when he took office as Deputy Defense Secretary in December, 1950, Secretary of Defense George C. Marshall ordered an investigation into the ammunition situation.

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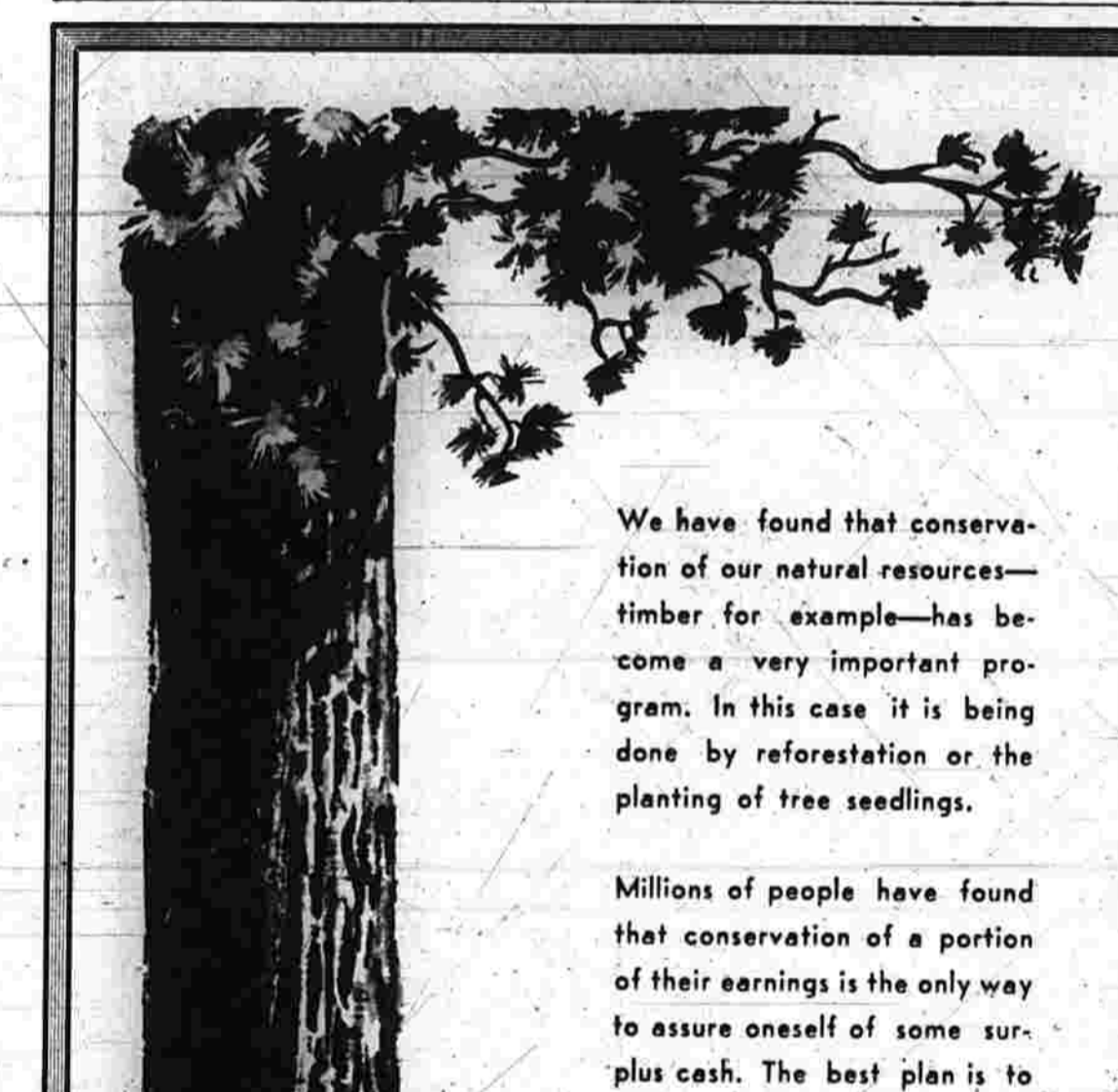

Tells How Whites Took over State

Joseph M. Ward of New Britain, whose hobby is the history of Connecticut Indians, told members of the Rotary Club at their meeting at the Country Club last night how the Indians who numbered about 6,000 when the first white men came to Connecticut diminished to about 180 in 1774, and to about half a dozen families today.

These Indians showed the settlers how to grow corn and tobacco and were quite friendly, Ward said. The fastest and most warlike Indians were the Pequots, who were located around the Norwich-Mystic area. These Pequots were practically destroyed by Captain John Mason with the aid of the Narragansett Indians from Rhode Island.

Ex-King Entombed In Royalty Bier

Lisbon, Portugal, April 8.—The body of ex-King Carol II of Romania lay entombed today in the pantheon of St. Vincent's Roman Catholic Church here, traditional resting place of Portuguese royalty.

An Anglican chaplain conducted the burial service yesterday for the former monarch, who died of a heart attack Saturday at 56. Carol had been reared in the Greek Orthodox faith but no Orthodox priest was available here. The Roman Catholic Church refused to perform the ceremony because Carol divorced his first two wives. It was the first time in the 700-year history of St. Vincent's that non-Catholic services had been conducted there.

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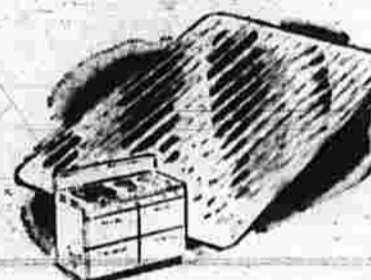

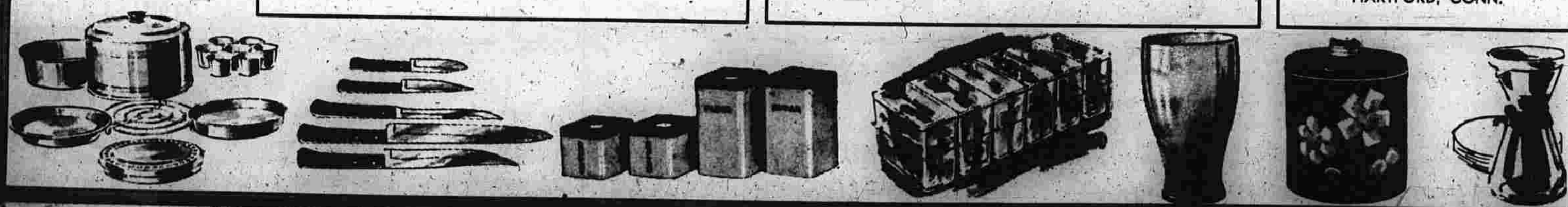

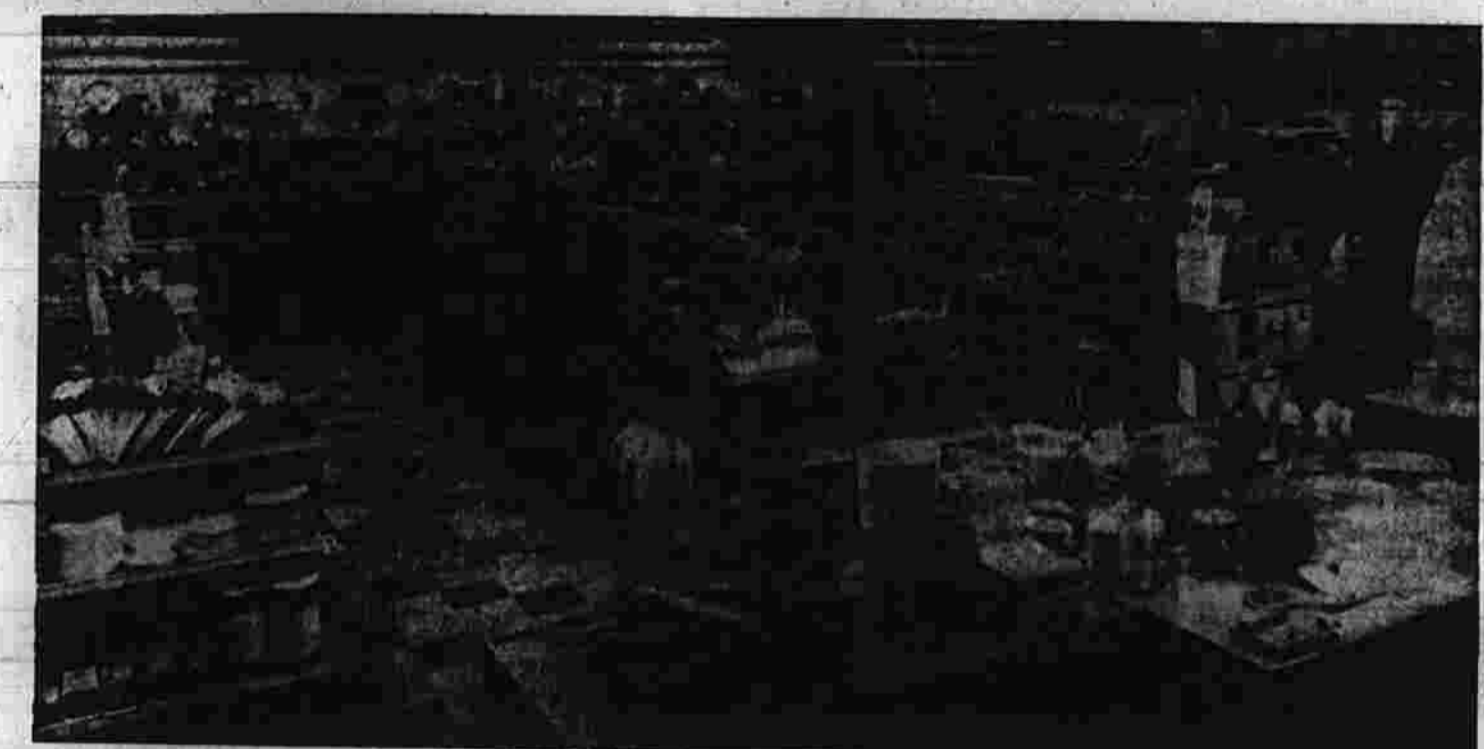

TO MAKE PEACE PROSPEROUS
 If peace can be obtained, the major effort toward accomplishment by the Eisenhower administration will be in the direction of making peace itself a dynamic and beneficial to all mankind.

The area in which the Eisenhower administration will try to operate toward such ends will be area of world trade.

It was assumed, as the Eisenhower administration dedicated itself to this program, that it would take many months and perhaps years even to formulate it.

It is obvious that, when the program is finally evolved, it will have to lead in the direction of free trade for ourselves and for everybody else.

But it is also apparent, by the scope and nature of the administration's planning for the formulation of this program, that it is intended to be something far more scientific and practical than just a grand gesture of letting down trade barriers.

The Eisenhower administration is obviously going to have a try at the business of releasing the potentials of this world for the benefit of everybody. It is putting hard-boiled realists like Lewis Douglas on the job of translating free trade ideas into good business for everybody.

Now comes the political irony which is one of the most serious concerns facing the Eisenhower administration. In reference to the program he is trying to have formulated, President Eisenhower has asked that Congress take merely a routine action this year on reciprocal trade agreements program, extending it for one more year without changing the present law.

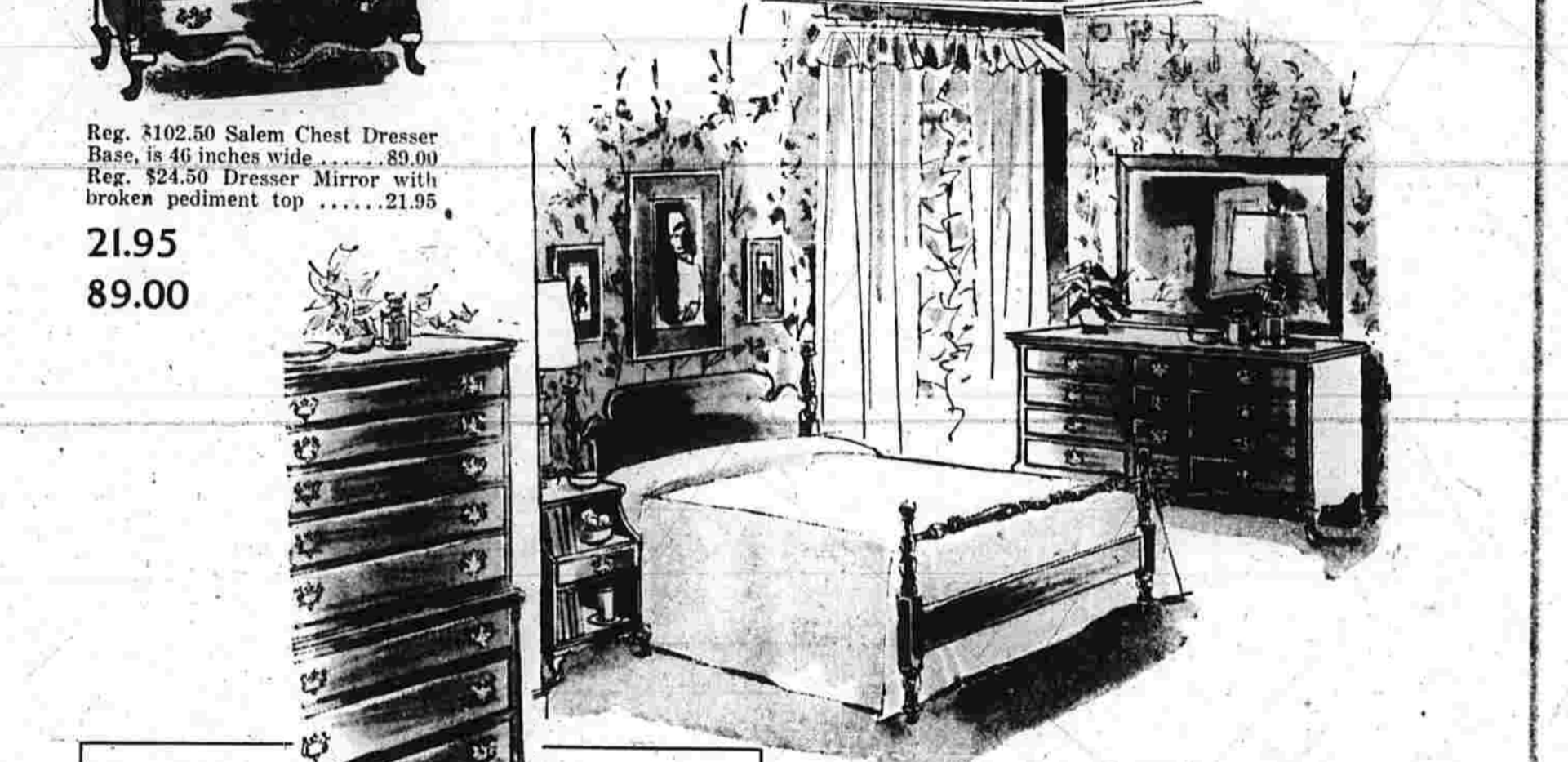

End of Curbs Brought More 'Ups' than 'Downs'

New York, April 8.—The new report from Dallas and end of price controls has brought more "ups" than "downs" but has left unchanged many items in the average American's budget.

According to the check, there has been no significant price changes in clothing, home fuels, restaurant meals or butter since the last controls were removed on March 17.

The price of a loaf of bread has been hiked one-half cent in Boston, and one cent in St. Louis, Kansas City, Los Angeles, Seattle and Pittsburgh.

Increases are predicted for beef, pork, mutton and lamb, but for men's suits next fall, and for basic steel in the near future.

The AP survey also brought forth these comments and side-lighting: A Minneapolis housewife, Mrs. C. I. Rincker, says: "Some things have gone down, especially beef and cotton household goods, since controls were off."

Bolton Baglin Offers Guilty Plea; Ends Parakeet Test Issue

Bolton, April 8.—(Special)—A local parakeet breeder carried his fight to raise and care for budgies (love birds) from trials before Judge John A. Cornell in Rockville.

Raymond E. Baglin of Bolton pleaded guilty yesterday, before Judge John A. Cornell in Rockville, to a charge of violating the state sanitary code because he was raising parakeets at his home.

Baglin was given a \$25 fine which was immediately suspended. It was brought out that the section of the state law which forbids breeding or raising of parakeets is under revision.

Conservative Estimate. "It is a conservative estimate that there are in excess of 100,000 parakeets in Connecticut, with some 6,000 birds being imported illegally last year.

Others to Blame. "The truth of the matter is that parakeets are no more liable to contract or infect a human being with so-called psittacosis than many other birds such as chickens, turkeys, pheasants, pigeons, doves and canaries."

Delegation on Visit to State Health Department

Late in October a delegation from the Connecticut Budgie Society visited the State Health Department headquarters and pleaded its case to lift its regulations against parakeets and other members of the psittacine family.

Baglin cooperated with the state in matters affecting his parakeets. The State's Attorney, Joel H. Reed, II, of Stamford Springs, told the court that the Bolton man kept his birds at home and that it was a "hobby" only.

Parenthood's A Headache Nowadays

It seems as though every day parenthood is becoming a greater nerve-wracking responsibility. Nowadays, there are very few "good" or "bad" about an individual that cannot be attributed to a competent psychiatrist in childhood experience.

If little Alice is too fond of chocolate cream and turns into big Alice, chances are she's an adult trying to eat herself out of some scarring childhood experience, according to psychiatrists.

Little Willie is thin, nervous and shy, maybe he just wasn't born that way, but feels rejected and insecure, they say.

Parents must be towers of strength, read the latest books and operate 24 hours a day with a vast store of varied information and techniques. They must walk a fine line: too much attention, and

their child develops into an unhappy adult because he is over-dependent. Too little, and he grows up to feel forever unloved, unwanted and unsure of himself.

A child's home situation, they tell us now, determines whether Willie will emerge from childhood driven by ambition, ruthlessly whipped forward by a tireless demon. In fact, it sometimes seems that a successful adult, by our traditional standards of affluence and position, is really an unhappy, harassed grownup. And it's all his parents' fault; he clawed his way up to be president of the company.

They tell us too much discipline makes for one kind of trouble; too little another. While the unaware general public deploras an epidemic of narcotic addiction among teenagers, the experts are tracing the cause back to unhappy home situations. Special psychiatrists work with badly adjusted, difficult children usually involves more attention to parents than the children themselves.

Nowadays there aren't any naughty, problem children. When Tommy ties a can to the cat's tail and Jane insists on switching her playmate's tricycle, the remedy no longer is the unconvictionally old-fashioned spanking or lecture. It's

But what gives you pause is a situation where every child can shame everything on his parents, who also like all credits. Nobody can feel proud of himself these days.

Pine Bluff, Ark. — (AP) — Police still are searching for the robber who fled a Pine Bluff grocery store, bombarded by canned goods.

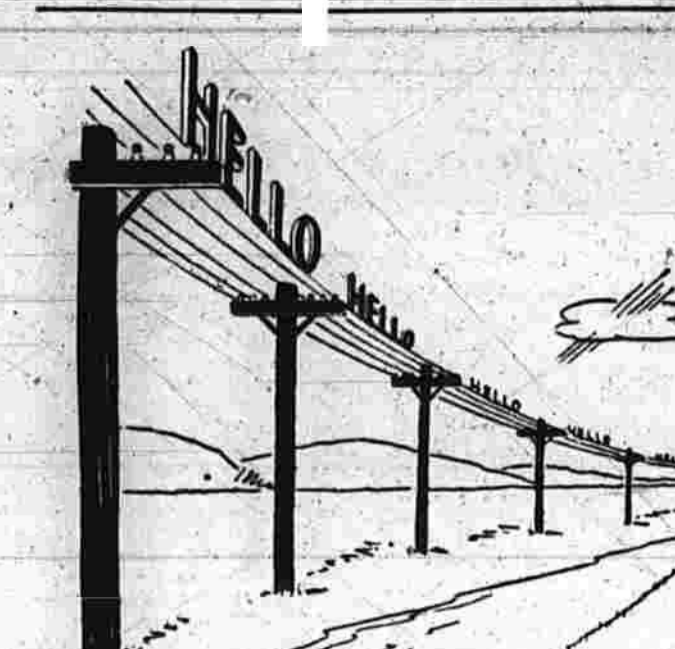
The store cashier, Mrs. Jeff Lyon, said the young man shoved

Warren Hits Proposed Revisions of Charter

Claims Bill Is Blow at Existing Charter and Charges Sponsors of Act with 'Confusion'

Rep. Ray A. Warren today issued a statement formally opposing the proposed changes in the Manchester Town Charter which are scheduled for hearing before the Cities and Boroughs committee of the General Assembly in Hartford tomorrow.

The proposals, originally fostered by an informal "charter revision" group and drafted by Rep. Sherwood-Bowers, include a proposal to create a separate town water department, a proposal to have the town controller appointed by the Board of Directors instead of by the General Manager, a proposal to require the appointment of an assistant town controller, a proposal to raise the salaries of the members of the Board of Directors, a proposal to have the highest vote getter for the Board of Directors automatically receive the title of Mayor, and a proposed requirement that the identity of the town auditor be changed every four years.

Warren assailed the substance of these proposals, meeting in them a blow at the existing Town Charter, and likewise charged the sponsors of the proposals with "confusion within their own group" and a failure properly to acquaint the people of Manchester with their purposes.

Warren's statement follows: "I feel that it is my duty as a representative of the people of Manchester to bring to the attention of the voters of Manchester that the proposed charter changes are again scheduled to be heard by the Cities and Boroughs committee on Thursday afternoon at 1:20 p. m. I also believe I should let the people of Manchester know how I feel towards the proposed changes.

"The group that has been working on these bills has had several months to get the bills in shape, but the completely rewritten version of them was made available to the General Assembly and to the public shortly after noon yesterday. The fact that one of the group is an attorney, well versed in legislative proceedings, and another of the group is a present legislator, indicates to me that if they cannot make up their minds until this late hour there must be confusion within their own group.

"I believe that any changes in our charter should be thoroughly explained, that ample time should be given to everyone to study them. How many people know that the proposed changes will provide another well paid salaried position in the Town Hall? How many know that the entire operation of the Water Department will be taken out of the control of the Board of Directors and the general manager? Some of the changes are minor in nature but others are major. Some of the changes would become effective upon passage by the Legislature, others will not become effective until passed by local referendum. Why they are asking for a referendum on some and not on others is unknown to me.

"For the following reasons I feel it is my responsibility to oppose these Charter changes on Thursday:

"1. There has been little or no indication of support in favor of the changes, which would, if enacted, strike a vital blow at the general manager principle of Manchester government.

"2. There has been no attempt to explain the changes in their final form.

"3. City Home Rule.

"4. The proposed changes, if

any of them were worthy of consideration, and if their backers had any confidence in the possibility that the voters of Manchester would approve them, could easily be made under the Home Rule provisions of the present Charter.

"I believe the taxpayers of Manchester should have the right to be heard and the right to vote on any charter change that will affect the administration or the operation of our town government.

"It is my personal belief that such proposals, if made with respect and with sincerity, would be directed to proper authorities here in Manchester, and would not rely upon the chance that the Legislature could be persuaded to dictate them to this town."

Counsel's Advice Sought by Town On Service Hike

Town Counsel Charles N. Crockett has been asked to advise on the procedure which should be followed if the Manchester water department is to hike its charge for new service connections.

The question of raising the connection rates came up at a meeting Friday of the Board of Directors when the extension of service to some Glastonbury customers was under discussion.

The cost to the customer now is one dollar for every thousand dollars of estimated cost of construction of the building as required in the building permit, only a fraction of the total cost of the hook-up.

This means owners of most new homes pay from \$11 to \$15. A few homes are being built here for less than \$11,000 or more than \$15,000.

The estimated total cost of the connection is \$75. Fred Thrall, assistant manager of the Sewer and Water Department, said today that the average actual total cost is being computed by department workers.

Thrall said if raising the charge requires a referendum, it might be advisable to delay action until other referendums are scheduled.

Court Cases

Home P. Gladwin, 27, of Hartford, who was arrested yesterday after an accident on Middle turnpike east, was fined \$21 on a charge of violation of rules of the road in Town Court this morning.

Police say that a car driven by Gladwin, who was headed west at the time, cut back into line too sharply while passing a car driven by John J. Klein, 30, of 28 Foley street, hitting the left front end of the Klein car.

In court today, Gladwin said he had tried to avoid a head-on collision with Klein's car coming toward him by cutting back into line so sharply that the car struck the on-coming car sooner because of the green color blended with the green foliage behind it.

The collision spun the Klein car around and sent Klein's wife, Emma, to the hospital for emergency treatment. Prosecutor W. David Keith told the court, Judge John S. G. Rotiner was on the bench.

In other cases this morning, Judge Rotiner fined Howard Warren, 420 for intoxication; the non-support charges against Clifford Heritage, 23, of 273 Main street, were settled; and William E. Brown, 24, of 129 Charter Oak street, Robert J. Wood, 23, of William-street, and Frank C. Hollins, 37, of Stora, were each fined \$6 for stop sign violation. Hollins was fined an additional \$3 for failing to carry his registration.

Also, William T. Minney, 37, of 250 West Center street, was fined \$12 for operating an unregistered camp trailer; and John S. Wolcott, 67, of 180 Main street, \$5 for a stop sign violation. The case against Paul R. Smith, 29, of Portsmouth, N. H., charged with failure to provide emergency lighting equipment when he left a truck on the Wilbur Cross Highway, was settled; and Charles Carpenter, 31, of Wilkesburg, Pa., forfeited a bond of \$25 for failing to appear on a charge of operating an unregistered motor vehicle.

The complaint case of Raymond and Vera E. Hanna, of 22 Tyler circle, both charged with delinquency of children, were continued to Monday.

In another case this morning, Deputy Judge John J. O'Connor set to change the sentence of John Barrett, 24, of 88 Drive A, convicted of intoxication, from 30 days in jail to 60 days suspended and a year probation. At the same time, Barrett vacated an appeal.

PAVE WAY FOR MERGER.
Washington, April 8 (AP)—The AFL and CIO talking merger again, have started out by trying to eliminate a source of friction between them.

Leaders of the two big labor organizations yesterday named a six-man group to try to work out an agreement against "raiding."

This is the attempt by one union to replace another as bargaining representative in an already organized plant or industry.

Grants 25 Permits For New Homes

Building permits for 25 new dwellings at a total estimated cost of \$214,000 and an average cost of \$12,560 each were issued during March by Building Inspector David Chambers, a department report shows.

One of the homes being built for Dr. Alfred F. Soudquist opposite 45 Wyllys street is estimated at \$23,000.

Six of the permits were issued to Green Manor Estates, Inc. for three-hour heating yesterday in way road; five to Andrew Anzaldi for homes on Andor road and Virginia road; and three each to Ralph Starkweather and Jarvis Jarvis, Inc.

Of 31 permits for alterations and additions at a total estimated cost of \$12,684, one went to the Eighth School and Utilities District for improvements to the district's sewage disposal plant off Hilliard street in the amount of \$8,264. One to Stewart Dillon for an addition to Dillon's Sales and Service at 319 Main street amounted to \$13,500.

An \$849,240 permit for the Vernon-Loyal School was issued to the town.

Other activities of the building department last month include issuing permits for eight garages and four miscellaneous buildings, several tradesmen's licenses, electrical, plumbing, and heating permits.

Deadline Is Set On School Offers

April 16 has been set as a deadline for offers to buy the old Buckingham School from the Manchester water department and remove it from its location near the Buckingham reservoir in Glastonbury, Fred Thrall, assistant superintendent of the department, said today.

At a meeting last Friday, the Board of Directors, acting as voters' commissioners, authorized General Manager Richard Martin to sell the building for removal for one dollar.

Since that time, Thrall said, five persons have indicated an interest in buying the old building.

It will probably be sold to whom ever offers the highest price.

Liquor Law Petition Filed

The Town Planning Commission yesterday afternoon received a petition to be presented at its next public hearing in reference to the amendments in the liquor laws of the zoning regulations. It was placed on file by Attorney George C. Leamer, counsel for William C. Wigand, owner of the Imperial Package Store at 219 Spruce street. The petition carried the signatures of 20 persons in favor of making the changes in the regulations that would relax the liquor laws. The petition also requested that any change would reduce the distance between outlets from 1,000 to 800 feet. The zoning change would classify clubs and taverns in the same category as grocery stores, which sell beer only under a package store permit. While no date for the next public hearing of the Planning Commission has been set, it is expected to be held early in May.

Attorney Condemns Drug Not Covered by State Statute on Narcotics

Thomas J. Lalley, 66, of Hartford, who is awaiting trial here on a narcotics charge, may escape prosecution if the attorney defending him in a Superior Court case successfully establishes that the drug Lalley is alleged to have bought here does not come under the narcotic statute.

Lalley was arrested here last month and charged with obtaining narcotics by fraud after he reportedly made several purchases of paregoric and failed to give the correct name and address, as required by law. His case, which was originally postponed until today, was continued again until May 6 at 11:00 o'clock.

Prosecutor W. David Keith this morning said that Lalley's case in the highest court, where he faces the same charge, was continued three weeks to allow the Hartford state attorney Francis P. Egan to file a brief supporting the prosecution. Egan does not come under the statute.

If the Superior Court accepts that contention, Keith said, the charges against Lalley here will be nullified. Two other similar cases arose here about the same time Lalley was arrested. Fred Markham, 66, also of Hartford, was committed to Norwich State Hospital for treatment while he was waiting trial here and his case was continued on a day-to-day basis when it came up March 28. Like Lalley, he was charged with buying paregoric and failing to give his correct name and address.

Philip R. Eisman, 45, of Brooklyn, N. Y., who is said by police to have misrepresented himself as Manchester Memorial Hospital where he attempted illegally to secure drugs in January, was sentenced to one to five years in State Prison in Norwich Superior Court last month for trying the same thing in New London. A local warrant charging Eisman with obtaining narcotics by fraud, has been forwarded to the prison.

All three men are known as confirmed drug addicts.

ing that the Red governments of China and Russia might be willing to make the permanent peace line north of the 38th parallel. The idea is that kind of compensation they might bargain for.

This and a host of other questions are being considered by the military negotiators should recommend to the countries concerned a "truce conference" to settle the questions of the withdrawal of all foreign forces from Korea, the peaceful settlement of the Korean question, etc.

President Eisenhower said in a talk yesterday that American troops would have to remain in the region of Korea for a long time. This could include Japan, however, and would not necessarily mean indefinite manning of a truce line.

Negotiation on withdrawal of United Nations and Chinese forces from Korea will unquestionably be one of the problems of the political conference.

What authorities here are uncertain about is the implication of that. Under this heading the Reds may seek to bring up a series of issues with which they would hope to confuse and divide the Allies and the Eisenhower administration, hoping to get peace throughout the Far East rather than in Korea alone, any feel it has no alternative other than to broaden the conference.

A conference restricted to Korea, for example, could not be expected to embrace efforts by the U. S. and its Allies to end the war in Indo-China and get the Reds to call off their guerrillas in Malaya.

On the other hand, a conference widened to include such matters would also be open to questions the Communists previously would like to raise, among them:

- The fact that Great Britain, like Britain and some other U. S. Allies still recognizes the Chinese Nationalist government on Formosa as China's legal government and is giving it military and economic aid.
- Red China's desire, backed by Russia and opposed by the U. S.

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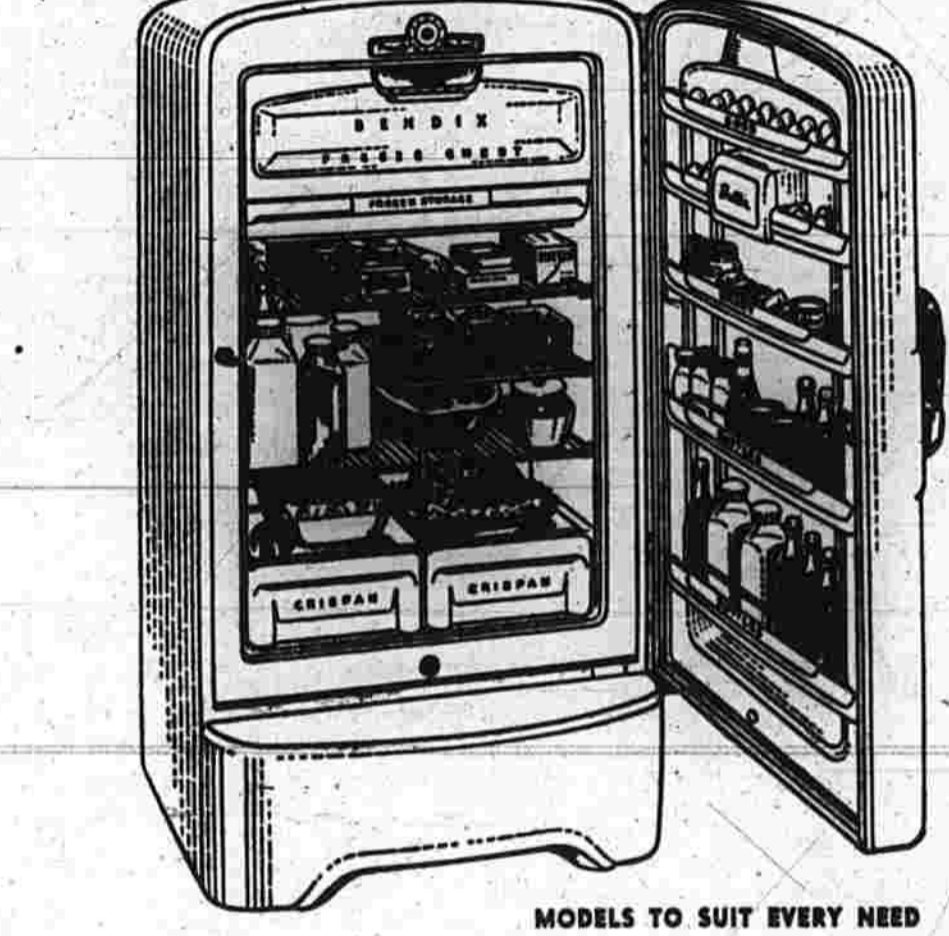

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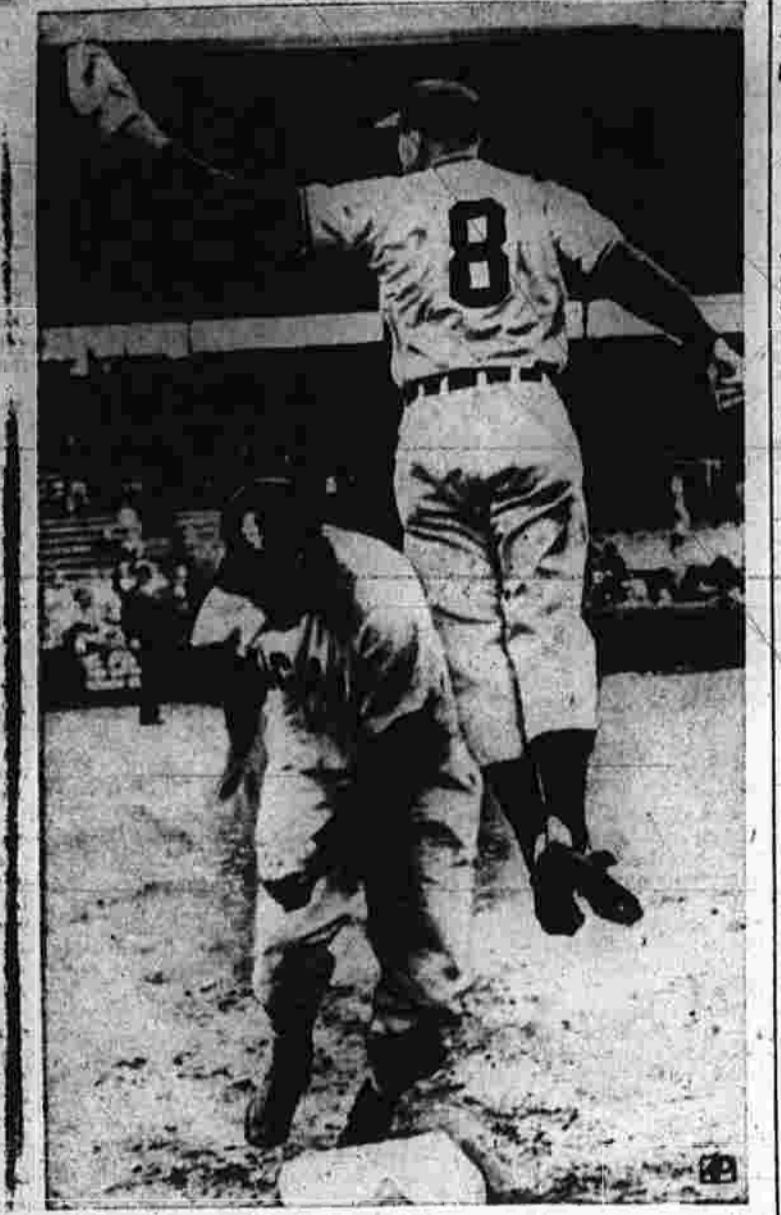

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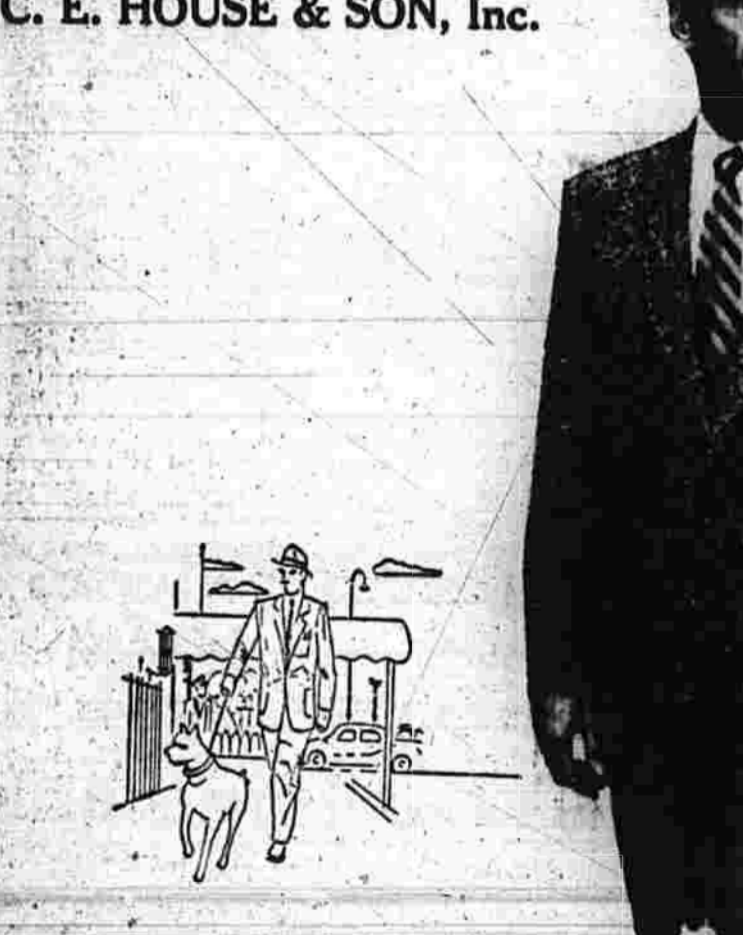
