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Wise Says State Is Determined On Pollution Abatement Policy

Only Industries Showing Undue Hardship To Be Excused, Director States at Talks Here

William S. Wise, director of the State Water Commission, served notice last night that the commission is determined to carry through on its recently adopted policy of pollution abatement in the Hockanum River valley, and that only those industries which demonstrate undue hardship will be excused from meeting the policy's standards.

Speaking at a public meeting at the Wadsworth school, Wise said the commission hopes to accomplish the clean-up in the valley "in a spirit of cooperation" but added that the commission will use its authority to enforce the standards with the policy if necessary.

About 200 persons, including representatives of industries, municipalities and sportsmen, attended the meeting which was called by the commission to permit an exchange of views on the policy. The audience consisted of persons living in the three towns in the valley, East Hartford, Manchester and Rockville.

Not Just an Ideal

Wise, who was the only member of the state agency to appear, said that the policy should be regarded as a "guide" and not an order, but as an actual order during the evening to accept an interpretation of the policy as an ideal that would be merely a guide to aim at and nothing else.

He said orders would be issued to force the compliance of those industries who in the opinion of the commission need the standards but who "refuse to cooperate."

The policy calls for the completion of plans for sewage treatment plants by July 1, 1953, and sets a deadline of Dec. 31, 1953, for the construction of such plants. In all the commission cites 20 sources of pollution in the valley, and of these nine are in a so-called "serious" category. Wise said the standards which the commission had to respect fairly often. Four of them—Lodall and Fooker, Colonial Board paper company, Colonial Brothers paper company, and the Eighth Illinois District of the Town of Manchester's treatment plant—are located here.

Martin Present

Representatives of the paper companies and the Eighth district, while not coming out in direct opposition to the policy, questioned its reasonableness and repeated previously voiced criticism of the manner in which the policy was adopted. General Manager Richard Martin, who is a former director of the State Water Commission, was in the audience last night but did not speak. The town has prepared a proposed plan for expanding and improving its sewage treatment plant which "Wise" after the meeting said would satisfy requirements "100 per cent."

Mill owners said the policy had been formulated without their advance notice and that the commission had approved plans for the construction of treatment plants that would not meet the requirements of the new order.

Ray S. Warren, president of the Eighth District, said the North End governing body had worked for two years to complete plans for an expansion of its sewage treatment plant and that the standards after all details of it were completed, the state announced its new policy. He said the district could have included all work necessary—the expansion of the present plant and the installation of a secondary treatment plant—in one package and at a possibly cheaper cost if it had known of the commission's plans.

Notes "Hardship"

Warren said the installation necessary under the new policy would cost the district between \$100,000 and \$150,000.

Ready For Wide Settlements

Apparently our negotiators at Manjimon have decided not to engage in any prolonged dispute with the Communist Party. "We believe that the question of Indo-China and the question of Formosa, and therefore, indirectly, the question of the diplomatic place of a peaceful Communist China in the world, must form part of any discussions toward a regulation of the particular problem in Korea.

"The Eisenhower administration plans are informally outlined today, they are tough on the Communists, tough on the South Koreans, and tough on the Chinese. It intends to ask a new boundary for South Korea, north of the 38th parallel, by some 80 miles. It proposes to guarantee the security of this larger South Korea, and at the same time to guarantee that this larger South Korea will not undertake the conquest by force of the Communist Korea left to the north of the new line.

"The Eisenhower administration is considering turning Formosa into a United Nations trusteeship, looking forward to the eventual separate independence for that territory. This would deprive Communist China of all hopes of gaining Formosa, and would also end the sovereignty of Chiang Kai-shek.

"Ending the sovereignty of Chiang Kai-shek would amount to a slight recognition of the facts of Communist China, and would open the way for eventual participation of that nation, if it should remain peaceful, in the affairs of the United Nations.

"It is difficult to be tough on the Communists, on the South Koreans, and on Chiang Kai-shek, and to propose plans that would be tough on some of the China Frsters in the Republican party here at home.

"But in a rough outline, these proposed plans by the Eisenhower administration do represent a basis for settlement and a basis for peace which could be found in no other way. The Eisenhower administration is making it by being provision was made for furnishing medical care to merchant seamen.

Rockville-Vernon Cantor Protests 'Nuisances' In Petition to City Council

Rockville, April 8.—(Special)—Bernie Cantor, speaking for a group of 71 residents at the meeting of the Common Council last night, called attention to the injustice of the recent ordinance passed on "Nuisances."

Cantor said: "The Ordinance on Nuisances as passed by the City Council sets up certain arbitrary and unreasonable measurements and prohibitions. Established business enterprises within the city would be prohibited from reasonable expansion or replacement of worn or burned out facilities. Under the present ordinance, the most reasonable city officials would be prohibited from the care and housing of pigs within the city even under the most sanitary conditions. The restriction goes beyond what a city the size of Hartford has found necessary."

Situation Changed

The official, who asked not to be named, said that situation changed completely when the Nationalist government moved to Formosa. Since 1947, neither the old Truman administration nor the Eisenhower administration has proposed or favored a trusteeship for Formosa, he said.

Eisenhower's statement that the administration has never reached any "conclusion" that a permanent division of Korea is desirable or feasible did not rule out study of such a division.

In fact, it is known that divisions at the narrow waist of the peninsula is one idea receiving official consideration.

Bitterly, Korean opposition to any such solution was stated last night, however, by Korean Ambassador Yu Chan Yang.

The ambassador said in an ABC broadcast that his people never would accept a negotiated truce leaving their country divided, even if it meant annihilation to resist it.

"We were promised unification in 1945," Yang said. "We will fight to the end for that."

Will Fight on Alone

He declared the Koreans will go on with the fight alone if necessary.

If Korea were left divided, the Communist north "poised ready to strike, ready to attack."

"It would probably mean the extermination of the Korean race in the western world," he said.

On Capitol Hill, Sen. Knowland (R., Calif.) told the Senate today he "seemed unbelievable" to him that any decision had been reached on a permanent division of Korea.

Knowland said he had telephoned Secretary of State Dulles and assured him no such statement had come from him.

Knowland said:

"It seems to me the administration and those responsible for foreign policy should investigate and find the foundation where an inspired story of that kind comes from."

"It is extremely important that this kind of loophole be stopped now because this is the only way to have two Secretaries of State. It must speak with one voice."

Mutrie Explains Ruling on Vets Tax Exemption

Service men who served in the armed forces only between Dec. 31, 1947, and June 30, 1950, are not eligible for exemptions up to \$1,000 on their real and personal holdings.

Dec. 31, 1947, was the official end of World War II. Persons who entered service after that are not eligible for the exemptions.

Persons who served before June 25, 1950, and the cessation of hostilities in the Korean conflict, which, of course, has not yet occurred, are eligible for the exemptions under a recent law.

The changes must be made as of Oct. 31 in order to enable the assessor in grant exemptions on the assessments as of Oct. 3 of the year.

Mutrie said no provision has been made for exemptions for service personnel who served from June 25, 1950, in any area other than the Korean theater.

Sprinkle four to five tablespoons water over different areas of the mixture and continue lightly until all particles are here. Form pastry into a ball and cut in half. On a lightly floured board, roll half the dough to 1/4-inch thickness. Line a 9-inch pie pan. Roll the remaining dough for the top crust.

Filling: Chop apricots and simmer in 1 cup water for 15 minutes. Add other ingredients and pour into pastry-lined pie pan. Top with remaining crust, cut slits in cover. Bake at 425 degrees F. for 30 minutes or until fruit is tender.

Turning Lights on Will Help: Doctors Find First Drug To Stop Black Cancer

WASHINGTON, April 10.—(AP)—Doctors here today announced the discovery of the first drug to stop black cancer, a deadly disease that has killed thousands of Negroes in the United States.

The drug, called 5-FU, was developed by Dr. Albert S. Coit, of the Massachusetts General Hospital, Boston.

5-FU has been used so far on only 12 patients with melanoma, a small frame bone which is known to the cancer in five to ten percent of the Negroes.

One man had grown on his face and head, and would have died only two months. Within three months, 5-FU abolished his cancer.

Dr. Coit said he had a patient who had a cancer of the foot which was perfectly well, without getting any more drug, and returned to work. But a bit more than a year after the treatment was started, the seeds of cancer in his body flared up again, and he died.
