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### GOP Bucks Changes in Charter, Hearing Turns Hectic in Spots

Talk of 'deals and pressures' punctuated discussion held by City-Boroughs Committee with Judge John S. G. Rottner as its principal spokesman, at the local GOP organization was out in force yesterday to oppose changes in the Town Charter at a hearing of the City and Boroughs Committee of the General Assembly.

The Manchester bill did not come up for consideration until 5 p. m. and the arguments went on until after 8:30. The hearing was held in the State Capitol.

Mayor S. Hathaway and T. J. Crockett, co-chairman of the Charter Revision committee, and Charles O. Bowers, chairman of the City and Boroughs committee, were present. A number of the Charter Revision committee and the City and Boroughs committee, spoke in favor of most of the changes.

No one else appeared and supported the bill. Attorney John D. LaBalle attended the hearing but left before the Manchester bill came up for consideration.

Temper flared at two points. Bowers took exception when William S. Davis, chairman of the Republican Town committee, made a reference to Bowers support of LaBalle, a Democrat, in the organization of the present Board of Directors.

At another point—"that's a typical remark," Hathaway retorted while Rottner told the committee that Hathaway "isn't that business as usual."

Rottner was speaking at the time about a proposal which would prohibit the same auditor for more than four years in succession. Rottner said the position would be a "political plum."

The same term was used by both sides to describe the town council's job.

"I could have had any kind of deal I wanted, if I had given up the idea of being chairman of the Board of Directors," Bowers said at one point, asserting that the present method of choosing the officers of the board results in "all kinds of deals and pressures."

"Double-crossing"

He said there was "maneuvering and double-crossing" in the 1932 organization of the board, and that in 1930 "in the confusion, a Democrat came out with the best appointments the board can make—that of town council." LaBalle was appointed to the post that year.

Bowers strongly advocated a change which would make the high vote getter in the general election and the next high vote getter secretary of the board.

At the organizational meeting of the present board, an unexpected open fight over the chairmanship failed to materialize. Bowers, the board elected Bowers chairman, and Harold A. Turkington, secretary, without dispute.

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### Medical Student Takes Own Life

New Haven, April 10 (Special)—Medical Examiner Marvin M. Scarborough says a Yale medical student who was the president of his class took his life yesterday by drinking a liquid described as lethal.

The student was identified as Kenton A. Williams, 25, of Richmond, Conn., who was a member of the Yale Medical Class of 1933 and who was described as "a very popular student."

On a table near where Williams' body was discovered in his dormitory room lay a note to his mother, saying: "I'm sorry I'm doing this but it's the only way."

A second note was addressed to the girl Williams was engaged to marry in June. Police said Williams had written that he did not want to hurt the girl, but they did not disclose other contents.

Dr. Marvin M. Scarborough stated the death was a suicide but said he could not determine what the liquid was. He described it as a thick, black fluid and said he was certain it killed the student, who was to graduate from Yale this June.

Scarborough quoted fellow students of Williams as saying the latter did not appear depressed and that he went to his scheduled classes during the day.

Williams studied for his bachelor's degree at Washington and Lee University, Lexington, Va., and was a Phi Beta Kappa member.

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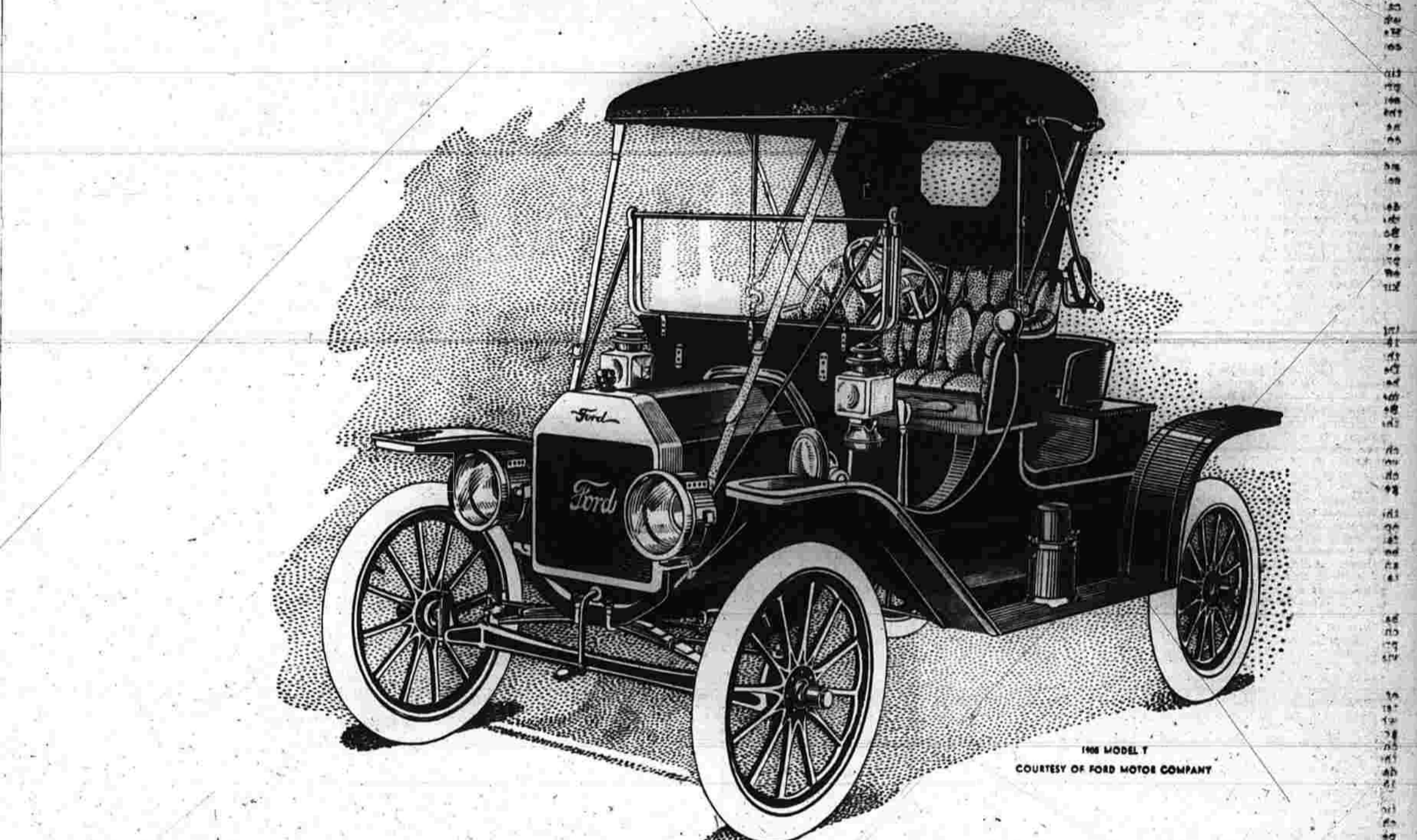
