Both men are former top executives of General Motors.

A month ago Wilson was known to be questioning the wisdom of the "bread and butter" mobilization program instituted by the former administration.

Uses Sharp Words

In his prepared address, Kyes used sharp words in talking of the mobilization program started with the beginning of the Korean war in 1950 — "Fantastic paper targets," "extraneous figures," "poor planning and inefficient execution."

He cited as examples: "One mobilization plan resulted in requirements over and above those on hand which would cost \$10 million dollars for hard goods alone. And that was on the basis of a surplus of calculating machines."

A basic problem in mobilization production, Kyes said, is that military "cut the mobilization to the bone in time of peace" and the military always calls for more than it needs in time of war.

To avoid waste and inefficiency, he said, both agencies must practice strict economy.

When the Korean war broke out in mid-July 1950, Kyes said, the "huge sums" and the military mobilization program were "unrealistic schedules," Kyes said.

But with cutbacks and stretch-out later, he said, the mobilization targets crumbled before the realities.

"However, Kyes said, it is the military's abandonment of their present attitude of absolute responsibility for economic consequences, we should insist that the civilian attitude of irresponsibility between wars should be abandoned."

Earlier, President Laurence F. Lee of the Chamber of Commerce had forecast "increasing decentralization" of the government. He predicted the states and even local units of its organization would take over some federal functions.

### Open Clash Over Tariff Is Averted

The issue, which often stirs a party-splitting fight in Congress, is especially important this year. Many U. S. Allies and some administration leaders have been urging a relaxing of tariffs and duties to permit foreign countries to sell more goods here.

The House's maritime discussion with GOP congressional leaders failed to set up a commission to study U. S. foreign economic policy, and specifically the Reciprocity Information Act.

House Speaker Martin told newsmen after the conference that Eisenhower is planning a message to the Senate dealing with creation of the study committee.

Martin said the commission would have three Senate members and three House members, and five members to be named by the President.

Senate Majority Leader Tamm said it will be necessary to create a commission authorizing such a commission.

Simpson Inflation

Simpson is an influential member of the tariff-handling Ways and Means committee and chairman of the Republican Congressional Campaign committee. The group will work with Eisenhower next year to try to retain and extend the Republican margin of control in the House.

Under the present law, the President has power to negotiate new tariffs below levels determined by the tariff commission, but a danger to American industry.

Further, the President can set aside tariff commission recommendations that current import taxes be increased to provide adequate protection for American industries against cheaper competition from foreign goods.

Simpson's bill, as originally introduced, would have taken away these presidential powers and would have required that any amendments to the present law be passed by Congress.

Appointment of Joseph E. Talmadge to the tariff commission by the Republican House majority is known to favor high tariff protection.

Whether the administration would accept these changes in the present law remains to be seen. Eisenhower has said he would not rule out all amendments to the present law.

### Court Opposes Punishing Parents

New York (AP)—The Domestic Relations Court is against the theory of punishing parents for acts of vandalism committed by their children.

The court says that such a plan is unconstitutional because it requires parental sympathy and cooperation.
