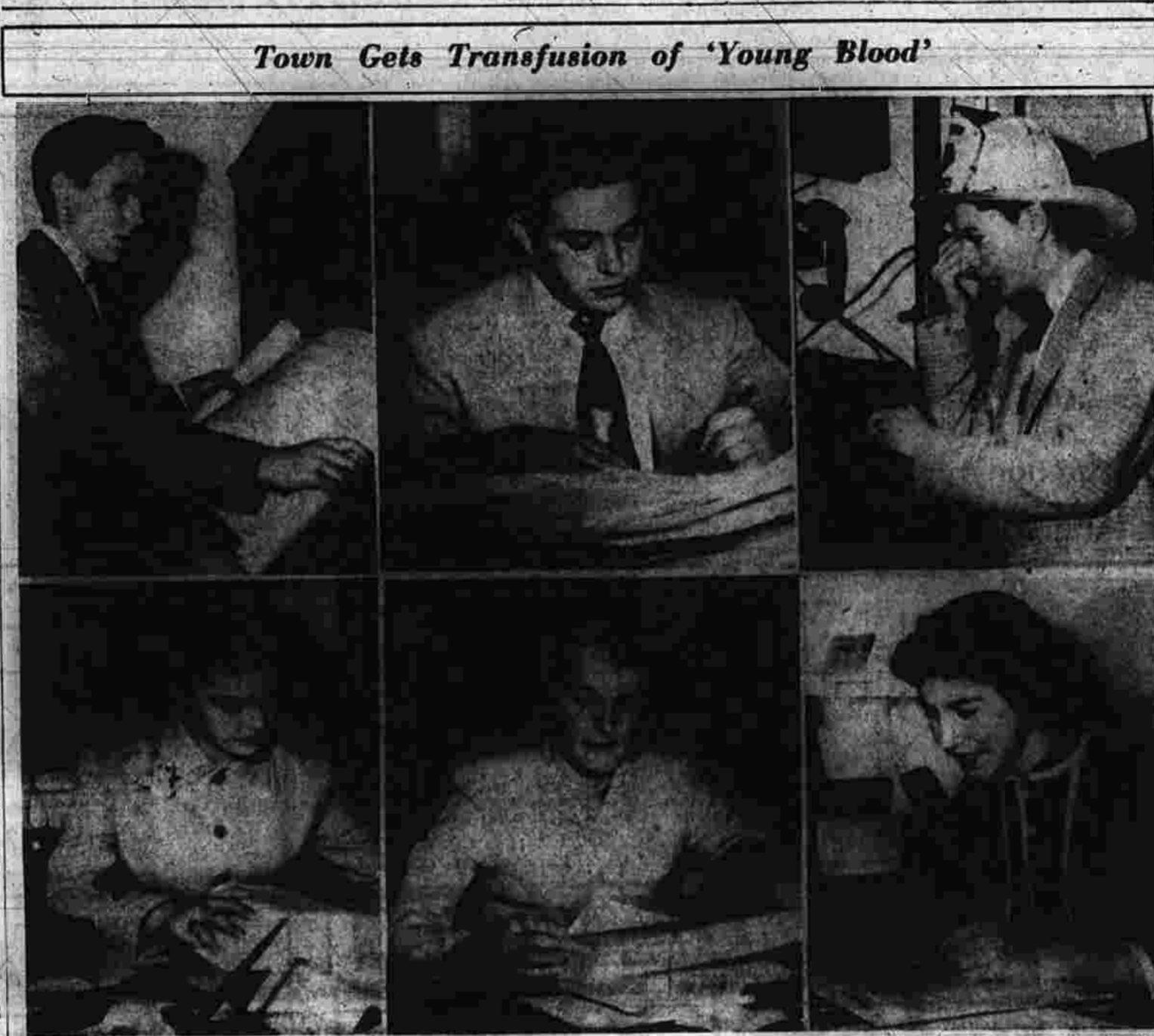

Secretary of State Dulles told the House Foreign Affairs committee yesterday that negotiation had recently taken "a turn for the better." He did not explain how this had come about.

James C. Dunn, veteran diplomat sent to Madrid a month ago as the new ambassador there, returned to Washington last week and to report to President Eisenhower and Dulles on agreement prospects with the Spanish government with State Department officials.

Dulles said Dunn had brought the latest Spanish proposals but the Secretary did not explain what they were. It has been understood in the past that the Franco government wanted the U. S. to undertake a large scale modernization of its Spanish army as one condition. Madrid reportedly has been interested also in assurance of future economic and military aid beyond the 125 million dollar program authorized by Congress to date.

The administration, due to ask Congress to reappropriate the 125 million dollar which has been used, may also propose an additional appropriation for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Last February the Franco government was reported to have raised its asking price for base rights, apparently as a means of testing how much the Eisenhower administration was willing to pay.

President's indications are that, aside from the possibility of proposing an additional appropriation, new administration will stand on the same policy as the previous regime.

The subject of Spanish bases came up in the committee hearing yesterday when Dulles was asked what alternate plans for European defense are available if the European Defense Community (EDC) — under which West Germany would rearm — falls through. He declined to discuss the subject in public except to say an nation could fill a gap left by an unarmed Germany at the center of western defense lines.

They were isolated as though they were mental lepers who might contaminate the general public. This very action implies lack of confidence in the American system of life."

The answer is, of course, that there is no valid reason, outside of less actual experience and maturity in the business of maintaining a certain way of life. What does happen, very often, is that those who hold some measure of personal responsibility seem to have much less understanding of America and Americans, and much less faith in this country, than ordinary citizens. The way up to the mountains is too easy for morons.

Even child psychology, if we hear with it long enough, may eventually come to some of the common sense which existed, quite effortlessly, in the days when nobody bothered every problem by studying it to excess.

The other day, for instance, a child expert came up with the conviction that the non-delinquent children represent quite a problem for society. The child who is too well-behaved, too obedient, too polite, too submissive is, he said, a potential danger to himself and to society. Why? Because he is likely to grow up into a spineless follower of any dictator or demagogue who comes along.

Not accustomed to stand up for themselves and their own rights, and their own ideas, they tend to find their security in becoming the obedient slaves of any master.

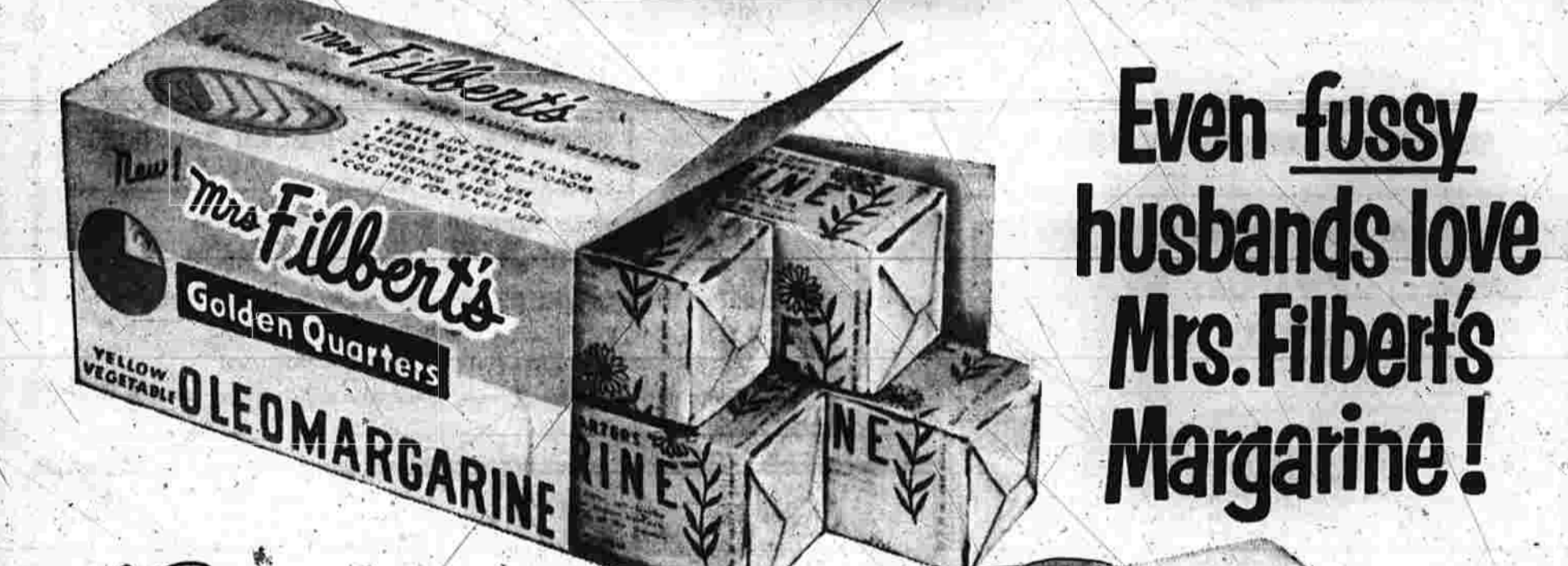

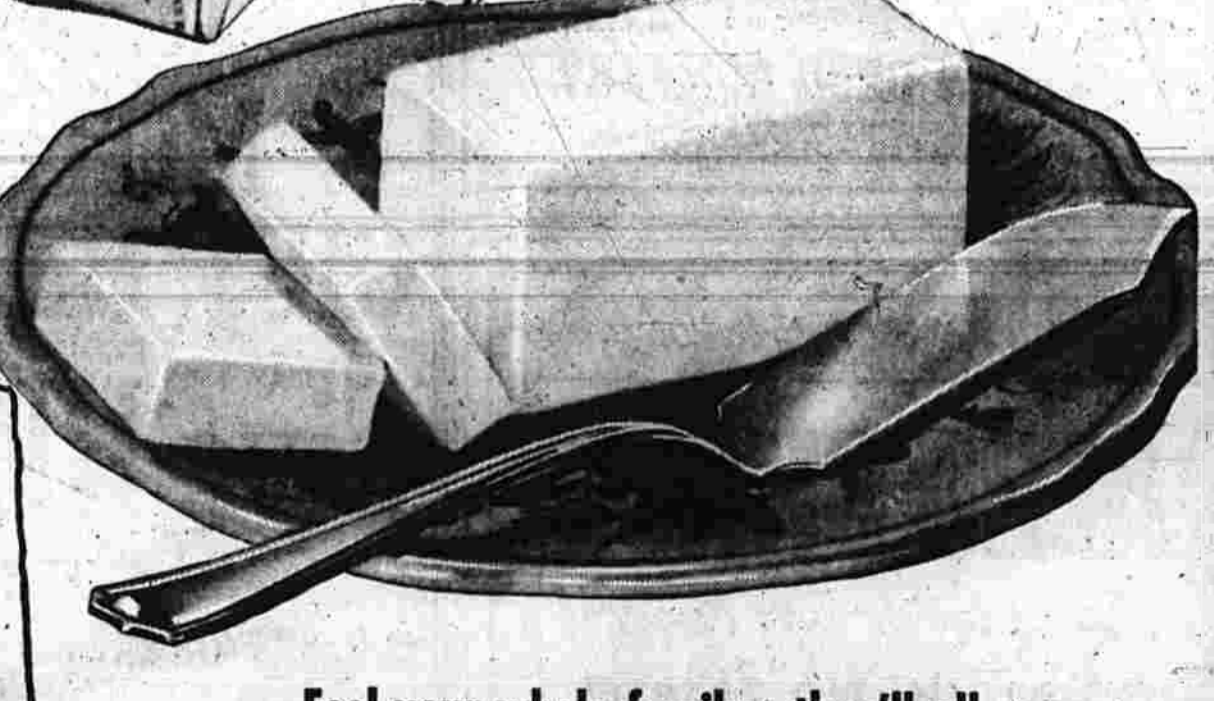

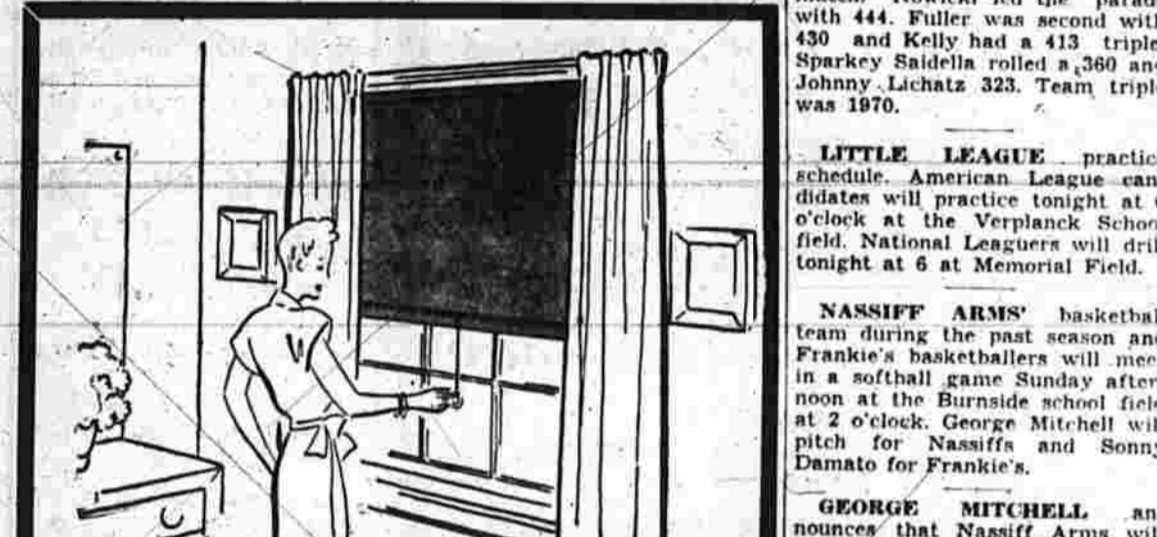
