High School Estimates Slashed by Half Million

Total of Appropriations Asked Now 5 Million After Reductions in Facilities for Sports

Half a million dollars was cut from the estimated cost of the proposed high school last night by the joint subcommittee on the school which met in the hearing room of the Municipal Building.

The committee formally voted to recommend to the Board of Directors when it meets Friday that an appropriation of \$4,500,000 be made for the high school with an auditorium for 1,200 seats and a swimming pool.

The original estimate of \$5,000,000 was based on a plan for a school with an auditorium for 1,500 seats and a swimming pool. The directors will decide after the June 5 hearing, what alternative choices on the high school the voters will have.

Three alternatives mentioned last night and at previous meetings of the joint subcommittee on the high school include:

1. The high school with an auditorium for 1,200 seats and a swimming pool at an additional cost of \$100,000.
2. Substitution of an auditorium for 1,500 seats for the swimming pool at an additional cost of \$100,000.
3. Inclusion of a swimming pool at an additional cost of \$100,000, but not including some other facility, probably gymnasium, which would be provided for the pupils who would be using the pool.

The possibility of choosing a school with no auditorium at all was also mentioned by the committee.

Last night's hearing of the estimate came about as the result of a meeting which included reducing from 10 to 8 the number of tennis courts and paving them with asphalt instead of clay. The estimated cost of the school was \$4,500,000. A state grant on the school would be about \$1,000,000. The town has a capital improvement reserve fund of \$500,000 which could be used and \$250,000 left from the school bond issues which might also be put toward the school.

If all these funds are used the cost would be about \$3,250,000.

Following 1951 troubles in the Suez, Egypt ordered 40,000 native workers of the British payroll to work after the disorders subsided.

The Egyptians charged officials last night that British soldiers had killed eight Egyptian and wounded 17 in the zone since April 1952. A government statement said 100 British soldiers were killed in the London government zone since the British military's provocative actions.

A British military spokesman said two wounded had been killed and two wounded on the British side since April 1. British Minister of State Selwyn Lloyd told the House of Commons in London Tuesday there had been 30 attacks on the British during April and May.

Egyptian dispatches from Suez said the firing last night continued sporadically from 10 p. m. until 1:30 a. m. today near the old village of Rafi. The village had been partially destroyed by the British in January, 1952, to clear space for a roadblock during Anglo-Egyptian strife then current.

An Interior ministry source said British authorities in the area had been advised beforehand that gun salvos would be fired to herald Ramadan, the month during which Muslims fast from dawn to dusk. There was no immediate comment from the British on the report.

Egyptian casualty figures were announced shortly after Egypt's Chief of Staff, Lt. Col. Gamal Abdel Nasser, predicted a popular uprising against British forces unless the London government removes its 80,000-man garrison from the Canal Zone within two or three months.

(Continued From Page One) The Allied counter-offer would be 34,000 North Korean prisoners who refuse repatriation and, under certain conditions, would permit the Reds to remain in the area of a five-nation commission...

North Korean Gen. Nam Il called the Allied plan "unreasonable and absurd" and said it was simply a "disguise" to hold prisoners forcibly.

The senior Communist delegate hammered at the Allied proposal in a long statement that made it clear the Reds found nothing suitable about it.

Two months of Red "explanations" failed to sway the Chinese. The Allies would release them outright. The Red plan would leave the negotiators since they were re-armed conference.

The UN Command carefully watched out of the Red's May 7 proposal any provision that could force prisoners home against their will and suggest that India be the only nation on the commission to supply troops.
