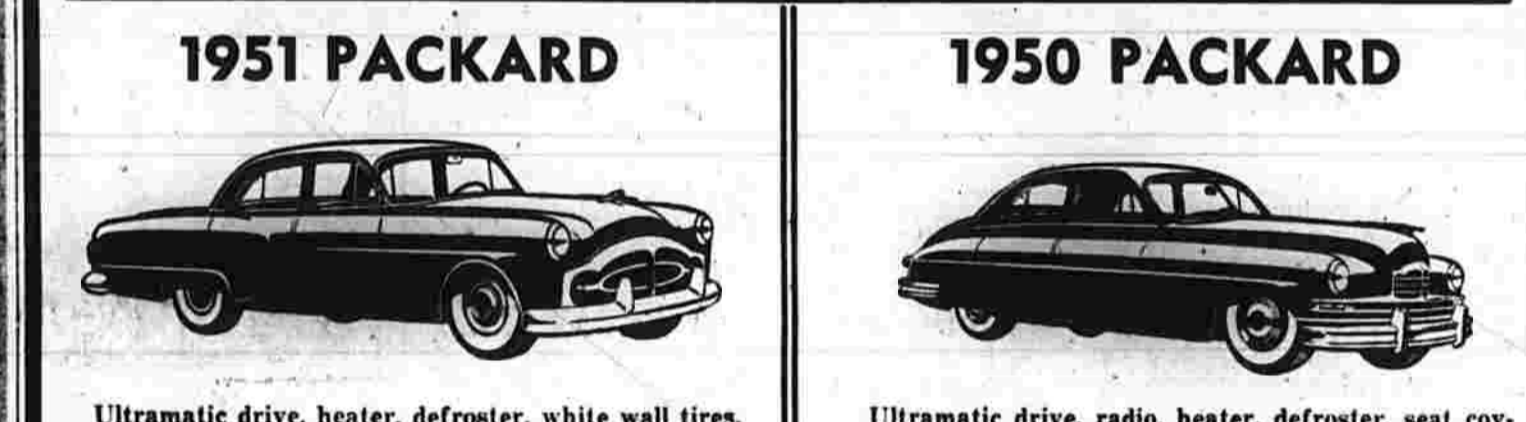

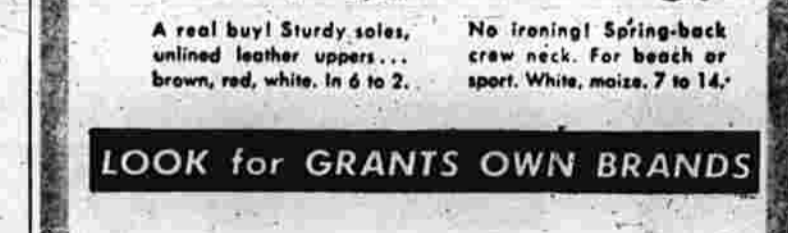

### Women Unlock Protest Chains As Action Fails

President in charge of housing, remained in his office until the women left the building.

"There was no company statement on the matter."

Lowie and the women started their war of endurance before noon yesterday when the six housewives and a seventh woman showed up to protest the eviction scheduled to begin the first Negro tenants at the Metropolitan's Parkchester housing development in the Bronx.

The seven women, two Negroes and five white, waited five hours before Lowie agreed to see them. They talked with him for an hour, and then six of the women pulled chains and padlocks from their purses. The seventh woman, who is white, remained free to act as a messenger for the others.

No effort was made to put out the women. However, the message building when she left to get food for the others; Guards told her no one was permitted to enter after the close of the work day.

However, the rule was lifted shortly before midnight for the benefit of newsmen, permitting several reporters to join two of the women most of the day. News photographers remained barred; even the building during the night.

Before preparing to go to sleep in their chairs at about midnight, the women munched cookies and crackers, sang and chatted, and insisted they were not hungry after their food supply ran out.

One of the six women, Mrs. Sophie Decatur, a Negro, whose family is the one scheduled for eviction today, she and her husband, Michael, a railroad dining car worker, and their two small children got into Parkchester on a "I have nothing to say," Lowie said.

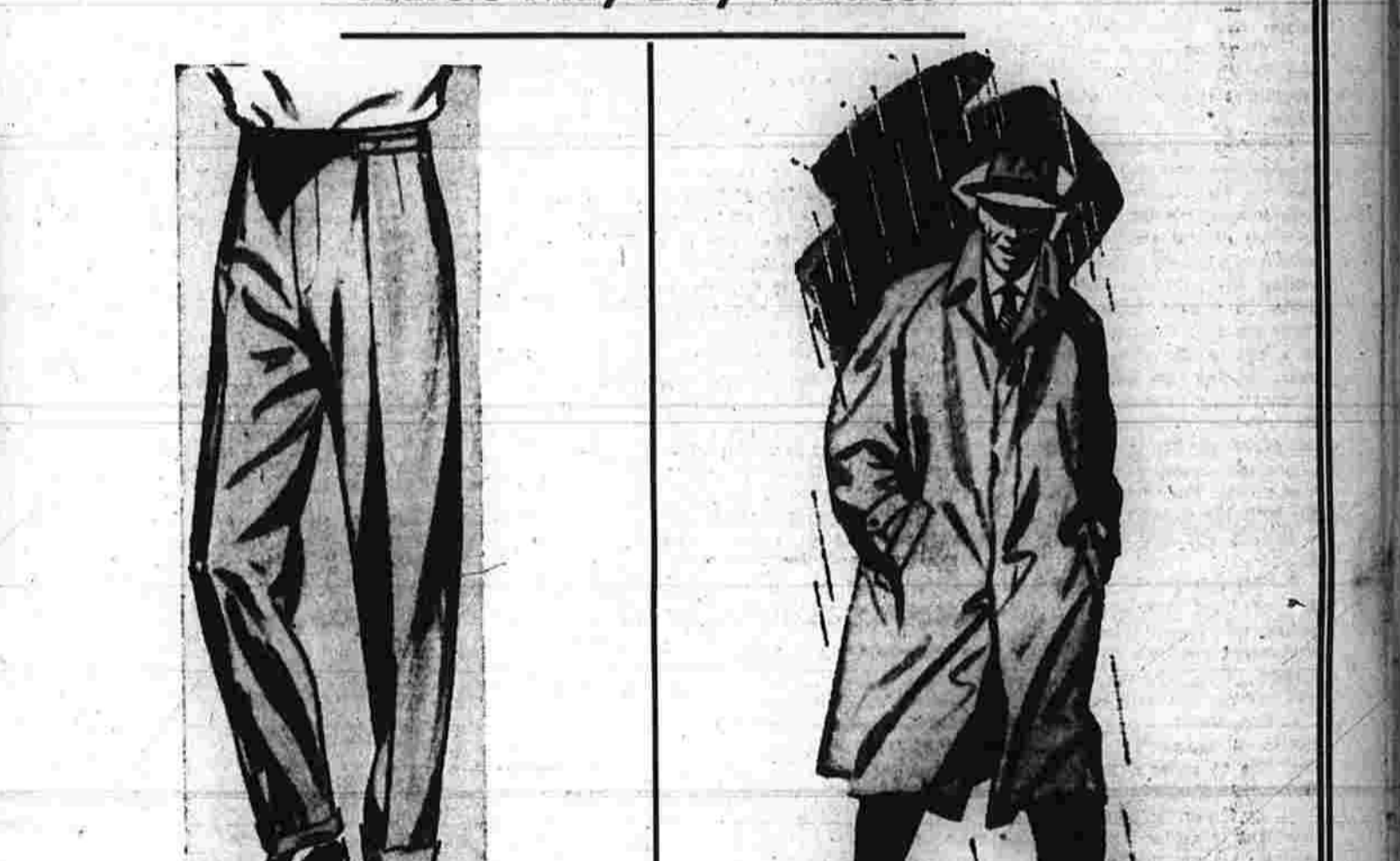

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**Getting our own small word in early, we would answer the President by saying that two things have occurred in the same era. The first is that the human race, or at least our portion of it, has become softer and more civilized.**

The second is that the institution of war has become more brutalized, mechanized, totalized.

On the one hand, there is less belief in war as a solution of world problems. On the other, war has become more and more a depersonalized business, minus destruction. On the one hand, there is less instinct for and response to the idea of glory in combat, and, on the other hand, there is less individual glory in combat.

We are a civilization which thinks more with our heads and less with our guts. We have seen two world wars not settle much, but we are intelligent enough to ask the way of war, and we do not find any good positive answer, only knowing that, when and if it comes, the same might as well be destruction. We must take our part in it.

The gap between the nature of man, and the institution of war, has widened. It has widened to such an extent that some personalities rebel, within their own national processes, when called upon to jump the gap.

This, it seems to us, is the main answer to the President's question.

There will inevitably be discussion as to whether or not we are lacking in that patriotism—not taxation, both appealing directly to the people for support in their own decisions. Their reason for going directly to the subject in their view, they were faced, in their own stand on the taxation problem, with controversy in the legislative ranks of their own party.

President Eisenhower, from Washington, was asking that the people accept, willingly and patriotically, his estimate that the security of the country does not permit tax reductions now. He was asking the politicians of his own party to refrain from trying to carry through their glib promises of a cut in the income tax this year. He was also asking modern businessmen to do something even more difficult. He was asking them not to let the excess profits tax on business expire, as it is scheduled to do next month. For Congress to act with his policy it would have to pass a new law extending the tax.

The President's point is that, if the need for high revenue comes, all elements in America's life should continue to pay their present share, with no special relaxation for any one element.

A Republican Congress would like to cut income taxes. It would also like to show a little special consideration, after years of New Deal, for the nation's business. President is asking the people to approve his position that neither of these things should be done now. Governor Lodge, from Hartford, last night, was confronted with much of the same problem, and was asking much the same thing. The need for additional taxes, by tax reduction is conceded from all sides.

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**Another Ally Joe Won't Like**

As against the behavior of Senator McCarthy and his fellow isolationists, who resent the idea that this nation has allies who question our policies, we tend to be glad that we do have allies, and that they are bold enough to speak their minds.

One of our best allies, Canada has, it has now been revealed, spoken its mind concerning the Korean truce talks, in a formal inquiry to our State Department, in a letter to the Secretary of State, which has listed the three instances in which last week's American proposal in Korea violated the truce agreement we ourselves had previously approved.

The Canadian note listed three departures from our previous policy as follows:

The counter-proposal we made would not permit a decision on the eventual fate of prisoners by a political conference, even with a cutoff date. This we had agreed to when we voted for the Indian proposal of last fall.

The counter proposal made a distinction between North Korean and Chinese prisoners, while the resolution we voted for in the United Nations established the same procedure for all.

The counter-proposal would require that all decisions taken by the neutral commission which would take over the prisoners after an armistice should be by unanimous vote. We made it clear during our debate on the Indian proposal in the United Nations that we expected decisions to be by majority vote.

These are facts. They are the facts we ignored when we formulated last week's counter-proposal.
