Stanley Boynton Drowns When Rowboat Capsizes

Coventry, May 21 (Special)—Little Sister of the Poor. The action of four teenagers who were out on Lake Wachaug yesterday ended in tragedy when the boat capsized and one of the youths, Stanley Boynton, drowned while attempting to swim to shore.

After the boat tipped, Boynton, who State Police said was known to be a strong swimmer, struck out for shore. He swam down about 25 feet of water about 100 feet from land. Immediate efforts to locate him proved unsuccessful.

With Boynton were George Adams, 18, of Perkins Corner, Mansfield; Robert Harris, 15, of Kingswood terrace, South Coventry; and Ernest Jones, 17, of High street, South Coventry. Adams and Harris began swimming toward shore together, while the other two stayed near the boat according to Sgt. Edward Forman, chief of the South Coventry Police Department.

The body was recovered at about 7:30 p. m. by Coventry volunteer firemen A. Samuel LeDoy and Robert L. Heims, who were assisting a Williamson Police Department emergency unit. Forman said that the body was recovered from a boat in the 43rd Division in Germany. Currently he was employed by Pratt and Whitney Aircraft Division in East Hartford as a machine operator.

He leaves, besides his parents, two brothers, Robert Boynton of North Coventry; his paternal grandfather, F. A. O'Brien of South Coventry; and his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hobby of Storrs. Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Rev. Truman G. DeMoody, pastor of the First Congregational Church in South Coventry on Saturday at 2 p. m. Rev. Truman G. DeMoody will officiate.

Multi-Level School Plan Presented to Committee

Plans for the proposed new high school showing development of the site on several levels rather than one were shown to the members of the School Building present at a meeting last night.

Ray S. Goele, chairman of the committee, and the joint subcommittee on the high school, said the plans were delivered to him late yesterday afternoon. The multi-level plan reduces the estimated cost of cut and fill by \$40,000 to \$23,000. 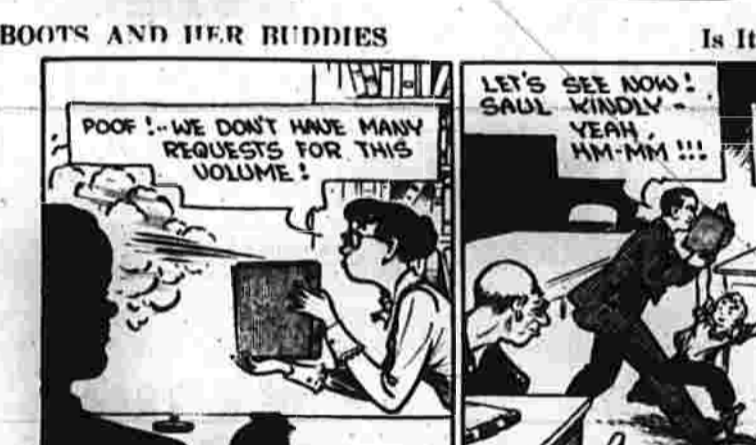
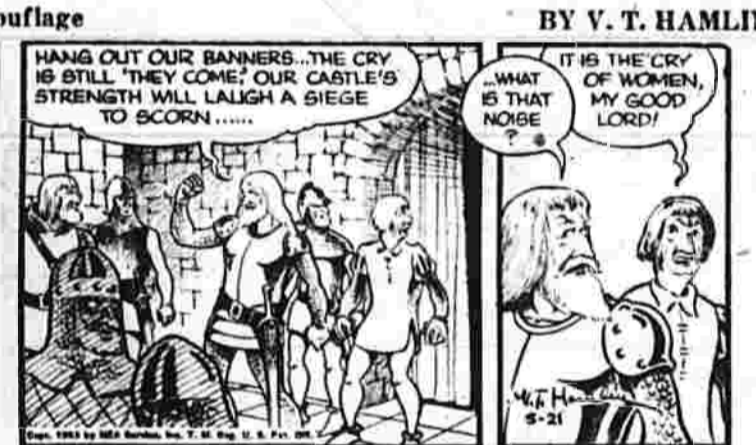

State Planning to Widen Middle Turnpike West

The State Highway Department is completing plans for the reconstruction of Middle turnpike west from the Wilbur Cross Highway toward the Center street intersection, which would provide a new, broad and well-paved approach to the town. The department also proposes to improve Center street, to widen it from Middle turnpike west toward to Dixie street. Both roads, actually part of the same state highway, already have been surveyed, and the proposed improvements are about ready to move out of the planning stages and onto the drawing board for detailed design. Will Start Next Year Construction is expected to begin next year. Present plans by the Planning division call for the turnpike to be more than doubled in width, widening it to 76 feet and making it a four-lane road with a center island. Reconstruction of Middle turnpike west will require the regrading of the center-island now located at the Center street intersection, but whether the island, composed of hard-packed earth, some motorists as a hazard to night driving will be redesigned, is not known. This part of the job will be undertaken by the Traffic Control division of the department.
