The Truman administration goal of 143 wings by mid-1953 which the Air Force supports as "the absolute minimum in order to attain adequate national security in view of the military strength of the Soviet Union." In 1951, the report said, the Air Force recommended 155 wings to match the basic national security policy.  
3. Reduce personnel from present strength of 800,000 to 600,000 on June 30, 1950—some 3,000 less than the report said were essential to man 120 wings.  
4. Limit next year's spending to \$11,000,000 and curtail "delaying or cancelling" of some contracts, resulting in "some reduction" in the standards of equipment.  
5. A three billion dollar cut in requested new appropriations, causing delay in aircraft deliveries scheduled for the next two years to "maintain a going aircraft industry." Otherwise, the report said, "large segments of the aircraft industry" might cut back on sharply. They could not undertake future orders.

on," he declared. "It is difficult not to have distrust. The Soviet Communists could bring about a stoppage of aggression in Laos. They could sign an Austrian treaty. The United States has made concessions after concessions on the Austrian question."  
The U. S. secretary also endorsed a suggestion by Indian Vice President Sarvabali Radhakrishnan that Moscow should dissolve the Cominform "as an indication that they will cease entirely conspiring against the freedom of independent nations."  
All Dulles' answers were prepared in advance on the basis of questions submitted to him and he refused to answer on-the-spot queries, a procedure which aroused considerable resentment among the Indian press.  
Although India attempts to be neutral in the East-West Cold War, Dulles said he did not find the nation neutral "so the question of Democracy vs. Totalitarianism in the world."  
"I am thoroughly convinced," he declared, "that India is acting according to its best judgment to promote Democracy in the world and prevent the spread of totalitarianism. There can be no difference of opinion concerning some methods employed but I feel your government and the vast majority of

up by the secret police who pulled out her hair and finger nails.

Reinemer said one girl was identified by Thierman publicly as a Regina Bartley, who cried and said she said she thought she had a right to repeat such things.

Thierman was quoted by Reinemer as saying FBI agents and prosecutors were spreading rumors.

He said he heard Thierman make several speeches at the festival in which the Army doctor also made such statements as "inks and stool pigeons have been squealing in the strip-tease-trainer boys" at the State Department.

The testimony of Reinemer, who covered the Budapest festival for newspapers and magazines, was entered over the strenuous objections of Emmanuel Bloch, counsel for Thierman.

The attorney also objected to the introduction as evidence of copies of a mimeograph newspaper published by the American delegation at the festival.

Bloch also argued unsuccessfully for dismissal of the nine-officer panel trying Thierman and for a mistrial.

Block labelled both Reinemer's testimony and the festival exhibits as "inflammatory" and "prejudicial."

Bloch contended that the prosecution so far has brought out evidence and testimony designed only to show Thierman joined the Communist party in 1941.

He added that there is no ground for inferring that alleged membership was continuous through 1949.

Mrs. Margaret Clark, 72, of Watford, Ont., died in a hospital early today. She was Sarnia's only fatality.

Rescue workers dug into the debris on the street behind the border in a search for additional victims. Thirty-six persons were treated for injuries in Fort Huron. Of the 12 hospitalized, five were listed in a critical condition.

In Sarnia, more than 50 persons were treated for wounds and 15 of them were hospitalized.

The storm spent its fury over Lake Ontario after backstepping from southeastern Michigan across southwest Ontario. Province. It left destruction along a 40-mile path.

The business district of the oil refining center of Sarnia bore the full brunt of the storm. Bulldozers had to clear away the rubble.

In the Port Huron area, damage was mostly to residential property. Many persons reported lucky escapes. The Sarnia area was vanquished into the howling wind.

Far to the south in Louisiana, the great levee passing slowly on the raging Calcasieu River today but waters that forced 2,000 families from homes were expected to be cut for several hours.

The highest flood in 40 years in southwest Louisiana caused two million dollars property damage and cut the last highway link with the outside world.

There were no casualties at Lake Charles but elsewhere in Louisiana eight persons had drowned since rain-swollen rivers and bays began flooding the state late last week.

A big flood threat was building up at Orange, Texas, a city of about 20,000 population 35 miles southwest of the Sabine River, divides Texas and Louisiana, was expected to crest at Orange about 4 a. m. (est.) tomorrow.

Hundreds of Navy reservists in southern Texas and Lake Charles and Texas National Guardsmen were called out to help fight the rampaging Sabine.

The sawmill town of Deweyville, Texas, north of Orange, already was swamped by the turbulent floodwaters.

Police used civilian volunteers to guard vacated houses in Lake Charles subdivisions to the east and north where the Calcasieu River spread over scores of acres. More than 600 homes were stand-

Former President Truman twice vetoed similar bills. His position was that wealth from exploitation of the tidelands belonged to all the people, not alone to the coastal states.

For the federal government to claim the lands, proponents of the new legislation argued, would amount to robbery of the states.

per cent under the November record.

The bureau said that living costs now are seven-tenths of one per cent above a year ago and 17.7 per cent more than when the Korean war began.

Food costs, which reached a peak last August, now are 2.1 per cent below a year ago but 10.9 per cent above the level when the Korean war began.

Food costs declined two-tenths of one per cent from mid-March to mid-April. Housing expenses, including rents and household maintenance, averaged two-tenths of one per cent higher.

Apparel costs were down a bit with clothing prices lower but footwear prices higher.

The Bureau reported increases in costs of medical care, cigarettes, transportation, gasoline, auto repairs, movie admissions and television repair. Some of these increases were only local among cities in which the Bureau collects its price information.

Today's index has no effect on labor contracts, many of which are hinged to the government living cost figures. The contract provides that pay rates rise or fall according to index changes.

However, most are geared to the Bureau's "old series" index. The mid-April figure for that series won't be announced until next week. It will affect wage rates of
