Presumably statesmen would take over as head of the new foreign aid agency, Dr. Robert L. Johnson, present in Manila, is expected to stay on as new chief of the information setup.

The new foreign operations administration would have charge of these programs:

1. American technical aid to friendly countries overseas.
2. The present program for helping escapees from Iron Curtain areas, authorized by a \$100,000,000 appropriation by Congress.
3. The present multi-billion dollar economic aid program to some 40 countries under which the United States helps nations build output maintain economic stability.
4. The United Nations' Emergency Fund, the United Nations' Korean Reconstruction Agency and the Inter-governmental Committee for European Migration.
5. The Palestine refugee program and American contribution to a United Nations-run technical aid program overseas.

The director of the new United States Information agency would be Robert L. Johnson, who has been through the National Security Council's review process.

The United States Secretary of State as it now the case. In announcing the reorganization plan, White House press secretary James C. Hagerly called attention to one paragraph of the presidential message to Congress on the reorganization.

"This said it is important that each chief of diplomatic mission in each foreign country be given effective coordination of and foreign policy direction of all United States activities in the country."

Hagerly said this means the ambassador in a particular country must be able to coordinate all American activities, including economic and military aid and even the armed forces so far as policy matters are concerned.

Recently, Eisenhower himself stressed that the position of the Secretary of State in making foreign policy must be clarified and strengthened.

The President said the State department now exists on the basis of a patchwork of statutes which should be revised after careful study.

"By early next year," he said in his message, "we will be prepared to appropriate the necessary funds with Congress to recommend such legislation. In the meantime we must improve the arrangements within the framework of existing legislation."

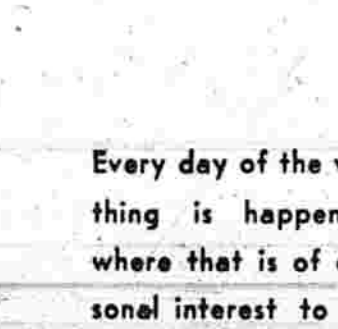

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So, on the one hand, the Communist world is boasting of its self-sufficiency in those items on which we have blocked them, and, on the other, they are offering to "help" Europe solve its own economic troubles, for which we have no clear answer.

In this respect, the Communists are working hard to break down that Iron Curtain, and by ending the isolation of the United States. They are wooing Europe, and they are doing it by offering it the "trade not aid" which is supposed to be our own coming policy. Their capacity really to deliver on such a policy is suspect, but so is our own. What this means, in practical terms, is that our own economic policy must consider not only the relationship between ourselves and Europe, but also the growing relationship between Europe and Russia. We cannot solve this situation in our own favor by unilateral edicts which our allies would refuse to take. We must find a way of competing peacefully and soundly, with benefit both for ourselves and for others, in a

In two formal recent meetings, as well as in private conversations going on constantly, there has been a definite trend of European business toward trade with the countries behind the Iron Curtain. This is at once a defiance of United States policy and a result of European economic conditions. It is being used as an argument for the Communist bloc.

The plight of another group of homeless people, on the other side of the world, has just come to the news. These are the National Chinese, who have been held in Japan since the end of the war. Although they came to Japan as National Chinese, it is to the Chinese mainland, which is now Communist, that they wish to return. The surviving information on the government on Formosa, refuses to give clearance for this, thus preventing them from returning to their native land.

At the two meetings, the international economic meeting in Geneva, and the International Chamber of Commerce meeting in Vienna, the Russians have been offering all kinds of trade concessions that they have been finding some takers.

They have also been having some rather pointed offers to the West in the strategic items which are in the American category whose export to Communist countries is forbidden, to ourselves and our allies, by American embargo policy. Included in these items the Communists have been offering for sale are chromium, molybdenum, petroleum, railroad cars, electrical equipment, machine tools, truck building equipment, trucks and buses—all items of strategic importance which it has been our object to keep the Communist countries from obtaining in their trade with other countries. Now, in effect, they are offering to sell these same items to us.
