ries of the world is 14 cents for the first pound and 14 cents for each additional pound. The new basic rate will be 45 cents for the first pound and 22 cents for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.

In addition to the basic rate, this country in some cases collects additional transit charges or surcharges on behalf of intermediate countries which impose special fees for handling U. S. parcels across their territories.

The new 45-cent basic rate compares with charges of 77 cents for a one-pound parcel incoming from Argentina, 46 cents for the same package delivered from Great Britain and 61 cents for that parcel from France to the United States.

Martin Names Perry to Job

Appointment to School Inspection Job Made Following Examination

James L. Perry, of 211 Hollister street, has been appointed to the \$150 a week school building inspection job by General Manager Richard Martin, the general manager announced today.

He will begin July 7 as inspector on the construction of the Vernon-Lyall School and will have supervisory of both the high school and the Keene Street school if they are approved by the voters June 22.

The school building inspector is the town's chief school representative for construction of school buildings. His function is to see that architect's instructions are carried out and to make daily reports of construction to the general manager.

"Most of the time," Smith said that so far he has withheld all his records and bank books from tax investigators and indicated that he would put up a stiff legal fight against the alleged tax deficiency reported.

needed to bolster west Berlin's security.

"No material contributions such as this, however, can adequately express the admiration of the American people for the courageous stand of the people of Berlin in the face of existing hazards and economic difficulties," he said.

The allocation was made out of foreign aid funds voted by Congress in past years.

The pending House bill merely sets a ceiling on overseas spending for the year beginning July 1, and a more significant test of the President's leadership may arise when actual appropriations are voted later.

Rep. Lawrence H. Smith (R-Wy.) and three other Republicans planned to offer amendments to cut a total of one billion dollars from the bill already reduced 9 per cent below the administration's "harsh minimum."

Representative Vorys (R-Ohio), leading the administration cause, told the House the main issue is: "Does Congress have confidence in the President's leadership?"

Republican leaders indicated they would not fight to eliminate from the bill one provision opposed by the administration.

Aftermath in Korea
 All the potential damage from President Truman's Rhee action in taking events into his own hands has not yet appeared. The worst damage of all may come from the Communist side today, in the Communist official reaction to the situation. So far, encouragingly unofficial reaction from the Communist side has been rather mild, almost as if it was realized that the United Nations itself was not to be held too strictly to account for what Rhee did. But the official position of the Communists take may be something else again. Meanwhile, even if the Communists do pass the incident over, it has already created other complications. President Rhee, South Korea and India agreed to serve on the Korean armistice commission only after they had received assurances that the South Korean troops were under United Nations command, and could, therefore, be restrained from separate courses of action. But, by defying successfully the UN authority, President Rhee has demonstrated that this assurance was not valid. So both countries are now reconsidering their position, which may be in itself a big factor.

Justice Frankfurter stated in the court session that the questions raised by the issuance of the Douglas stay were "complicated and novel."

Frankfurter added that he would dispose of the case only after opposing lawyers had been given full opportunity to state their questions.

Then Justice Black announced from the high bench that he, too, dissented.

Douglas Black Frankfurter and Justice Jackson, made up the four-man minority when the court turned down the Rosenberg appeal last Monday—a rejection that touched off furious and unprecedented legal maneuvering before the high court.

Douglas issued his stay Tuesday on the ground that there was a substantial question whether the Rosenbergs were properly sentenced under the espionage law of 1950.

Charles Descomb is the name of the Brainard Field flying instructor from whom Doering is accused of stealing blank checks, three of which have been forged for a total of more than \$1,000.

Doering is also accused of stealing Descomb's state and federal pilot's licenses and identification card.

Yesterday, a warrant was issued for the youth and a nine-state Doering was sent out, asking that Doering be picked up and held until he is returned to Hartford.

Doering, who smuggled his way into this country in April 1952, after the National Grange, which brought him over here in the first place in 1951, canceled his exchange scholarship and sent him home, he believed to have flown to San Francisco last week after telling friends here he was going to New York to make arrangements for a trip back to Germany.

He had planned to go to Germany to await his turn on the immigration list and return to this country legally.

The government granted him permission after he cooperated with the prosecution in the federal trial of the ship steward from whom he had smuggled him into the country aboard the U. S. United States.

This week, three postcards were received from Doering, all of them postmarked San Francisco. Household Hints

To get the most flavor and nutrition from your fresh vegetables, follow these basic steps:

1. Select only really fresh vegetables. Immediately remove any withered leaves, discoloration or other signs of decay.
2. Store onions, potatoes, garlic, winter squash, etc. in the so-called "dry" vegetables), in a container where cool air can circulate around them. Refrigeration is not necessary. Do not wash before storing.
3. Wash other fresh vegetables as soon as they come from the market. Never soak. Rinse head vegetables (lettuce, cabbage, etc.) under running water but keep the heads intact. Do not cut open and do not loosen leaves before storing.
4. Remove all excess moisture. Store immediately in the crisper pan of the refrigerator, or wrap in food bags, clean damp cloth, waxed paper or aluminum foil before placing in the refrigerator.
5. Cook vegetables in the least possible time. Cook in their skins whenever possible, or pare very thin. Serve promptly.

1. Travel light. Take only what you need. One large suitcase and a small dressing case should see you through any contingency, if you plan your wardrobe well.

Other frequently used drugs such as aspirin, indigestion tablets and first-aid essentials also should be bought before you start.

4. If you need special medicines such as insulin, get your local druggist to give you a list of reputable druggists abroad who can fill prescriptions accurately.
5. Don't eat uncooked vegetables or fruits in Latin American countries, and drink only bottled water in questionable areas, to avoid the ever prevalent "tourist complaint."

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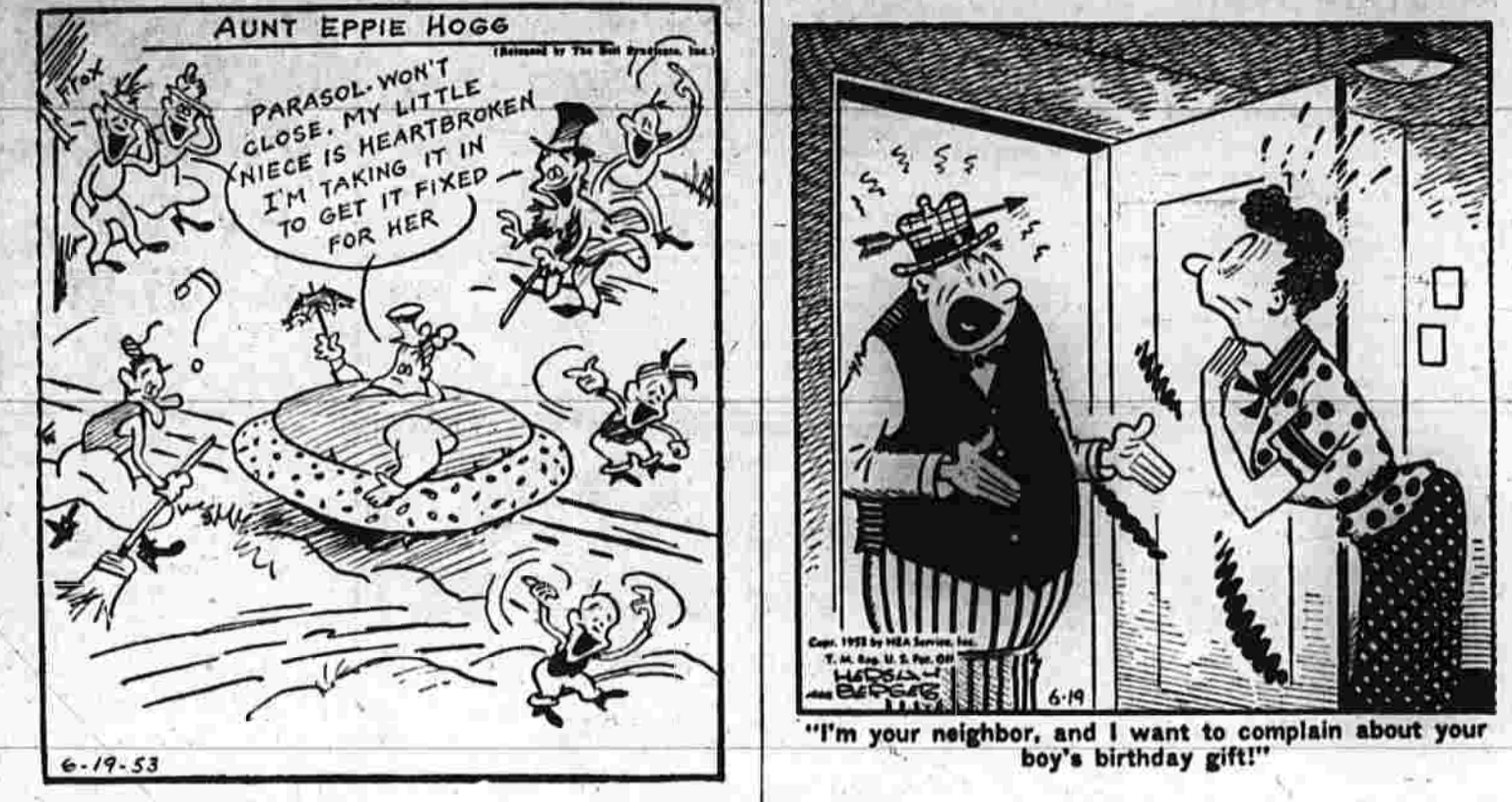

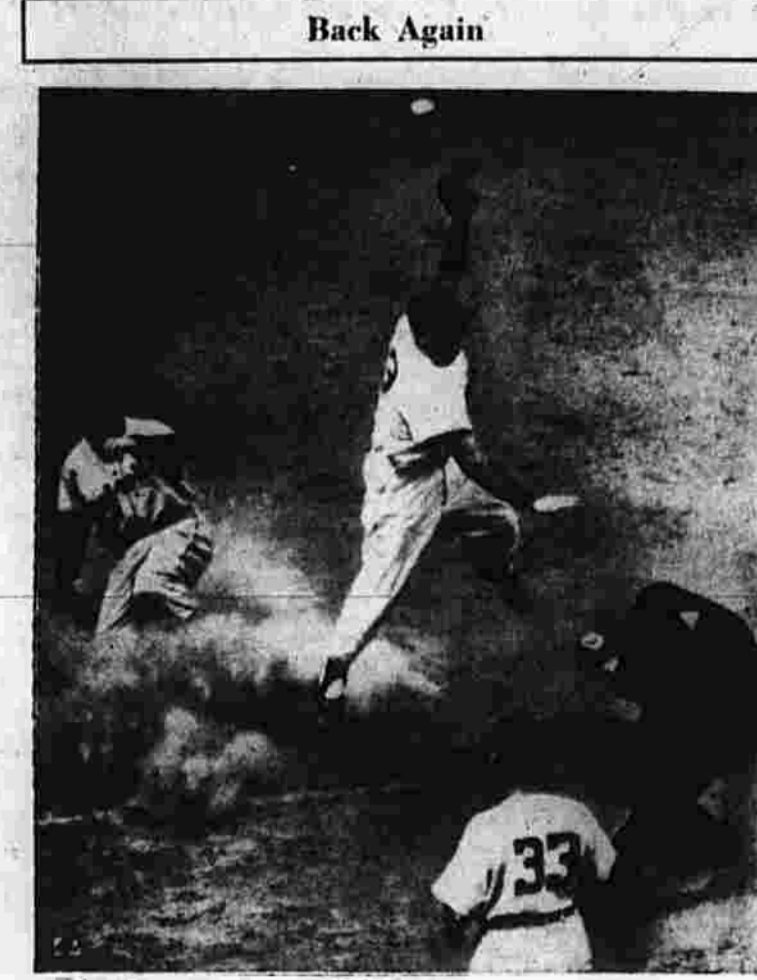
