He said the purpose was to defer judicial hearings while he and other members who also serve on the Appropriations committee were busy with money bills for the new fiscal year starting July 1.
The administration's immigration measure would permit 250,000 European immigrants to enter the U. S. in addition to the 154,000 quota immigrants admissible annually under the McCarran-Walter act.
Of the total, 125,000 visas would be made available for refugees and escapees, mostly in Germany. In addition, the bill would assign 75,000 visas for Italians, 20,000 for Greeks and 20,000 for the Dutch.
Watkins has proposed these quotas be trimmed slightly to provide for the admission of 5,000 refugees from Communist China.

The polio fountain, which is costing much of the estimated \$1,000,000 inoculation tab, is also supplying 30,000 hypodermic needles and 15,000 syringes, together with stacks of other equipment needed to complete the task.
Inoculations begin tomorrow morning and continue 10 hours a day through Friday. Twelve stations in the city and six in Montgomery County have been set up to handle the job on an alphabetical basis.

Hundreds of parents who sought to have their children inoculated early have been turned down, said Dr. D. G. Gill, state health officer. He warned that no shots will be given after First Friday.
Any serum left over, he explains, must be returned immediately. The shipment of antibody-containing fluid derivative is the total amount for inoculation purposes.
Just how much is needed to immunize Montgomery's 31,500 youngsters temporarily is difficult to estimate because the amount of serum depends on the weight of the child.
The shots will be given in the morning and evening, during the hours when the children are in school. Parents have been asked to accompany children to the inoculation stations, which will open for two hours each night so youngsters can bring their youngsters.

Dr. Gil estimates that 500 youngsters will be used in this attempt to ease the nation's worst polio menace. More than 100 Montgomery doctors together with the medical staffs of nearby Maxwell Air Force base and Quaker AFB have also offered their services and will be put to work.
Previous mass inoculations on a test basis also have been about 80 per cent effective in stopping infantile paralysis.

 All units and installations on the island have been placed on a full-time emergency basis and are supplying all possible assistance and relief. A public information office announcement said. Camps in 128 stricken areas are supplying food, clothing, blankets and medical supplies and all available engineer and transportation equipment for relief and repair of highways.

Dulles Grows Vulnerable
 Secretary of State John Foster Dulles remains to be judged, we should say, on what might be called the big things, the big public acts of his tenure. But in the smaller things—and some small things which have a big significance—he is already judged severely. And the judging is being the more severe because Mr. Dulles was one member of the Eisenhower cabinet who presumably had knowledge and experience of government policy to bring to his assumption of office.
 For that he might have learned in his previous posts, his behavior in office has included more fumbles than that of any of the supposed neophytes in the cabinet. And his conduct on little things of big significance has inevitably begun to raise questions as to how much he can be worth on big things of big significance.
 The issue of "book burning" seems to have wrapped all his various kinds of fumbles in one package. He fumbled, first, by running before Senator McCarthy's first move to "clean out" the shelves of American libraries abroad.
 The "directive" which was sent abroad to accomplish this purpose was almost immediately, from its results, and from those matches of its language which became public, another fumble. Then, after the directive had received such a reputation, it was revealed that it had been Mr. Dulles himself who had laboriously written it.
 After this had been revealed, a request was made for a copy of the directive written by Mr. Dulles and sent abroad to our libraries. Then came another shocking fumble. The State Department announced that the document had been "classified" secret, as a part of cold-war strategy and became public knowledge of it would be a "threat to security."
 This remarkable pronouncement came one week after President Eisenhower had formally announced a revision of the famous Truman "security order." This revision was to such an extent, very fast, to improve our reputation for "security" to be used by bureaucrats to cover up their own blunders.
 All this sort of thing is not only a disappointment to well-wishers of the Eisenhower administration, but a precious boon to such a Senator McCarthy, who none time ago marked Dulles as their first symbolic target in their effort to discredit Eisenhower himself. They do not dare attack Eisenhower yet. They are working on Dulles. It is a pity he reacts to their jabs and barbs with so many fumbles.

Dr. Eisenhower's Mission
 After years of growing neglect for the problem of a neglected people occasioned principally by our absorption with what seemed more important matters in their quarters of the world—the United States is taking the first step toward some kind of friendly relations in spirit with Latin America.
 This first step is the tour of Dr. Milton Eisenhower, the talented and intelligent brother of the President, in the role of special emissary for the President.
 There is not much that can be done, very fast, to improve our relationship with our neighbors to the south. But, from having followed Milton Eisenhower's career in the past, we do expect that he will accomplish a great deal more, in the department of preparation for the future, than some Latin America cynics will concede. They fear that, in a tour which will take him into at least ten dictatorships, he will not be able to penetrate to the real sentiment of the people. They fear he will gain only surface and official propaganda impressions of conditions in the countries he visits. But, for our part, we suspect that, since he was first assigned to this task, Eisenhower has already learned more about conditions in Latin America than these cynics think he will bring back after his week-long tour. He has a better understanding of what he actually sees is likely to be thorough and deep.
 There is no secret about the cause of our troubles in Latin America. In our preoccupation with world problems, we have lost the time and energy for really working at the business of being good neighbors. Diplomatically, we have taken their support for granted—sometimes with unpleasant results for ourselves in the United Nations. Economically, we have been championed heavily to areas of the world considered more critical politically. And our wartime flood of purchasing in Latin America has been invariably allowed down. And we have nagged over the price of those things we still do buy. The Point Four program, which much of Latin America has been originally enthusiastic, has been kept miniature by Washington policy.
 This has added up to some economic mistreatment for Latin America. And when any country in Latin America encounters mistreatment, its immediate instinct is to find that Uncle Sam is to blame. And in some respects, of course, it is. But our worst sin with regard to Latin America is, in the final analysis, one of attitude. The idea here of being a really good neighbor is to be able to forget that size, power, and wealth give one nation the right to patronize another, or take it for granted.
 Good neighborliness can truly exist only in an atmosphere of equality and of mutual respect. And we have always been slow to realize that these "backward" countries to the south of us actually consider themselves ahead of us in some cultural respects. If these things are to be realized by any individual, touring as an emissary for us, Dr. Eisenhower is certainly, with his own background in both the fields of practice and of mutual respect, admirably qualified to be that individual, and to bring back, eventually, the key to a new approach.

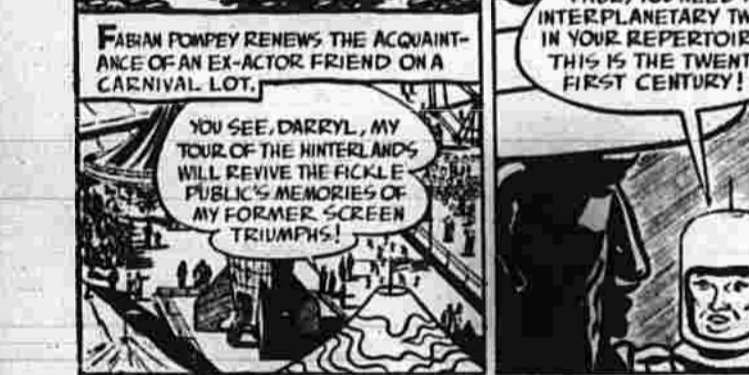
