

Kent Balks At Question Of Red Ties

Washington, July 1.—(P)—Rockwell Kent, artist and author, refused today to tell Senator McCarthy's investigating subcommittee whether he is a Communist or was one when he wrote books now contained in the U. S. overseas libraries.

Kent pleaded that the answers might be used as "a link in a chain of evidence" to incriminate him.

Kent brought with him and handed to McCarthy a statement accusing the subcommittee and the Senate of conspiring to "overthrow our form of government, to use force and violence to install a 'Fascist, totalitarian government.'"

McCarthy did not at once admit the statement in the hearing record as part of his official records, and curiously dismissed Kent from the witness stand after offering to hear the statement "if I am not a Communist."

"I'm sorry," Kent said as he turned away. "I had serious charges to bring here of a conspiracy to overthrow the government by force and violence."

The lean and balding witness, an erect figure in a blue and white striped suit, testified that he contributed "some \$1000" to the Communist party in New York, but said he did it to annoy the man who gave him the money in the first place. He explained it this way:

"It was money received by the rental of my home against my orders. I tried to induce the tenant (whose name was never mentioned) to live there as my guest, and I got back a most insulting letter."

He said he pondered, then, what might be "the most hateful" thing he could do with the money to annoy the tenant, and decided that giving it to some Communist group might serve the purpose.

Questioned by McCarthy, Kent said he felt the fact an organization has been listed by the Attorney General or anyone else as subversive "doesn't sway me," if he thinks the organization "is serving a good cause."

Actually, he admitted to know very little about the Communist party but did read a book about it written by Rep. Martin Dies (D-Tex.), a veteran Red-hunter.

He said the book seemed to list as Communist the pro-Communist groups practically every organization "doing good work for the Negroes, the poor" and that this made him wonder "if America without these so-called Communist fronts."

President Praises Spirit of Freedom In Satellite Revolts

Washington, July 1.—(P)—President Eisenhower said today that spreading like wildfire behind the Iron Curtain. This demonstrates that people who have known freedom are willing to sacrifice life itself to regain it, the President told a news conference.

He said he believes Secretary of State Dulles is right in his active support by the United States for revolts in the satellite countries.

On other matters the President said Dulles can get out a clear directive making it plain what books should be stocked in the overseas information libraries maintained by the State department.

Dulles, he said, has called his attention to the law allowing these libraries to be set up and this law makes it plain the books in the libraries should be about American life and the American system of government.

The President said he is perfectly clear in his own mind about the question of "purging" a reporter's books from overseas libraries.

As for the removal from some libraries of the stories by Dashiell Hammett, a writer long identified with leftist causes, Eisenhower said he thinks "some one got frightened. He added he himself wouldn't countenance the removal of Hammett's detective stories.

The President said he did not recall saying at a recent news conference that the State department can do anything it pleases about disposing of books which advocate the overthrow of the U. S. government by force.

Ike Undisturbed by Rhee; Sees Truce Solution Soon

Foreign Aid Bill Rushed By Senate

Washington, July 1.—(P)—Republican leaders kept the Senate working on a stepped-up schedule today in hopes of winning final approval of a \$5,318,000,000 foreign aid program without a single cut voted on the floor.

In two days of debate so far, not a single reduction in the total has even been proposed—something that has not happened in recent years in consideration of such measures.

However, several Senators have said they expect to attack heavily into the program when the actual money is up for debate later. The pending measure merely sets a ceiling in the new fiscal year which starts today.

The House has passed a \$4,988,000,000 authorization bill.

The Senate met two hours ahead of its usual time today to hold a memorial service for Senator Willis Smith (D-N.C.) who died last night.

Then it is to return to the foreign aid measure, after working on it until midnight, local time, last night. Acting Majority Leader Knowland (R-Calif.) said he would push for quick passage although four or five amendments remained to be debated.

One by Senator McClellan (D-Ark.) would permit the State department to take some of the funds intended for military equipment purchases in this country and use them instead for buying surplus U. S. farm commodities to be delivered to foreign countries.

The recipients would pay for these goods in local currencies which would be used to buy military equipment abroad.

The Senate got around to voting on amendments last night after two days of speeches by President Eisenhower considerable leeway in parceling out the funds authorized, but it balked at authorizing the State department to dispose of surplus farm commodities acquired by the government under its price support program.

The wrangle over the latter proposal of General of the Army Vandenberg (D-Mich.) lengthened the session and touched off a fiery debate over Eisenhower's request

Holds Situation Is Over-stated

Washington, July 1.—(P)—President Eisenhower said today he believes in his own mind a satisfactory solution to the Korean armistice tangle is coming up. Eisenhower told a news conference that Korea affords an example of the acute difficulties that arise between Allies with the same ideals and objectives. It is the history of coalitions, he said, and we shouldn't be too disturbed.

Yet, Eisenhower said, the difficulties and differences are very real and people in an emotional state tend to over-state the case. There was no indication whether he intended that as a reference to President Syngman Rhee of South Korea and Rhee's opposition to an armistice on terms acceptable to the U. S.

He was asked whether there was anything he could say now on the Korean situation, particularly as to whether he is hopeful or optimistic about an armistice.

The President replied that of course the situation is confused and they were nothing but could tell newsmen in detail that would make a real story. It is important to remember, he said, that the enemy is still in North Korea.

But in Seoul, South Korea, President Syngman Rhee was expected to name today his new price for a Korean armistice, which Allied officials intend to sign with or without South Korea's blessing.

Rhee had been expected to hand over his new proposals last night, but a conference with Walter S. Robertson, President Eisenhower's special truce envoy, failed to come off.

Washington quarters predicted a showdown with Rhee within 24 hours. Top U. S. commanders in Korea were summoned to Tokyo for secret and urgent conferences, presumably to determine what military steps may be necessary should Rhee carry out threats to fight on alone.

Robertson, assistant Secretary of State, has made concessions to Rhee in five closed conferences, but authoritative sources declared, adding that "the door is not closed" to an agreement on a truce.

The concessions were intended to overcome Rhee's objections to any armistice agreement that leaves Korea divided.

The high official who talked with newsmen here said Robertson agreed tentatively to a joint U. S.-Korean walkout from a post-armistice.

ROK Head 'Challenges' UN Rulings

Seoul, July 1.—(P)—President Syngman Rhee today challenged "anyone" to try to make the "Korea national defense force" obey commands against the orders of his South Korean government.

What Rhee meant by "Korea national defense force" was not clear. The generally accepted meaning is the South Korean army, navy and air force although it was possible Rhee referred to the Korean national police, a separate unit under the Home Ministry.

Gen. Mark Clark, UN commander, has said several times recently that he commanded the Republic of Korea army under commitments made by Rhee early in the war assigning the ROK army to the United Nations Command.

Rhee underscored his authority over the "national defense force" in a written reply to one of a series of questions submitted to him by Maurice Fogarty, correspondent of the London Daily Herald.

Fogarty asked:

"Is it true, as Gen. Mark Clark says, that there is a separate South Korean force by which we understand he meant security police and which one American journalist has called a big private army, acting under separate orders and not under his (Clark's)?"

Rhee replied:

"I do not know what you mean by a separate Korean force not under the command of General Clark. We have no such thing as security police force in Korea. We have our regular police. If anyone thinks he can manage to make the Korean national defense force, either by force or by order, obey his order against the order of his own government, I would challenge him to try."

In addition to the national police, there is the ROK military police which are part of the regular ROK army. The military police come under the army provost marshal general. Clark said recently that he understood an order of his own government detaching some army troops and passing them to the provost

German Reds Free Half of Huge Army

Berlin, July 1.—(P)—Communist East Germany today reported slashing in half its huge 125,000-man army which so signally failed to put down the recent workers' revolt. The move appeared designed to free men and money for the Reds' announced new program to placate the East Germans with more consumer goods.

Reporting this, the Socialist-United West Berlin newspaper Telegram said over 60,000 of the Soviet-trained soldiers would be sent back to industrial jobs by July 15.

Dismal Failure

The East zone army failed miserably when it was sent into action against the revolt. After Russian-armed forces intervened to put down the rebellion, German soldiers were put on police duty under Soviet command.

The force reportedly slated to be cut in half is the Kasernierte Volkspolizei (KVP) an organization separate from the 100,000-man Volkspolizei or People's Police. The KVP is completely militarized and has undergone infantry training since 1949.

A vast reduction in armament expenditures had been ordered by East zone Premier Otto Grotewohl's regime on the eve of the uprising. The cutback apparently will be carried out now despite the anti-Communist discontent still seething in East Germany.

The Telegram said miners, skilled craftsmen and trained apprentices had been ordered by the Russian-style olive green uniforms and re-enter civilian life.

The government in its new "butcher instead of gun" policy counts on taking the equivalent of 500 million dollars a year from rearmament funds and investing it in workers' housing and consumer industries.

Several German soldiers have been executed and scores sentenced to prison.

East Sector Reds Called To Moscow

Berlin, July 1.—(P)—High-ranking Soviet officers and civilians in rebellious East Germany have been suddenly recalled to Moscow, Allied sources said today.

"Virtually all the former" top ideas of General of the Army Chuikov were reported to have received the Kremlin's summons last Monday.

Their exodus came a day before the Soviet ambassadors in Washington, London and Paris, were hurriedly called home for consultations.

Headed Commission

Chuikov ran East Germany as head of the Soviet Control Commission and commander in chief of 300,000 troops. Then his former political adviser, Vladimir Semenov, was appointed high commissioner in May 28 and Chuikov assigned to military duties inside Russia.

Allied sources said the recalled Soviet officials presumably would be asked to explain why they had not warned Moscow of the advance that a revolt of two million

China Reds Retake Lookout Mountain

Seoul, July 1.—(P)—A sudden onslaught by up to 2,000 Chinese Reds today overran 1,600-foot Lookout Mountain, throwing into reverse a South Korean drive on the blazing east-central front.

At the point of a bayonet, the South Koreans had driven the Chinese from Lookout in vicious night fighting and were mopping up pockets of Reds when the counterattack came at daybreak.

Earlier, U. S. advisers at the front had said the South Koreans were well entrenched on Lookout, whose summit overlooks roads leading southward to the Kum-sung River Valley.

Sketchy reports from the front

said the Chinese surged back with from 1,000 to 2,000 men and drove the Koreans off the height by 6:15 a. m.

The South Koreans had fought well until that time, rolling back some 4,000 Chinese around Lookout and the ridge lines to the east and west where the Reds had driven southward as far as six miles in about two weeks toward the valley with its vital net of roads.

It was the fifth day of battle for Lookout, and both sides had committed thousands of reinforcements.

To the east, a see-saw battle raged for lofty Virginia Hill while furious but localized fights flamed on Finger Ridge and in the Sniper Ridge area.

The ROKs pushed to the top of Virginia Hill before dawn, but were beaten off by about 1,000 Reds just after daybreak.

On Finger Ridge, ROKs clawed to the crest in four hours of close quarter fighting, only to have the Chinese reinforce and drive them back down.

At last report, the South Koreans were fighting back up the slopes.

The ROKs crushed a 300-man Chinese assault on Outpost Victor in the Sniper Ridge region.

The American military adviser said the Chinese "just folded" under the three-pronged ROK attack on Lookout and adjacent outposts El Paso, Caton and Marjorie.

He said the ROKs swept past pockets of Chinese as they pushed the main Red force of 4,000 off the crest and ridges with a vicious hand grenade and bayonet attack. Then the South Koreans came back down.

800 Men Battle To Halt Forest Fires in North

Concord, N. H., July 1.—(P)—A pall of dirty, brown smoke hung over northern and western New Hampshire today as 800 firefighters battled to halt four major forest fires. The smoke rose to 6,000 feet.

An air fight over the fire areas showed 2,200 bladders and charged hoses on Shaw Mountain near Ossipee and Tuftonboro where underbrush and pine growth succumbed to flames.

On the east side of the mountain, a 10-mile fire line was smoldering, and burning fiercely in spots. Huge clouds of smoke billowed toward the Atlantic before a west wind.

Fire fighting forces from Massachusetts, Maine and Vermont, and the Navy were brought into play with those of New Hampshire in the woods fight. The Navy flew two sets of special pumping equipment, 200 feet of hose and some men from West Virginia.

New Hampshire's chief forester, William H. Messek, Jr., said the Shaw Mountain fire was partially under control.

Rigid Controls To Be Invoked On Wheat Crop

Washington, July 1.—(P)—Secretary of Agriculture Benson waited until the final day today to announce that rigid production controls will be invoked on the 1954 wheat crop to keep surpluses from getting much, if any larger.

Crop control laws require the Secretary to announce marketing quotas not later than July 1 for the following year's crop if supplies at the time are of a size legally defined as surplus.

Latest reports on this year's production, plus reserves from past crops, indicate a total supply of slightly more than 1,700,000,000 bushels, the largest of record and around 700 million bushels more than markets are expected to take before the 1954 crop is harvested.

Benson apparently waited until today for possible action by Congress to make next year's cutback in production "less drastic" than would be required under present law. Under existing law, the 1954 planting would have to be 35 million acres, a reduction of 20-30 percent from this year's 78 million acres.

Justice Ouster Attempt Brings Stern Lecture

Washington, July 1.—(P)—Impeachment charges against Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas were headed today for a congressional pigskin-bolt, labeled "file and forget" by a special House Judiciary subcommittee.

Brought by Republican Wheeler (D-Ga.), they were heard yesterday by committee members at a one-hour session in which they were labeled "heinous" and the author was lectured sternly on the legal implications of impeachment proceedings.

The Georgian filed an impeachment resolution accusing Douglas of "high crimes and misdemeanors" immediately after Douglas stayed the execution of atom spies Julius and Ethel Rosenberg. The Supreme Court, which later voided the stay, nevertheless said Douglas was acting within his authority. Wheeler agreed this was so.

While conceding that his charges would get nowhere, Wheeler said he felt nonetheless that his move had achieved some purpose.

"I got the impression," he told newsmen, "that the committee consideration of the resolution had served a good purpose by pinpointing the need for additional legislation in the field of good behavior for Supreme Court Justices."

Wheeler added that he was considering introducing legislation which would "in general create some mechanism within the judicial system for the removal of a Justice who is a menace to the nation."

Editor's Note: Ever since the globe ended in near disaster, Amelia Earhart vanished in the South Pacific 16 years ago, her fate has been a continuing mystery. What happened on that last hop? No one really knows. In this anniversary story The Associated Press recounts the known details.

It is just 16 years ago America's first lady of the air vanished in the South Pacific on the home stretch of an epic globe-grinding flight.

For her followers, her disappearance has always been a mystery. Reports cropped up repeatedly that "Lady Lindy" was alive. Her friends always found it hard to believe that Amelia's spectacular life could end in the empty wastes of the South Pacific.

Here are her women's records:

Flaw—Atlantic Alone

She was the first to fly the Atlantic and she flew it alone. She was the first to have both trans-Atlantic and trans-Pacific flights to her credit. She was the first to fly across the U. S., both by stages and non-stop. Twice she established new speed records. She set a new altitude record and she was the first to fly an autogiro.

Western Cattlemen Divided In Opinions on Drought Aid

Pacific Mystery Miss Lindy's Fate Brings Speculation On Plane Flight

At 2:45 a.m., Howland time, the Coast Guard cutter Itasca, stationed near the microphone pit of land, picked up Amelia's radio for the first time, but failed to get all the message—just a mention of "cloudy weather." During the next six hours ship and plane exchanged frequent messages. At one point Amelia reported the "Electric" was circling, unable to find the island. The last message in flight came at 8:44 a. m. It said: "We are on the line of position 157-337. We will repeat the message on 6210 kilocycles. We are now running north and south. Then silence. The position report was received at 9:05 a. m. and the necessary elements were received. During the next two days, radio land all over the Pacific buzzed with reports that Amelia's whereabouts had been heard. Some reported the plane was in the "radio signal." Coast Guard and other listeners reported hearing "a man's voice or a woman's voice with a cold." Paul Mantz, Amelia's technical adviser, said in Los Angeles the plane could have been seen only if it was on land and the starboard motor was turning over. The mysterious signals persisted. In the morning of July 5, third day of the search, the United States Naval Radio Station near Honolulu reported what he believed was a message from the plane: "281 North Howland... call KRAQ (Amelia's call) ... call ... beyond north ... don't hold us much longer ... above water ... shut off!" There were various interpretations. Some searched through it meant the plane was sinking. Palmer Putnam expressed belief it meant the plane was on a reef, and that the gas engine was kept the radio apparatus going by means of a battery. The search for Amelia and her navigator, Fred Noonan, was the greatest man air search effort undertaken up to that time. The expedition included more than 3,000 men, 19 ships, 102 American fighting planes and an undisciplined number of Japanese navy aircraft. But the story wasn't finished. For years her fate was the subject of wild rumors. War Moves West As the war in the Pacific moved westward, unconfirmed reports were repeated again and again that Amelia had been forced down or deliberately had landed on one of the islands mandated to the Japanese. Another report was she had been taken prisoner and later executed because she had discovered fortifications and other secret installations. A Navy spokesman said again she died in a crash. The recurring rumors that Amelia was alive and a prisoner of the Japanese brought an official denial Sept. 22, 1945, from Commander Tomonaka Otsu, secretary to the Japanese naval attaché.
