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Legion Chief Bares Red Teacher Issue

Miami Beach, Fla., July 2.—Lewis K. Gough, national commander of the American Legion, said today that the real threat of Communism to America does not come from the Soviet Union, but from Communist men who have let themselves be used in the Communist cause.

In an address prepared for delivery before the 91st annual meeting of the National Education association (NEA), the Legion chief said that the group being used by Communists to infiltrate the schools and to indoctrinate the youth of America is the Communist Party.

The other 58, without exception, he added, were "not Americans of eminent learning." He said that the Communist Party is a "powerful force" and that it is a "danger to the American people."

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Sick Strikers' Curtain Trains On Long Island

New York, July 2.—A "sick strike" of trainmen today cut service about 50 per cent on the Long Island Railroad, busiest commuter line in the world.

The strike stranded thousands of persons enroute to work on Manhattan and other thousands enroute to Long Island resorts for the July 4th holiday.

The railroad said 465 members of the Brotherhood of Railway and Marine Workers (B.R.M.W.) and that it had been forced to cancel 90 trains between midnight and 8:40 a. m. the height of the morning rush hour. Between 9 a. m. and 11 a. m. the railroad said it had operated only 115 trains.

The railroad said it had received no demands that would reason for a strike, and a spokesman for the union said officials stated the action of the trainmen was illegal and unauthorized.

Several hundred persons who started early on their Independent Day trip to the shore, were stranded at various points along the line.

He said that using radar is a device to make arrests. If they continue to drive that way, he said, the week end, there'll be less accidents in Hartford.

A radar-supported campaign against speeding went into high gear Tuesday when radar was used on all the approaches to town, warning motorists that radar is being used to check speed.

Since then, Schedel said, his patrol cars have reported a noticeable reduction in speeding throughout town.
