The final swap in the complicated signing of the Korean armistice documents took place in Panmunjom Wednesday afternoon. The documents were first signed in the neutral zone at the 38th parallel and then in the presence of the Red high command.

Next, the documents had to be swapped again so the top Communist officials could sign the set after bearing the other side's signatures. Wednesday afternoon the procedure was repeated with all the documents signed by all the military chiefs.

The Red's job of pulling back was less complicated. They were to take out of the zone a system of defense masonry underground. Allied officers explained the Communist must have to cave in the masonry to make the zone safe.

Although American GIs and other United Nations forces were under orders to avoid the Red, reports of contacts and in some cases exchange of goods, cigarettes and souvenirs were frequent.

And the Communists did not overlook the propaganda opportunity. Broadcasts announced that the Red had captured a number of American soldiers in the area.

Pre-truce fears that the South Korean troops would pull back from the demilitarized zone because of President Rhee's opposition proved groundless as the withdrawal began.

The South Korean forces, who manned two-thirds of the battle-line, were pulling back in orderly fashion.

Allied evacuation of strategic islands far up both North Korean coasts also proceeded smoothly. An Air Force spokesman said the withdrawal from the islands during the war as radar stations and rescue bases — should be completed well within the specified 10-day deadline.

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Rotary Club Told Of Garment Trade

Interesting data concerning the garment industry and particularly the New York City area, were presented to members of the Rotary Club at their meeting last night at the Country Club, by Joseph Bell, factory superintendent at a local plant.

Bell, who has been with Manchester since 1937, and who has lived in Manchester since 1942, told his audience that the local industry employs 500 people, 75 per cent of whom are women.

In Manchester, Bell said, only ladies coats are made, but at the New York City plant ladies suits are made. The garment industry consumes mainly of small fabric, employing on the average less than 100, and most employing only 20.

As most styles made in Manchester are obtained from New York, the style center, Manchester Modes makes about 700 styles of ladies a year, of which only 150 are retained for the year's business.

Bell explained that the price of the local plant is bought in New England. The plant uses 100,000 yards of cloth each year, and 1,000,000 yards of cloth each year.

The garment industry is a highly competitive business and at present is over-producing itself, the speaker declared. Each factory in the industry is very specialized and usually only one item is made in each plant. The range also is a big factor in the manufacturing process because the plant is known by the price for which it sells its goods.

Many people from foreign countries are employed in the business because not many Americans are willing to serve for apprenticeship necessary for becoming a first class tailor, such as is needed in the business, Bell concluded.

Regarding Mr. Vaughn's letter which appeared in your paper July 25, I believe the major fault in our Park and Recreation system is not the fact that we have a separate head and separate budgets for each department, but rather due to a duplication of responsibility and a lack of proper planning.

I believe a low of this size should have as head of the Park Department a man capable of long range planning. He should know the city and its surroundings thoroughly. He should understand trees, shrubs, flowers and grasses and their respective characteristics, suitability and usefulness. He should understand playground equipment and public facilities and be able to integrate all these elements into a long-range plan.

Present maintenance and development should be related to this long range plan. I believe it would be desirable to merge this plan, or enlarging or changing it to suit changing needs and conditions. In short, I believe there should be a professional landscape architect. Taxes and Stars
Congress is concerning itself with two phases of the movie business. It is flirting with the idea of reducing the federal admission tax on movie houses. And

it is in the midst of action to bring under the income tax those salaries American movie stars have chosen to earn abroad since they discovered the loophole in the law which left such foreign income tax free.

President Eisenhower apparently is not ready to veto the reduction of the admission tax, as he should. The special plea for this tax reduction is that it would aid the movie industry in its competition with television. The bill should not be granted, however, which is anything but a special tax relief should be granted now, either to business or to individual taxpayers.

When the bill is revised, the only fair thing to do is to reduce taxes proportionately across the board, when and if we can afford to do so, and show special favoritism to no single interest.

The movie stars have been making a fat thing out of the income of living abroad under the de jure tax loophole. They paid their salaries tax free. But these salaries, although paid abroad, are still financed from American money which is earned inside this nation's economic life. Movie stars do not belong under the de jure tax provision which was designed to be of aid and inducement to American technical experts who went abroad on government programs which are being discontinued. Charge should proceed to close the loophole.

Insurance Taxes At Record Level

Hartford, July 28—(AP)—State Insurance Commissioner W. Hilkey Allyn reported today that Connecticut collected an all-time high of \$2,366,412.18 in insurance taxes during the fiscal year which ended June 30.

The year's collections were \$722,248.18 above those for the previous year and brought the total collected since 1930 to \$18,018,223.88, Allyn said.

Connecticut chartered companies which Allyn said did less than a third of the insurance business in the state paid almost half the taxes—\$1,148,200—for the year.

In addition to the taxes, the department collected \$107,746 in fees which paid nearly half the operating costs of the department.

Under a new law, effective July 1, assessments against Connecticut chartered insurance companies will equal 85 to 90 per cent of the department's operating costs, he said.

Allyn said that Connecticut chartered insurance companies are taxed not only on premiums received, more than 80 per cent of which comes from outside the state.

"No other state imposes such a tax," he stated.
