

Navy Yard Blast Kills Two Men

New York, Aug. 17 (AP)—An explosion blew down the wall of an officer's home at the Brooklyn Navy Yard last night, killing two men and injuring nine others.

The blast victims included Navy Yard fireman and duty officer who had been summoned to check a short circuit in the frame and mortar house. While looking around they were caught by the explosion.

Dead were two firemen, Francis Conlin, 30, and Frank Licotta, 35. The firemen were civilian employees of the Navy.

Investigating Wiling Cmdr. George Greer had called them to investigate faulty wiring in his home. He and his wife and son, George, Jr., 19, were standing outside when one of the buildings blew up. The Greers escaped serious injury.

The explosion, believed caused by gas that leaked from a water heater, tumbled the wall of a first floor room. The second floor wall remained in place.

A crane was used to lift the flattened wall off the men, who were rushed to Brooklyn Hospital. None of the injuries was reported in critical or serious condition early today.

Among the injured was Lt. Cmdr. James J. Madden, 35, night duty officer who went to Greer's home with the firemen.

Police identified the injured firemen as:

Isaac Holberg, 34, Allan Kozlowski, 25, Nicholas Santolucito, 26, and Gabriel Pavella, 25.

Injured from flying debris were Hospital Corpman Donald Donohue, of New London, Conn., and the younger Greer. Neither was hurt seriously, police said.

Across the river in Palisades, N. Y., an earth tremor was recorded minutes before reports of the Navy Yard explosion. Rumbles were heard over a wide part of a New York-New Jersey area.

Seismologists could not say definitely whether the explosion or an earthquake caused the rumbles recorded on their instruments.

Police in Fort Lee, N. J., said sounds heard by residents there might have been from the explosion.

Reports of hearing a blast or rumbles came from Bergen in Hudson County, N. J., Westchester County, N. Y., and Manhattan and the Bronx in New York City. Some Westchester residents said they felt the tremor.

Dr. Frank Press, director of Columbia's University Lamont Geological Laboratory, said the seismograph recorded the tremor at 11:25 p. m. New York time (eastern daylight).

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Metal Process Patent Rights Offered Soviet

New Bedford, Mass., Aug. 17 (AP)—The New Bedford Standard-Times reported today that a cold flow metal forming process, to which Raymond N. Skilton, New Bedford, Mass., claims patent rights, is being offered for sale by another person to the Soviet Union in December, 1954.

Skilton, 39, says he has developed the process, which Skilton says was patented 30 years ago under the name "Telner," is described as a method of making steel flow change of strength, by use of tremendous pressure.

He contends that despite recommendations of ordnance experts, "mysterious interests operating and through the government," patented "Telner" production before and during World War II. He has been seeking recognition as owner of the process which he says now is being used in private American industry.

The Standard-Times' dispatch indicates that the Soviet government failed to take advantage of the reported offer and the paper said it had failed to find out if the FBI ever acted on the matter after investigating the alleged correspondence.

Skilton was quoted as saying he brought the correspondence to the attention of the FBI.

Beirut, Lebanon, Aug. 17 (AP)—Unconfirmed reports from neighboring Syria said President Adib Shishki, his country's "strong man," was assassinated today in Damascus. The reports said unknown assailants mowed down Shishki with machinegun fire as he stepped from a bulletproof car.

(This dispatch did not disclose the source of the report of the assassination. News usually seeps quickly over the Syrian-Lebanese border, though an official announcement on an event of this kind might be held up in Damascus for several hours.)

Kremlin Proposes German Unity Pact

Washington, Aug. 17 (AP)—Russia suggested last night that Germany be reunified—and severed from military ties with the West—in what Western diplomats generally regarded as a propaganda move aimed at the overthrow of the Adenauer West German government.

Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's Bonn government faces popular elections on Sept. 6 and, as diplomats here read the Russian proposals, Moscow was doing all it could to assure voters by holding out hope for early unification of East and West Germany.

"Important Question"

The most important question in Europe, the Moscow Radio said, is the peaceful reunification of Germany and the conclusion of a peace treaty with it.

In a note delivered in Moscow to the United States, Britain, and France, the Kremlin urged immediate creation of a provisional All-German government. It also urged the Western Big Three to support peace conference on Germany of "all interested parties" within six months.

Moscow simultaneously called for an end to German reparations by next Jan. 1, and it summoned its East German puppets to the Kremlin for talks.

The All-German government proposed to replace the Adenauer regime and the Red-controlled East-German government, would be assigned the task of organizing an election law which would permit free elections throughout Germany.

Moscow called for wide participation by Democratic organizations—obviously a reference to the Communist Free German Youth League and other Red-controlled groups.

Russia offered to give up more than three billion dollars worth of German manufactures now reserved for her from East Germany, while proposing that reparations payment end Jan. 1 and that the Big Four Powers

Printing Office Worker Named As Communist

Washington, Aug. 17 (AP)—A Government Printing Office worker identified a fellow worker, Edward Rothschild, face-to-face today as a longtime member of the Communist Party.

James Phillips, a bookbinding machine operator, told Senate investigators that Rothschild has no direct access to secret material in the government printing plant but could easily get such material from other workers.

Phillips confronted Rothschild at a hearing by the Senate Investigative Subcommittee which is looking for evidence that secret material in the Government Printing Office has been leaked to the Communists.

Phillips testified he first met Rothschild in 1938. He identified Rothschild as one of 25 or 30 persons who attended a meeting in a private home to organize a Communist cell in the Government Printing Office.

Phillips said Rothschild, not like a Fred Miller approached him in the "chink," a cell in which a man neither stand nor stretch.

(Editor's Note: Frank Noel, questioning by the Communists, said things the Communists did not like.

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In a report to the nation's lawmakers, Eisenhower said western nations should strive for greater self-help toward collective security because American aid "cannot do the whole job."

Reviews MSA Program

His report reviewed the Mutual Security program for the six-month period ending June 30 and indicated that "while it is clear the strength needed by other free nations cannot be developed without substantial American assistance, it is equally clear that the Mutual Security program alone cannot do the whole job."

"Other measures are necessary, and it is important that the Mutual Security program and our foreign relations as a whole be conducted in such a way as to facilitate the taking of these measures."

Ratification of the European Defense Community Treaty, trade expansion, and greater involvement of private capital in underdeveloped countries were three steps the President mentioned.

Eisenhower limited his own remarks to a 2-sentence letter of approval of the Mutual Security Act, which authorized \$4.5 billion of new money.

"In drawing up the new fiscal year program," he said, "emphasis was shifted more toward Asia and the Pacific, including special assistance for Indochina, and 10 per cent of the new money for the 1954 program will be for Asia, compared with 14 per cent in the previous fiscal year. The European program will drop from 71 per cent of the total funds in 1953 to 60 per cent in 1954."

The Soviet Union retains the capacity for aggression," the report declared, "and it has demonstrated aggressive intentions on numerous occasions in the recent past. Its future intentions remain a certain quantity."

The report said American military shipments were about 70 per cent higher in value in the first six months of 1953 than in the previous year. Western Europe's production of military items increased four-fold for the year ended last June 30 over the pre-Korean level.

"But this is not enough, the report said, adding America's "participation in the world's peace program" can constitute a tremendous asset to free world peace.

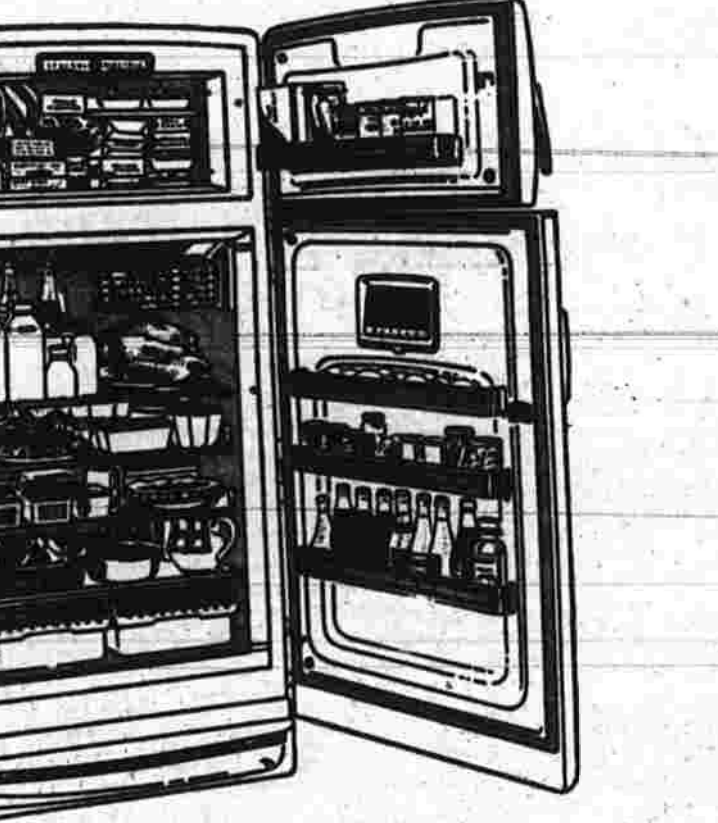
