


Washington, Aug. 17 (P)-President Eisenhower today told Congress that Soviet Russia continues to be a serious threat to peace and that U.S. aid to check Communist expansion is now shifting emphasis from Europe Asia and the Pacific.

In a report to the nation's law-makers, Eisenhower said western nations should strive for greater self-help toward collective securit hecause American aid "cannot do the whole job."
