





### Bolton Education Is Largest Item In \$24,769 Budget Raise

Bolton, Aug. 19 (Special)—Twenty-one persons attended the public hearing on proposed budget expenditures for the 1953-54 fiscal year, totaling \$170,000. There were comparatively few questions or comments on the items which were reviewed individually.

The total budget request is \$24,769. Higher than last year's \$20,000, the increase is \$4,769. Chairman Kingsley B. Carpenter of the Finance Board who presided at the hearing, explained that \$20,000 of this appears in the Town's annual budget which will be covered by state grants. Of the remainder, \$14,000.00 is an increase in the education budget which is based on an anticipated enrollment increase of 30 pupils next month.

The balance of \$1,076.00 is spread over the rest of the budget and includes a recommended increase of 20 per cent to the salaries of town officials, as well as a 10 per cent increase in the salaries of the school teachers. Chairman Carpenter stated that several requests for increases had been received, some representing figures higher than 30 per cent and others, lower.

Lacking time to make a complete survey of the matter of salaries and faced with the law that the salary of an elected official cannot be increased in his term, the Finance Board has recommended the 30 per cent increase pending a report of a special survey committee at a special town meeting Friday night. The 30 per cent increase would become effective with the adoption of the budget at the annual town meeting and the annual town meeting which will be held during the next biennium.

The final budget including anticipated revenue will be drawn up by the Finance Board in special sessions to be held within the next week or two.

Apparatus Zone Billing

The petition of Robert D. Valentine, Allan A. and Doris E. Leventhal will be heard by the Zoning Board of Appeals tomorrow night at the Community Hall at 8. They are requesting permission to divide their adjoining lots into two sections, each with less frontage than the regulations require and for permission to use both sections for business purposes.

Valentine, in a statement today, said he proposes to construct a second, masonry structure at the site, possibly measuring 40 by 50 feet. Pending the decision of the Appeals Board he stated his plans are incomplete beyond the type of structure and its size.

The site in question is in the residential town line and U. S. Route 6 and 44-A between the Manchester town line and Bolton. Notch. With a top heavy growth in residential development in recent years, increasing numbers of Bolton people are becoming the sport of the Finance Board as a means of easing the burden on taxpayers.

Board Meets Tonight

The Zoning Commission will hear the petition of Rev. Clayton Smith tonight at the Community Hall at 8. He will seek a change from Zone A to Zone B on property owned by him on Tolland Road, as well as a business zone on a separate plot at the intersection of Tolland Road and a private road to camp on Bolton Lake.

### The Doctor Says

The skin is a tough part of the anatomy, but all of us have trouble with it at one time or another. Some people, like the writer of today's first letter, however, have a real problem.

Q—My skin is extremely irritated to all metals, causing itchy, pimples and watery eruptions. What is the cause? I have been told that system is too alkaline. Is it true that such systems are inclined towards cancer? I have had this for the last 15 years and would like to be cured.

A—There is no reason to believe that an "alkaline" system, whatever that is, has anything to do with your allergy to metals. There is also no reason to feel that your allergy to metals inclines you to cancer. The only procedure which would be likely to help in such an unusual and severe case is to keep your skin out of contact with metals. If it should be necessary to handle metals which cause your skin trouble, you might be able to avoid difficulty by wearing rubber or plastic gloves at the time.

Q—My sister's little boy, age four, has a rupture. She has tried putting a truss on him, but it is aggravating and seems to do more harm than good. Is he likely to outgrow the rupture or is surgery necessary?—Mrs. M. P.

A—I should think that wearing a truss by a small boy would be exceedingly difficult and would interfere with his activity and perhaps affect his psychological. The results of adequately performed surgery for a rupture of

this sort are so good that in all probability an operation would be the best subject, of course, to the opinion of the consulting surgeon.

Q—I am expecting a baby soon. I have a little girl six years old and how am I to tell her where the baby comes from and all the details that children ask? I know one should always tell a child the truth, but I am at a loss as far as this is concerned.—Mrs. L.

A—Answer your little girl's questions in simple terms which she can understand, but do not try to explain anything which she does not ask, or which she cannot understand. She will be satisfied with very simple replies, and certainly at the age of six it is not necessary to go into complicated details of anatomy or physiology.

Q—I am a girl in my teens and have a weak ankle. I turn it and fall a lot. Would it do any good to see a foot specialist?—Miss V.

A—It would be advisable to see your physician who could be sure that you wear the right kind of shoes for a white and perhaps might want to put on an elastic bandage or some other support to prevent your turning your ankle so often. This should allow it to strengthen, which it probably will not do if you keep on turning it often.

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### Trouble Ahead Seems Certain For South Asia

Hong Kong, Aug. 19 (AP)—Several states in the wind indicate a spread of Communist trouble in Southeast Asia in the wake of the Korean War.

But it is not sure yet of the form or forms it may take.

The Chinese Reds have announced last month that an autonomous government for the Thai minority peoples in Yunnan, a China province which abuts Burma and Indochina, has been set up.

The Chinese Reds have granted semi-autonomy to several minority ethnic groups in China. Mostly these appear to be sugary spots to keep peace among these people, who have never been absorbed and who are cantankerous by nature and hard to get at by geography.

But the Thai semi-autonomous district in Yunnan probably has quite a different purpose. The Thais live in the mountainous regions of Yunnan, the Shan states and other borderland areas of Burma and northwestern Indochina. They're related to much of Thailand's population.

Last year Communists in Indochina conducted a campaign in the Thai country of Indochina in behalf of their chairman Ho Chi Minh. The still unexplained Communist invasion of Thailand could have been an additional effort to influence the Thais.

Now comes Peiping, with another of its "nations within a nation" for the Thais of Yunnan. Peiping has a way of reworking maps and borders as usually shown out in China's favor. It would be easy to spread this "Thai nation" from Yunnan into Indochina, Thailand and Burma—not as a "Nationalist movement" by the Thais themselves. Peiping, of course, would call the Thais but the Thais, who have the usual sense of grievance against the French, the Siamese and the other peoples of Burma, to say nothing of the English and Americans, could probably think they were doing it themselves.

More than a month ago in Singapore, Associate Press correspondent Robert Hewitt wrote that anti-Communist peoples in all Southeast Asia were becoming afraid of this infiltration among the Thais.

Whether the Thais themselves could be made into a front for the Chinese Reds is another matter. Chinese Red infiltration into Southeast Asia by use of the Thais has its points. At least it would temporarily get Peiping past one hurdle—the traditional dislike and fear of the Chinese which is found among the people of Southeast Asia. Most observers don't think Peiping will militarily invade Southeast Asia because of this factor. Every part of Asia they didn't immediately conquer would turn against them in consequence.

But of course they can always get around that by coming to the aid of the down-trodden Thais, the unliberated proletariat of the hills. If the Western nations try to interfere, the long finger of colonial conquest will be pointed against them.

The prospect is for the usual unclear, extraneous conflict in which Communists do well and the West badly.

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

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## Hal Boyle Pett Report Released; Shows up Dr. Kinsey

New York (AP)—The Kinsey report on women will be out Thursday. Why? The Pett report is out today. It is based on interviews with women, even arguments on 35 years of non-objective observation, on rumor and gossip, on prejudice and bias regarding race, creed or color, and on long conversations with many men.

The Pett report shows that: 68.8 per cent of all married women object to being kissed behind the ear while making a cake. 81.3 per cent of all married women know as many rude words as their husbands but only .0009 per cent admit it.

During coitus, 33.8 per cent of women of all ages cheat by keeping their eyes open. 14 per cent of all married women wear shoes that are too tight. 22.3 per cent of married women throw dishes at their husbands and 22.3 per cent miss.

During courtship, 84.4 per cent of women of all ages talk only of marriage, a home and children. After the wedding, 73.5 per cent complain that if they hadn't been rushed into marriage they might have had a promising career.

74.8 per cent of married women who visit their husbands' offices, can't resist looking at his desk calendar. 84 per cent of women under 30 over use the word, "cute."

52.3 per cent of married women have more children if only they had a full time maid. 34 per cent of women of all ages say "yes" more often than men because men aren't asked as often. 78 per cent of the women who wear low cut dresses pretend to be annoyed when men stare. 52.8 per cent of married women think that 88.8 per cent of the other married women are better off.

66.7 per cent of married women will never hold out their hands in the general direction of their husband. Then they complain bitterly when he doesn't immediately understand they want a cigarette.

74.3 per cent of the women in America who play poker play with all the red cards wild. 68 per cent of women of all ages snore in bed, but only .09 per cent admit it.

96.2 per cent of the women who turn away from an off-color joke at a party light on hearing it later from their husbands. 78 per cent of women over 30 use the phrase, "I can't stand it (or her or him)."

53 per cent of women of all ages have fewer inhibitions than men about money.

Before marriage, 74 per cent of women talk about marriage being a "two-way" street. After marriage, 73 per cent make it a one-way.

90.8 per cent of women of all ages will disagree violently with what they just want.
